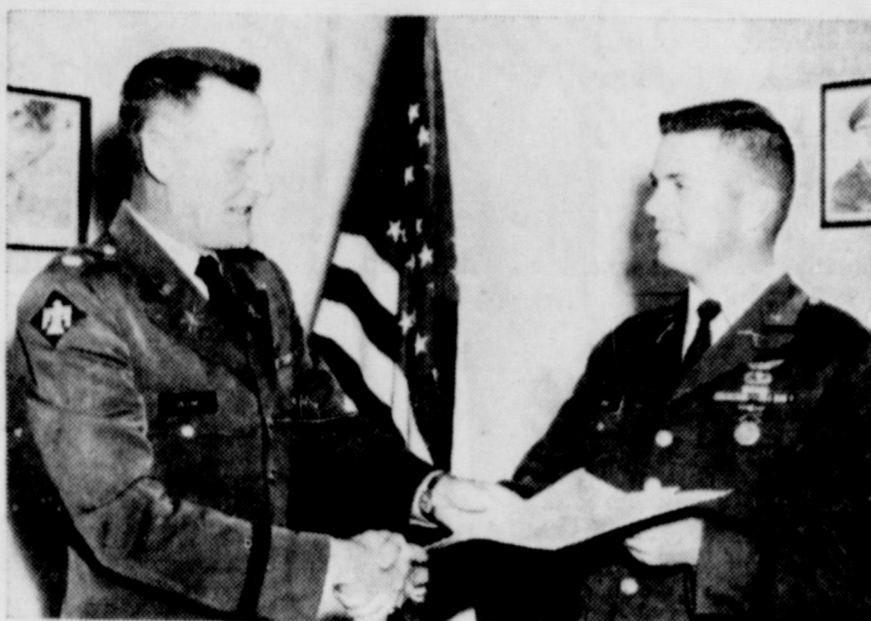

Plan Revision Delays Lakewood Work Start

A delay of several weeks is expected before a low bid of \$106,008 is awarded to Bowden Lumber Co. of Cross Plains for construction of the Lakewood Recreational Center located mid-way between Cross Plains and Rising Star.

R. D. (Bob) Needham, president of the board of directors, said that several minor and a couple of major changes had to be made in the plans to bring the bid within range of the amount of the Farmers Home Administration loan available.

Major planned changes according to Needham are in the swimming pool, and sprinkler system on the irrigated nine-hole golf course. The changes are to be made in method of construction and not to the facilities, it was pointed out.

Needham explained that the revision would have to be okayed by the engineering firm, Yeatts & Decker of Abilene,

and by the state FHA office in Temple before the contract could be awarded. He continued that the Eastland County FHA office through which the loan was sought, believes that state authorities would approve the changes.

Contract calls for construction to be completed in 180 days after official contract letting.

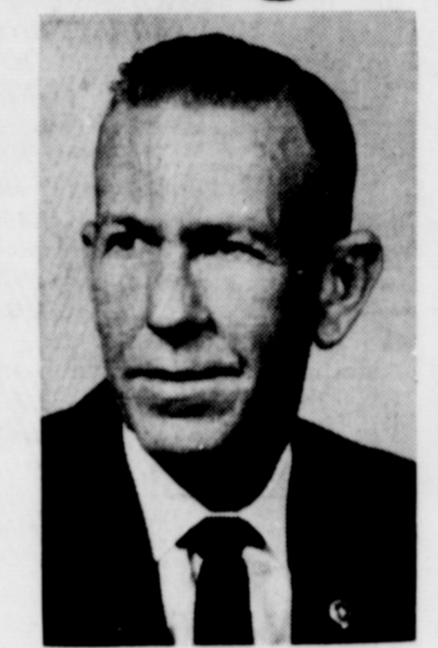
In 1950 Button was transferred to Rising Star, where he served as local manager for 11 years and for the past four years has been serving as local manager in Cross Plains.

Cross Plains area growers were busy prize collectors in pecan shows at Comanche, Eastland and Brownwood last week.

A new variety of pecans perfected by Doss Alexander and named Pioneer for the community in which he resides, was adjudged the highest yielding kernel pecan in the annual show at Comanche. His Pioneers shelled out 63.02 per cent kernel in the in-shell division.

Alexander also had the reserve over-all champion at Comanche with an entry of the San Saba Improved variety.

One of the larger pecan exhibitions in this section of the state was that at Eastland Saturday. Local growers capturing winning ribbons at that show included: Alexander, Edwin Schaefer, and C. C. Westerman.

Alexander took third place in Halberts, second in Texas Proflics and third in Eastern Schleys. In shelling government crosses, he was third with McCulleys, first with Mikes, first with Jims and third with Pioneers. In shelling variety seedlings, he had the second place finisher.

Schaefer won third place in the San Saba Improved division, second with his Mikes in the shelling of government crosses, and in the same category was second with both his

Jims and Pioneers. Westerman captured third place with his entry in the shelling variety seedlings.

Oscar Schaefer, local man who serves as president of the annual Eastland County exposition, said there were more than 300 entries in the 13th annual event.

At the show in Brownwood Saturday Alexander took second on an entry of three nuts, third in a class of six, third place with his Comanches, first place with his Stuarts, second with his Jims in in-shells and first in varieties seedling shelling.

Daily potential was 20 barrels of 41 gravity oil, pumping from 16 perforations at 1,126-34 feet. The 4½-inch casing is set at 1,272 feet.

The venture was originally drilled in 1950 to a total depth of 2,771 feet.
