A 40-foot tank, to hold 35,000 gallons has been placed atop a hill just north of Burkett Cemetery. This facility will provide storage and pressure for the system.

Water will come from two newly-completed wells in the west edge of Burkett on the east side of Pecan Bayou. Engineers have estimated that potential of the two wells is more than adequate to accommodate existing needs.

Members of the board of supervisors are: R. G. Adams, L. D. Evans, Raymond Jennings, Merrel Burkett and Paul Burns.

Contractor for the project is Clyde Smith Construction Company of Austin. The firm had 120 days to complete the project.

High School Gets 200 New Lockers

Two hundred new lockers, costing \$1,400 were installed in the high school building on the local campus during the recent holiday recess. They are of a different type from the old ones used, and will hold personal possessions as well as text books. They are 12 inches wide, 15 inches deep and 36 inches long.

The old lockers, which according to a school official "looked like they had been here since the building was constructed," were removed and the most serviceable installed in the elementary building for use by junior high students.

The school board entered into contract early this semester with a St. Louis company for the lockers.

Installation was done by school employees Sam Lane, Bart Thomas and O. B. Switzer.

Six Candidates File For Election In May

39 Per Cent Of Veterans In Callahan Get Pensions

More than 39 per cent of the war veterans and dependants living in Callahan County now receive pensions or some type of compensation, it is estimated by Carl Fleming of Baird, veterans service officer.

"The county has a total of 870 veterans and about 340 receive regular monthly checks from the government," he said.

Fleming, who offices on the third floor of the courthouse at Baird, reminds that income reports must be filed by pension

recipients by Jan. 31. The questionnaire forms must not be folded or otherwise mutilated, he cautions, as they are run through automatic data processing machines.

Fleming reminds that his office is open five mornings weekly, Monday through Friday, and that he is available to assist veterans or their dependants in completing these questionnaires or with any other problems concerning pensions or compensations.

New Strike Completed In Denton Valley Area

Southwest Callahan County has gained a new wildcat oil strike which was gauged at a daily potential of 172 barrels of 42 gravity oil.

It is located four miles southwest of Denton Valley, the Waggoner & Zeller of Abilene No. 1 Betcher. Site is nine feet from the north and 2,241 feet from the west lines of Section 7, Block 6, SP Survey.

The re-entry project to the Cook Sand is pumping from perforations at 1,766-70 feet, and four and one-half inch casing is set at 1,825 feet, total depth.

COOK SAND VENTURE SET EAST OF OPLIN

A shallow venture to test the Cook Sand eight miles east of Oplin has been contracted by Dalton Moore Engineering Co. of Abilene. It is slated for 990 feet.

It is located 1,185 feet from the north and 750 feet from the west lines of Section 157, GH&H Survey on a 220-acre lease.
