Nancy Campbell Best Homemaker

Miss Nancy B. Campbell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Campbell, has been chosen "Homemaker of Tomorrow" in a contest conducted at Cross Plains High School where she is a senior student.

Nancy scored highest here in a written knowledge and aptitude test, sponsored by General Mills as a part of the annual Betty Crocker awards. She is now eligible for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

Test papers of all school winners in the state are being judged competitively. From them, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search. In addition, her school will be awarded a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica by Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc. The second-ranking girl will receive a \$500 educational grant.

Following her selection, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join winners and advisors from each of the 49 other states and the District of Columbia in an expense-paid tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D.C. Climax of the trip will be the naming of the 1966 Betty Crocker All-

American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Chosen from the state winners on the tour, she will receive a scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second, third, and fourth-ranking girls in the nation will be raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

All judging is conducted by Science Research Associates, Chicago. This educational testing and publishing firm also constructs and grades the written test.

The Betty Crocker contest is designed to emphasize homemaking as a career.

Senior Citizens Urged To Sign For Medicare

Cross Plains and area citizens are reminded by R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene, that March 31 is still the deadline for enrollment in Medicare.

He emphasized, "If you have reached age 65 and are not receiving social security or railroad retirement benefits, and have not signed up for Medicare, now is the time for action."

He explained that almost every older person in the nation is eligible for health insurance under the new law passed by Congress last year.

"The major part of hospital charges and doctor bills will be paid for those people 65 or older who sign up for the health protection," Tuley said.

"We are especially trying to reach two groups of people right now. One group includes those over 65 who have not applied for social security retirement benefits because their earnings are too high to permit cash payments. These people will have Medicare protection by applying for it.

"The second group we need to get in touch with may have had little or no work under social security," he explained. "If they are 65 or over, they can get the health protection by enrolling for it.

Tuley pointed out that health insurance benefits begin next July. "I cannot over-emphasize the importance of prompt action by all those who are eligible," he said.

Walters finished high school at Weatherford and attended junior college in his home city two years before transferring to A&M. He was an active F.F.A. member in high school and participated in leadership and judging contests.

Breck Man Tosses Hat In Ring For House Seat

Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge today announced his candidacy for State Representative, 63rd District, in the Democratic primary election — the seat vacated by Wayne Gibbons, now on Governor Connally's staff in Washington.

Musgrove has completed six years at the University of Texas, majoring in chemical engineering and business. He was selected in 1963 as "Outstanding Student" from the 24,000 member student body among numerous honors.

Having lived in Breckenridge for more than 20 years, Musgrove has been considered an outstanding young member of the community. He was awarded the State and National Elks Foundation "Most Valuable High School Student" Scholarship. Breckenridge High School classmates elected him "Best All-Around Boy."

Later at the University of Texas, Musgrove, as president of numerous organizations, played an active role in student improvements, including library, language lab and student housing expansion. In recognition of this leadership he was awarded the Sons of the American Revolution Medal of Honor, the Chicago Tribune Award and the Berry Whitaker Leadership Award. He was on the Board of Directors of the University Co-Op, a store serving the University community and doing an annual 4 million dollar business.

Musgrove, 25, is the son of Mrs. Dale Musgrove and the brother of Mrs. Phil Pitzer of Breckenridge. On the death of his father, Glenn Musgrove, when Burke was 11, he began the work that carried him through his high school and college years.

Employed by the Graridge Corporation in Breckenridge, he became familiar with the different aspects and problems concerning the oil industry while working after class in high school and during several summers in college. While attending the University, Musgrove represented several local and area independent oil operators by securing records and information from the Texas Railroad Commission in Austin.

Widely known in youth development work, Musgrove was the program coordinator of the first statewide Attorney General's Youth Conference in which over 1200 high school leaders participated. The Conference, now annual, has been a key factor in curbing the state's rising juvenile crime rate.

Musgrove has worked with numerous state officials as the coordinator for eight years for the American Boys State program, held each year in the State Capitol Building in Austin. This program has afforded thousands of young Texans — and young Americans — with the inspiration to become active, participating citizens. In recognition for his outstanding service to youth, the Breckenridge Lions Club awarded Musgrove honorary membership.

"I desire to be of service to this area," Musgrove said in announcing his candidacy, "in order that I might repay some of the blessings and opportunities that have been provided me. It is certainly an honor and a compliment to be encouraged by many friends to offer my service in the capacity of State Representative. However, to be successful I will be calling on more and more of my friends, acquaintances, and lots of people I have not yet met to assist with my campaign. This promises to be a long and costly campaign — one which I cannot win without broad-based support from the many of you interested in good government and effective, energetic representation," Musgrove concluded.

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Buffettes Claim Runner-Up Trophy In HS-U Cage Meet

Cross Plains High School Buffettes battled their way to runner-up position in the annual Hardin-Simmons University Invitational Basketball tournament last week, adding another impressive trophy to the local school's enviable collection.

Coach Jack Gray was awarded a watch as mentor of the runner-up team.

Buffettes listed the first of three tourney wins against Merkel's girls Thursday morning at the HS-U gymnasium, 68-42. Darylene Hargrove and Valeta Edington counted 33 and 22 points respectively.

Cross Plains' second opponent was a Garden City group, who deposited the tournament favorite, Eula in earlier play. Local girls lagged behind at the end of the first three quarters, but rallied in the fourth period to fell the foes 42-41. Maximum score spread throughout the game was three points in the Friday night thriller.

Darylene Hargrove dunked 26 points en route to a spot on the all-tournament team.

The local lasses were instrumental in ending a tradition at the Abilene school. They defeated Trent fems, champs of the tournament for three consecutive years, 60-36, in a Saturday morning semi-final match.

Darylene continued to pace local scorers, firing 24 points against Trent defenders. Beth Hutchins collected another third

of the total hitting 21 points.

Official scorekeepers pointed out that Cross Plains guards held the Trent squad to a scant six field goals. The remaining 24 points were recorded as free tosses.

But a chance at the big victory faded for Cross Plains Saturday night in the finals as Paint Creek launched a successful coup against the Buffettes, 51-48.

Cross Plains found a one-point, first quarter lead over the opposition, but fell two behind in the second period. Third quarter play left the margin unchanged and the Paint Creek girls added another point to their lead in the last frame.

Janay Morrison, Paint Creek forward, bucketed 35 points against Cross Plains, hitting 12 field goals and 11 of 11 free shots.

Buffette Beth Hutchins followed a similar pattern for the home town girls, scoring on eight field goals. The remainder of her 26 point total was earned at the free shot line where she sank 10 of 10 tosses.

"I'm proud of every member of the team," Gray said Monday. "The girls gave the game everything they had and their effort is a credit to the school and the town."

Darylene Hargrove and Carolyn Tunnell represented Cross Plains on the all-tournament squad, chosen from a field of 16 teams.

All Callahan Sheep Receive Inspection

County Agent Pat Garner announces that the Texas Animal Health Commission, assisted by the Animal Health Division of the United States Department of Agriculture, launched an extensive inspection of all sheep flocks within Callahan County Jan. 27, 1966. All inspections are under the supervision of Dr. James B. Henderson, Area Veterinarian, and will be conducted in Callahan County by Bill Oliver.

As a result of two outbreaks of sheep scabies within the last year other states have imposed dipping requirements that ham-

per the marketing of Texas sheep. Relinquishing of these requirements will be considered upon an inspection of all flocks without evidence of scabies being found. Industry cooperation is needed so that the necessary inspections may be conducted in an organized manner with a minimum of inconvenience to the sheep producer.

The County Chairman of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and the Agricultural Extension Service through the local County Agent, are assisting in the cooperative effort.

The project is broken down into two parts. First will be from the Taylor County line to U. S. Highway 283, the Baird to Coleman road, a distance of 16.420 miles. Bids on this part will be received until 9 a.m. Feb. 23. Second part of construction begins at Highway 283 to the Eastland County line, a distance of 18.699 miles. Bids on this segment will be received until 9 a.m. the following day before being opened and read.

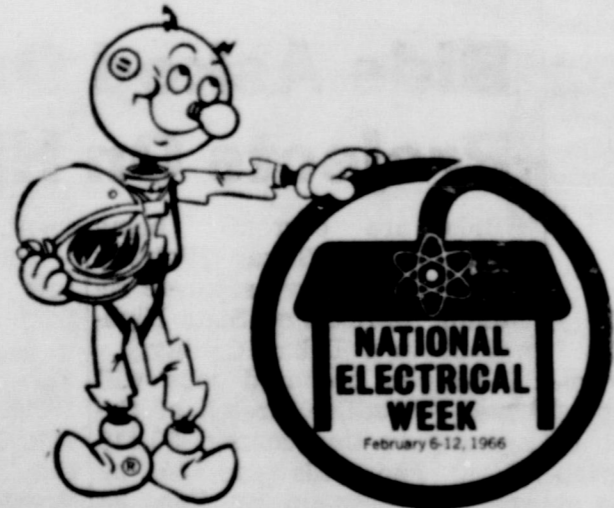

Fun Publisher In Rising Star

(Doc) Sellars, 79, veteran Rising Star newspaper publisher died Sunday at 7 a.m. in Rising Star Hospital after illness of about five years. Funeral was held from the Methodist Church in Rising Star Tuesday afternoon with Rev. J. M. Hodges, pastor, officiating. Rev. D. L. Barnes, Methodist pastor, officiated at the funeral which was in Rising Star.

March 23, 1887, at Jones. Mr. Sellars married Marie Chadick May 27, 1913. He was a long-time Texas editor-publisher, started his newspaper as a printer's devil in the Brady Sentinel, which he purchased in 1914.

On March 24 he sold the Brady paper and moved to Rising Star to publish the Record until his death in 1952.

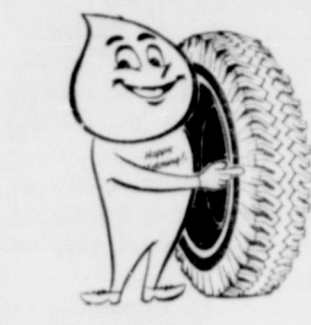
Brownwood Club Has Meeting Here Friday

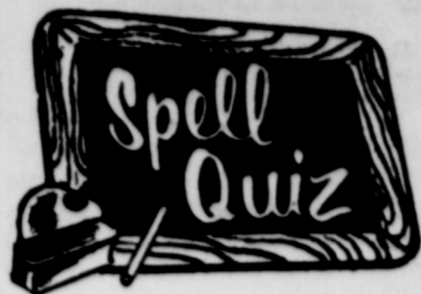
