which was directed by Raymond Franke and Nathan Foster, was termed "highly successful," and plans are being formulated for another such event later this year.

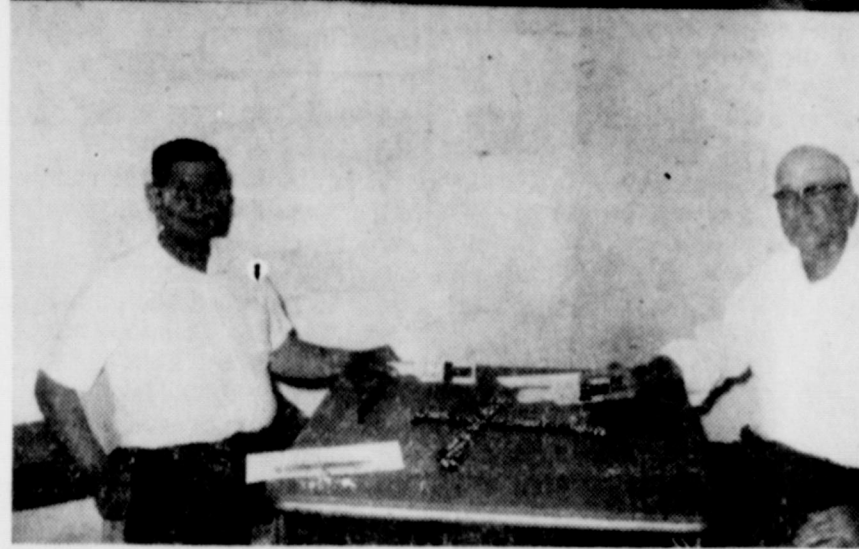
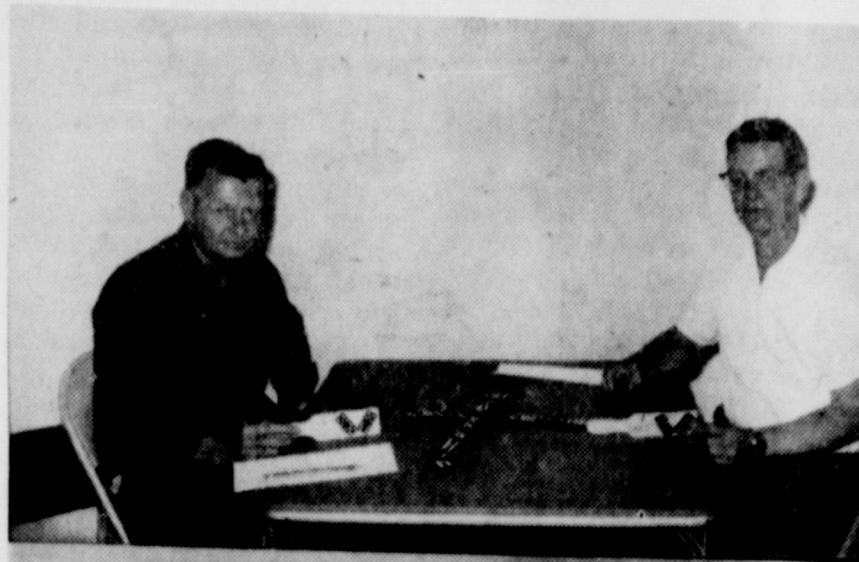

108 Students Rate School's Honor Roll

One hundred-eight students were named on Cross Plains school honor roll for the fifth six-weeks period according to a list released Tuesday morning by school officials.

Just over 23 per cent of the total average daily attendance enrollment were selected to the elite group. Seventy-nine honor scholastics were from elementary school where the bulk of enrollment lies. High school, however, placed 29 students on the list which requires a grade average of 90 or better.

Sixth Grade Tops
Classes representing the largest and smallest number of honorees both came from the first eight grades. The sixth grade with 25 names, and just over 23 percent of the aggregate, far outstripped all other classes. Only three third graders earned honor status, holding the dubious distinction of least number. Fourth and fifth grades were runners-up to the sixth with 13 students each.

Junior Class Leads
The Junior Class topped the four class field numerically in high school. Ten of the 11th graders were placed on the roll. Sophomores trailed the honor scholastics with four

members. Eight freshmen earned berths on the honor list and seven seniors attained a grade A average.

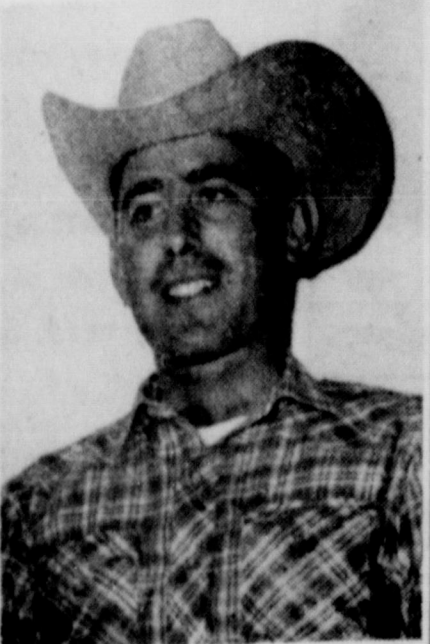
assistant agent in Washington County he is credited with hav-

Tom and Johnnie Burks 50 Years Ago



Popular Couple as They Appear Today

Tom Burkses To Note 50th Wedding Date Next Sunday

The dashboard of a buggy served as an improvised altar 50 years ago this week as Mr. and Mrs. Tom Burks recited the vows of marriage to Minister R. Duncan at his home in Ranger. The date was April 23, 1916.

A golden wedding anniversary will honor the popular Cross Plains couple Sunday afternoon from two until four at their home in the northeast part of town. Their children, Boswell Burks of Abilene and Mrs. George Hoover of Odessa and their families will host an open house to which all friends of the couple are invited.

The couple — she is the former Miss Johnnie Henson — made their first home at Weintert. During their residence there he was called into service during World War I and she resided with her parents at

Weatherford until close of the conflict. They then moved to Ranger where he was transferred by Sinclair Oil Company, and resided there about 17 years before coming to Cross Plains. They were later transferred to Odessa where they made their home until his retirement in 1961 when they came back to Cross Plains and remodeled one of the older places here into the commodious home they now occupy.

"We also spent short periods at small oil camps, the names of which are long since forgotten," Mrs. Burks recalls, "but since the day we first moved to Cross Plains this community has always seemed like home to both of us and the children."

The Tom Burkses are long and active members of the Church of Christ.

"We hope many of our friends will find time to stop in Sunday afternoon and share a few minutes of this happy occasion with us," they said in talking with a Review reporter one day this week.
