## Parade Opens Annual Rodeo Thursday

Plains will be well represented at the parade Thursday afternoon heralding the opening of the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Rodeo this evening.

Cross Plains band will be the Buffalo Band. The parade will form at the depot at the south end of the street and parade to the courthouse and back via the same route to the depot.

Professional bands, Cross Plains, Baird and Clyde will participate, and the local riding organization will be only one of an expected 10 such groups in the parade. Most of the parade riders are expected to take part in the grand entry, opening event of the rodeo, that night. Last year the colorful procession sported more than 397 horses and riders in the initial event.

This year's show is being produced by Walter Alsbaugh, who is said to be bringing to Baird a string of bucking stock capable of challenging world-champion cowboys who annually compete for RCA points in the Callahan County show. The rodeo card will offer both bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling and bull riding in addition to a well-arranged set of specialty acts.

## Election Bulletins To Be Posted Promptly

Returns from both Democrat and Republican primaries will be received in Cross Plains Saturday night and posted on a lighted board in front of the Review building.

Aiding the newspaper staff in compiling and tabulating returns will be Claude Foster,

former public official and close observer of the local political scene.

First returns are expected to be available shortly after the polls close at 7 p.m.

Alton Hornsby, who will hold the Democratic election here, said that incomplete results would be announced at closing

time. Periodic reports will be released thereafter until the counting chore is completed.

Returns from other Callahan County voting boxes will be received by telephone and election judges are being asked to telephone the newspaper — 725-3571 — as soon as counts are finished.

## Rains Brighten Crop Prospects

April rainfall in Cross Plains totaled 7.40 inches, according to government weather records kept by S. F. Bond, bringing the aggregate for the year to 9.16 inches.

Farmers agreed that there had been a "meeting of the moisture" and that the Cross Plains area had one of the best "bottom seasons" in recent years. Prospects for a bumper

harvest of small grain are considered exceptionally good. Only hail now imperils the crop.

Reports from all nearby communities indicated that the rainfall last week was rather uniform throughout this vicinity.

Last month was the wettest April since 1957, when an exact amount of moisture — 7.40 inches — was recorded here. The annual rainfall for that

year grossed 38.58 inches and farmers and stockmen are hoping that the similarities of April will also carry through the remainder of 1966.

All streams ran near bank-full the past week and livestock ponds are reported full.

"We have truly had a million dollar rain; it was wonderful," was the way last week's precipitation was described.

## Big Vote Due On Saturday

Voters will treak to the polls Saturday in both Democratic and Republican primary elections.

It is surmised by some political observers that a record vote could be counted over the county mainly because of high interest in the Callahan County Judge's race and free registrations recently completed.

Alton E. Hornsby, Democratic Precinct Chairman local election judge, said that he estimated 700-800 votes in the Democratic Primary, but added that inclement weather could hold the total vote below that. Jack Tunnell, Republican County Chairman, would not venture a guess on number of votes his party would poll.

Democrats will ballot in the City Hall here with polls opening at 8 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m. Republican election judge George Barnard will preside at the study hall in the high school building. Republican voting places will also be open at Baird, Clyde and Denton Valley. Fire stations at Baird and Clyde will host the voting presided over by J. Bryce Jones and Mrs. Max Judy respectively, and Ed Rasbury will judge at Denton Valley. Same times will govern those boxes.

Democrats will vote at 12 places over the county. They are, other than Cross Plains, Baird, Clyde, Putnam, Eula Opalin, Denton Valley, Cottonwood, Admiral, Rowden, Dudley and Atwell.

## State Department Chooses Local Girl To Teach In Egypt

Congressman Omar Burleson advises of the appointment of Miss Pansy Jo Johnson, daughter of Mrs. W. R. Johnson, who lives nine miles west of Cross Plains, to teach in Egypt during the school year of 1966-67. The appointment came through the State Department.

Miss Johnson has been teaching on the island of Guam the past four years.

The award to Miss Johnson is made under the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (Public Law 87-256), known as the Fulbright-Hays Act. Purposes of the Act are "to increase mutual understanding ... by means of educational and cultural exchange ... to strengthen the ties which unite us with other nations ... and thus to assist in the development of friendly, sympathetic, and peaceful relations between the United States and the other countries of the world."

Under this Act, grants are made annually to about 2,500 U. S. citizens to go abroad and about 6,000 foreign nationals to come here. Since adoption of the original Fulbright Act in 1946, over 28,500 Americans

and more than 70,000 foreign nationals have participated in the program.

Grants are made for university lecturing, advanced research, graduate study, teaching in elementary and secondary schools, practical experience in technical and specialized fields, and consultation and observation.

## Junior Lee Will Run At Austin Saturday

Junior Lee, the only Cross Plains High School trackman eligible for state competition, will leave here Friday, accompanied by Coach Jack Gray, for Austin, where Saturday at 3:20 p.m. he will contest 15 other entries for top class A honors in the mile run.

Plans were for him to work out Friday afternoon, in preparation for the Saturday finals.

Lee, a senior student at Cross Plains High, is making his second trip to the state capitol to run in the same event. "He's going to be hard to beat this year," Gray said.

## Free Food Registering Starts In Baird May 17

Acceptance of applications for surplus foodstuffs will begin at the courthouse in Baird May 17.

Persons eligible for free commodities are those presently receiving Old Age Assistance and any of five other federal programs, as well as those with sub-standard incomes. Recipients must have been a resident of the state for one full year and of the county for at least six months. All applicants presently receiving public assistance will be certified eligible or ineligible by a worker of the State Department of Public Welfare. County Administrator will rule on eligibility on cases or households composed of persons not receiving any type of public assistance.

Although the program is just now being implemented in this county, it is expected that the first distribution of foods will be made in June, the exact date yet to be announced.

Present plans are to establish a distribution point in Cross Plains as well as at the courthouse in Baird. The Cross Plains facility, however, is yet in the tentative stage and its establishment will be dependent upon locating a headquarters and personnel staff to staff it.

To be eligible for the free foods recipients must meet the

requirements. One person may not have resources valued at more than \$300, nor an annual income in excess of \$95 monthly. A couple (or household of two) may not have resources worth more than \$450 or a monthly income of \$150. The standards rise in both cases in proportion to the number of persons in the family or household unit.

Regulations specify that recipients must live in a dwelling. They cannot be transients or reside in a boarding house, hotel, rest home, or take meals in a restaurant.

Establishment of the facility at Cross Plains — in addition to the main point at Baird — began to receive consideration when it was found that nearly 40 per cent of the recipients are expected to come from this immediate locality, many of whom do not own transportation necessary to take them to the county seat for the free supplies once each month. This phase of the program, however, is yet to be worked out by members of the Commissions Court and the Cross Plains City Council.

Most counties adjoining Callahan have had the surplus commodity distribution going for several years. Present plans, though, are the first to implement it locally.

## Bryan Asks Depositors To Withdraw Postal Savings

Postmaster Lloyd Bryan yesterday urged depositors with postal savings certificates to withdraw their funds from Post Offices as quickly as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Johnson.

Postmaster Bryan pointed out that as of April 28, 1966, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. He said that interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

Bryan said that for convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

The Postal Savings System was established Jan. 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract savings of a large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Offices in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks. Today, however, with the growth of banking facilities paying much higher interest rates than the two per cent interest per annum paid on Postal Savings, the System has outlived its usefulness for the American people.

## May Is Important To Area Senior Citizens

R. R. Tuley, Abilene social security district manager, has reminded all senior citizens in Callahan County and surrounding area that the deadline for signing for medicare's doctor bill insurance is May 31.

He said, "May is Senior Citizens Month, and under the new law passed by Congress, it is also the month that persons who reached 65 before March 1, 1966, will have to sign for the insurance if they are to have coverage July 1, beginning date of the insurance."

Tuley urged all senior citizens age 65 or over who have not signed up for doctor bill insurance to visit their social security office immediately, so that they may have protection when the program starts.

Almost all persons 65 or over are eligible for the two types of health insurance under the medicare program, hospital insurance and doctor bill insurance. Social security beneficiaries are automatically enrolled in the hospital insurance program, but persons who are still working or who do not receive social security benefits must sign up for hospital insurance. On the other hand, in order to get protection toward the cost of doctors bills at a cost of \$3 per month, all persons must enroll.

According to Tuley persons who were 65 before March 1, 1966, and fail to enroll before the deadline, May 31, will have to wait until October 1967 before they will have another chance to apply for doctor bill protection. He added that as persons become 65 they should visit their social security office no later than the month before their 65th birthday to have protection as soon as they reach 65.
