Wheat Prices Dictated By Buyers

Cross Plains buyers reported that wheat and other grain prices were dictated by buyers for wheat sold on the open market Tuesday.

Harvesting is expected to get underway in about two weeks and carry through most of June.

Late crops are reported giving greater promise than those planted early. Particularly good yields are expected from an area south of Putnam, west of Burkett and in the Burnt Branch localities.

While the prolonged cloudy weather precipitated some rust in wheat the damage is expected to be very slight, even below that of a normal year.

Oat crops are believed to be less promising this year than wheat, however, acreage planted to that crop was only a fraction of the land set to wheat, say well informed sources.

Some Stores Sate Holiday On Monday

V. L. Hobby, president of Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce, said Monday afternoon that a number of local business concerns would be closed Monday of next week, May 30, in celebration of Memorial Day.

"I have not had time to contact every one and can not say for sure exactly how many firms will observe the holiday," he said, "however, I am assured that a number will, and it is hoped that shoppers will keep the upcoming holiday in mind and that no one will be inconvenienced thereby."

Bids Asked To Build 13 Flood Prevention Dams

Advertisements are now being placed asking bids on the construction of 13 floodwater prevention dams on the Upper Pecan Bayou watershed, in Callahan, Coleman and Taylor counties.

Contracts are expected to be awarded at state headquarters of the Soil Conservation Service

in Temple the latter part of next month.

Two of the lakes will be located in the proximity of Cross Plains. One is on John D. Montgomery land, five miles west of town. The other nearby lake will be on a place owned by Mrs. Kate Womack, about eight miles southwest of here.

Four of the dams are in the Denton Valley locality. Land owners on whose places they are to be built are: Ira Crawford, the Von Wesley Loving Trust, W. L. Cutbirth, Jr. and Laura Mae Yarbrough.

Two lakes are to be located west of Rowden, near the intersection of State Highways 36 and 283. They will be on acreage owned by Frank Windham and Virginia Mullins.

Three other dams are scheduled in Taylor and Coleman counties on land owned by Troy and Leo Chrane.

Most all of the lakes are generally larger than those recently completed in the Turkey Creek Water Control District.

Largest of the planned 13 structures is on the place owned by the Von Wesley Loving Trust, however, even the smallest of the new proposals is of the approximate size of that built on the Dr. Weldon Varner place near Cottonwood, largest of the lakes in the Turkey Creek Water Control District.

Work on all of the upcoming projects will be under supervision of E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area soil conservationist.

Coleman Man Speaker At Burkett Memorial Service

Annual memorial service of Burkett-Adams Cemetery Association will be held Sunday afternoon, May 29, beginning at 2:30 at the Burkett Cemetery.

Dr. J. Ray Martin, prominent Coleman veterinarian will be the principal speaker. Dr. Martin, a widely-sought public speaker, is president of the Coleman school board.

All persons with kinsmen or friends buried at either Burkett or Adams Cemeteries are invited to attend the Sunday afternoon ceremony, which annually is one of the largest attended events of its kind in this section of Texas.

Title Question Delays Housing Project Here

Construction of a 20-unit, \$256,000 public housing project planned for Cross Plains is being held up because of alleged mineral right difficulties in titles to land on which the project is to be built.

The Fort Worth office of the Public Housing Authority, which controls the local development, has postponed construction pending securing of a non-disturbance agreement from oil companies who have held oil leases on the land included in the building sites. Local housing authority lawyer W. B. Wright of Cisco has been instructed to secure the non-disturbance agreements before contracts asking bids on construction will be let.

Mrs. Gene Rhodes, local housing authority executive secretary, said Monday that architects, Fitch and Associates of Houston, have had plans ready for more than a month and are waiting orders from the Fort Worth office to proceed. She added that Fort Worth, in turn, was awaiting the mineral right agreement from Wright.

A condemnation hearing to

clear title on certain plots in the construction site was held several months ago, and at that time it was thought that construction would begin in March. However, since that time the question concerning mineral rights has developed.

It was not known here how long the delay would continue.

Surplus Food Distribution Point O.K. In Cross Plains

A distribution point will be set up in Cross Plains to supply Callahan Countians with government surplus food commodities.

County Judge Byron Richardson announced this week that Cross Plains City Council had given its consent for use of the back section of the City Hall to be used one day monthly for distribution of the surplus food. Richardson said that regular

monthly distributions would be made here on the Thursday following the second Monday of each month. He added, however, that the first distribution date in Cross Plains would be Thursday, June 23. No storage facilities are planned for Cross Plains, but commodities will be brought from storage at Baird.

Initial distribution will be done in Baird June 21. Richardson explained that commodity personnel from Brownwood who have been participating in the program for several years will assist county officials in the first distribution in the county seat.

It was announced Tuesday afternoon that applications will be taken in Cross Plains Thursday and Friday, May 26 and 27. Mrs. Bobby Huckabee will be in the City Hall here from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day to take applications. Enrollment may also be made in the surplus program at the courthouse in Baird. Applications will not be accepted after June 1.

According to Richardson cost to the county will be 18 cents per person for the remainder of this year. Thereafter it will cost \$36 per 100 recipients per year to maintain the surplus project.

Absentee Voting Opens In County

Absentee voting for the Democratic run-off primary began Wednesday morning, May 25, and will continue through Tuesday of next week, May 31.

Date of the second primary is June 4.

Only two races are to be balloted upon by local voters. They are that of attorney general in which Crawford Martin and Franklin Spears are pitted, and that of state representative from this legislative district in which Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge and John Musselman, Jr. of Albany are pitted.

Voting June 4 will be held at all Callahan County voting boxes with the same presiding judges as officiated at the May 7 primary.

City Dads Declare War On Bugs; Attack Today

City of Cross Plains employees began spraying to control mosquitos and flies within city limits today, Thursday.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield and members of the City Council cautioned all persons that the spray was toxic insecticide, containing DDT and a derivative of chlorine. In a public notice published elsewhere in today's issue of the Review, city officials notify that all persons who have bee-hives should take pre-

cautionary measures to protect the insects, and any other such investments which could be damaged by the spraying operation.

Burchfield added that any person with a garden who does not want it or other plants sprayed with the insecticide must notify the City Hall at once. "We will skip garden plots and plants which could be damaged by the spray if we are notified to do so," the mayor said.

2-Year-Old Fights For Life After Snake Bites

A two-year-old Burkett boy is battling for his life in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

He is Greg Hutchins, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Hutchins of Burkett and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. George Hutchins of Cross Plains.

The youngster was playing behind his father's grocery and station at Burkett Friday morning, and about 10 o'clock ran to the store crying and complaining of his leg hurting. At first it was thought that he had fallen on a thorn, but a short while later, through his telling, it was believed that a rattlesnake had bitten him.

Physicians at the Abilene hospital said that there was no doubt that he had been bitten by a rattlesnake, although no reptile was found at the scene.

Reports reaching here Tuesday morning from attending physician was that the youth was "holding his own and had good resistance." It was initially feared that Greg might not survive the bite, and if he did his leg might have to be amputated.

The boy's grandmother said Tuesday, "Doctors now hold hope of saving his life and his leg," however, "they said it would be two weeks before he would be out of danger. Greg's mother, the former Vondean Walters, indicated that braces

would be required if life and limb were saved.

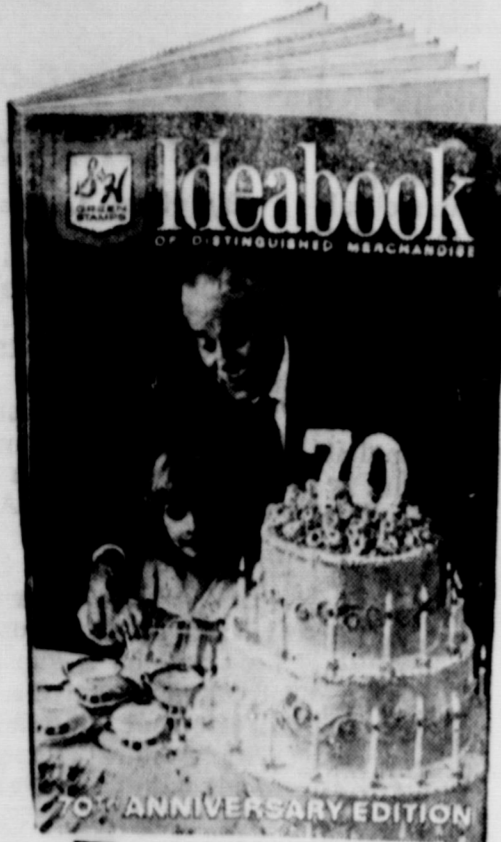
