Faculty Complete If 2 More Accept

If two more recently-elected teachers accept contracts, the faculty for the approaching term will be completed for Cross Plains schools, it was announced yesterday by Superintendent Wayne Ford.

Edward J. Burt of Abilene was elected by the board of trustees in special session Saturday night to become band director, replacing Wayne McDonald who resigned to go to Eldorado.

Veteran Musician
Burt, 40-years-old, took his

bachelor's degree at Sam Houston State Teachers College in Huntsville in 1948 and his master's at Western State College in Gunnison, Colo., in 1959. He has 12 years band experience; two with Grants public school system in Grants, N. M., and 10 years with Lamesa schools, the last eight which he directed the Lamesa High School Band. He will begin duties here Aug. 22.

His family will continue to reside in Abilene and for the first month of school the new director will commute to and from that city. Later, though, he plans to take an apartment here.

Two other teachers, one for science and the other for high school English, have also been elected by trustees, subject to their acceptance of contracts mailed Monday.

"We should hear from them by the end of this week," Ford said yesterday.

One bus driver is yet to be employed for the upcoming term. Applications for that place must be in the hands of the board by next meeting date, Monday night, Aug. 8.

Faculty Of 22

Cross Plains school faculty for the new term will number 22 as compared with 23 last year. This figure does not include the special teachers and teachers aides, employed as a part of the federal government's "aid to the deprived" program.

Of the 22 teachers, 10 will be in elementary school, nine in high school and the other three include two principals and the superintendent.

Old Settlers To Hear Outstanding Speaker

District Judge Walter Ely, of Los Angeles, a native of Baird and descendant of one of the early-settling families in this section of Texas, will be principal speaker at the 28th annual reunion of Callahan County pioneers to be held in the City Park at Cross Plains Aug. 12. He is the son of W. R. Ely of Abilene, widely-known West Texas attorney and former chairman of Texas Highway Commission.

The speaker serves as judge of the U. S. Court of Appeals for the 9th Circuit, which embraces Washington, Oregon, Arizona, Nevada, Montana, Idaho, Alaska, Hawaii and Guam.

He was born at Baird, June 24, 1913, graduated from Abilene High School, took his law degree from the University of Texas in 1935 and his LL.M. from the University of Southern California in 1949. Aside from an impressive record of outstanding service in high office, Judge Ely was a highly-decorated Marine during World War II, having won the Silver Star for "conspicuous gallantry

and intrepidity in action" at Guadalcanal.

He is a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jasper McCoy, who settled here before the organization of Callahan County. It was on the old McCoy ranch that the first gathering of Callahan County pioneers was held in 1936.

3-Inch Rain Soaks Small Area

While most of the Cross Plains area sweltered in summer heat and pastures continued to parch as a result of a prolonged drought, an area between Cross Plains and Burkett, extending through sections of the Cross Cut locality, received in excess of three inches of rain Saturday morning.

Heaviest precipitation was received at the home of Mrs. Elsie Byrd where 3.50 inches was reported. D. L. Riley, west of

Cross Cut, got a slightly lesser amount.

Roger Watson, who lives six miles southwest of town on State Highway 206, measured 3.20 inches. Dick Koenig, the Amerada oil lease and Clyde Thate, all in that general area, reported 2.50 inches. Tommy Connally, who lives about two miles west of the Watson place, received only a light shower.

Heavy showers fell at Brown-

wood Lake Sunday afternoon, measuring up to .90 at the State Park, however, most of this immediate locality again received only teasing sprinkles.

S. F. Bond, official Weather Bureau observer, reported no measurable rainfall in Cross Plains.

"I recorded nothing but traces — too light to measure — all during the month of July," he said.

New 'Phone Rates Told

By unanimous vote in both the Cross Plains and Rising Star City Councils there will be no further opposition to a rate increase asked by Kizer Telephone Company.

The new rates were conditioned on direct dialing to all extended area service localities now existing or being contemplated by the telephone com-

pany. There will now be direct dialing between Cross Plains and May. Service to Burkett and Okra, which may later be developed by the firm, will afford direct dialing from any part of the Kizer system.

City ordinances granting the increased rates were enacted in separate meetings of Cross Plains and Rising Star City Councils last Wednesday night after Randall C. Jackson of Abilene, attorney for the municipalities, advised that under the formula set up by state statutes, an increase in rates was certain to be granted by the courts and the cost of litigation would be excessive and futile.

It's Back To Viet Nam War For Local Wounded Marine

Marine Cpl. Joseph (Joe) Garland Austin, formerly of Cross Plains and son of Mrs. Zelma Austin and brother of Mrs. N. L. Dillard both of this city, was wounded in action in South Viet Nam July 20.

Mrs. Dillard said Monday, "I talked with him by short wave radio phone last Wednesday and he told me, 'I am not hurt very bad.'" She continued that Austin told her that he would

return to Viet Nam as soon as his wound has healed. He was aboard a hospital ship, the USS Repose off the Viet Nam coast in the China Sea when he made the call.

The former elementary student here received fragmentation wounds in the right thigh Wednesday, July 20. He was hurt while on duty with his unit, Communications Company, Headquarters Battalion, 3rd Marine Division. The unit

was stationed at that time only 30 miles from the 17th parallel in Quang Tri Province.

Cpl. Austin has completed just over half of a 13-month tour of duty in South Viet Nam, and is slated for rotation back to the United States in February of next year. He entered the Army in October of 1963. He attended high school in Kermit where his mother taught system several years.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property-taxpaying electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned.

The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:

- (1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;
- (2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and
- (3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no objection to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 39 proposing an amendment to Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, to withdraw Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 18, Article VII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the Texas A & M University System, including Texas A & M University, Prairie View Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at Prairie View, Tarleton State College at Stephenville, Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Engineering Experiment Station at College Station, Texas Engineering Extension Service at College Station, and the Texas Forest Service, the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of one-third (1/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any part of the Texas A & M University System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, Texas A & M University, Tarleton State College, and Prairie View A & M College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval; and for the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements for the University of Texas System, includ-

ing The Main University of Texas at Austin, The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, The University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas, The University of Texas Dental Branch at Houston, Texas Western College of The University of Texas at El Paso, The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute at Houston, The University of Texas Postgraduate School of Medicine, The University of Texas School of Public Health, McDonald Observatory at Mount Locke, and the Marine Science Institute at Port Aransas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds and notes not to exceed a total amount of two-thirds (2/3) of twenty per cent (20%) of the value of the Permanent University Fund exclusive of real estate at the time of any issuance thereof; provided, however, no building or other permanent improvement shall be acquired or constructed hereunder for use by any institution of The University of Texas System, except at and for the use of the general academic institutions of said System, namely, The Main University, and Texas Western College, without the prior approval of the Legislature or of such agency as may be authorized by the Legislature to grant such approval. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than thirty (30) years from their respective dates.

"The Texas A & M University System and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, and The University of Texas System, and all of the institutions constituting such System as hereinabove enumerated, shall not receive any General Revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case

an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue funds.

"Said Boards are severally authorized to pledge the whole or any part of the respective interests of Texas A & M University and of The University of Texas in the income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable. This Amendment shall be self-enacting provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing any obligation heretofore created by the issuance of any outstanding notes or bonds under this Section by the respective Boards prior to the adoption of this Amendment but any such outstanding notes or bonds shall be paid in full, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms of such contracts."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment withdrawing Arlington State College from participation in the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read:

"Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have removed to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

such period of time as would permit a former resident of this State to meet the residence requirements for voting in his new state of residence, and in no case for more than twenty-four (24) months."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Annual Summer revival will be held at the Cross Cut Baptist Church next week, according to the Rev. Cecil Dunning, pastor of the church.

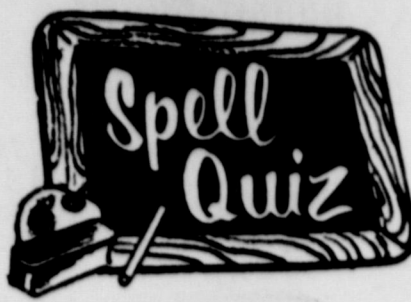
