Harvest Prospects Bright In This Area

If farmers and ranchers of the Cross Plains area appear more radiant than normally there is a justifiable reason. Prospects for bumper harvests of cotton and peanuts are never brighter and livestock pastures are supplied with lush grasses and abundant water.

"Late summer rains have certainly changed the outlook," said R. E. (Hick) Edington, one of Callahan County's largest cotton farmers.

Prospects for some cotton on dryland acreage yielding as much as a bale to the acre and 75-bushel peanuts from unirrigated fields are believed possible, this newspaper learned in interviews with 24 widely scattered farmers.

One Sour Note

Only sour note on the crop outlook was heard from farmers who have had fields under irrigation. Recent rains proved more of a hindrance than a help to some of them. Damon Jones, for instance, had a field about ready for digging when the rains came. The extent of damage suffered from an excessive amount of water remains to be determined.

Interviews with farmers and ranchers, contacted at random, elicited the following reports.

Sterling Odom, who farms south of Rowden and has 106 acres in dryland peanuts and 86 in cotton, believes the present outlook is as good as in 1949, which he described as "the best year I ever had." The 17-year-old peanuts averaged

56 bushels on the Odom place and he believes his present stand will do equally as well if not hit by insects or some other unexpected deterrent.

No Insects Yet

R. E. (Hick) Edington, who has 278 acres in cotton, thinks some of it will yield a bale to the acre if not invaded by insects. Agronomists from Texas A & M have made weekly inspections at his place, five miles southwest of here, and thus far have found no pests. Edington plans, though, to keep a close watch the next few weeks and to start spraying immediately if it becomes necessary. He explained that he had one field planted late — June 16 — which already has half-grown bolls at the bottom of the stalks and squares in the tops.

Burkett Outlook

Alvin Hutchins, who operates a grocery store, market and service station at Burkett, re-

ports that a number of farmers in that locality may reap as much as a bale to the acre cotton crops from dry land fields. "Listening to them talk," he says, "leads me to believe that our community may be approaching one of the best Fall seasons in a long time."

Indications of abundant Fall and Winter grazing appeared evident throughout this entire area.

Farmers of tight-land, particularly those in the areas of Burkett, Cross Cut and Dressy, are now wanting dry, warm days. They are reported ready to sow small grain crops in the hope of providing late December field grazing.

Bufs Open Grid Play In Eastland

Twenty-three Cross Plains High School Buffaloes will open the 1966 football season at Eastland Friday night taking on the Class AA Mavericks.

Kickoff for the 10-week campaign curtain raiser is slated for 8 p.m. at Eastland's field.

The thundering herd will be seeking a revenge victory over the hosts after falling to the Mavericks 12-6 last year in the season finale. Bisons will also try to extend opening game victories to two straight after snapping a five-year drought in 1965 by thumping Early 20-0. Eastland, a former conference foe, moved up to Class AA.

Cite Inexperience

Both teams are bemoaning the fact that inexperience in the

line could hamper initial performances of the squads.

Cross Plains lists seven returning lettermen, but only two varsity letter earners have offensive forward wall experience. They are Mike Ingram, 185-pound senior tackle, and Mike Bright, 155-pound junior end who played guard last season.

Eastland, with eight returning letterman, has four veteran trenchmen back in harness. They are guard Tommy McCullough, a 205-pound senior, junior tackles Boyd Porter, 180 pounds, and Fred Keith, 230, and junior end Tony Lawrence, a 170 pounder.

The Mavericks list just five

Teenage Prisoner Poses Threat To Jailers

Callahan County Sheriff Homer Price presently has in custody a prisoner some people believe to be the most elusive ever jailed at Baird. Not only that but he is described as being daring and unpredictable.

Observers are viewing the situation with interest to see whether or not the 19-year-old escape artist can be held in custody until his day in court.

He is Paul Sutton, who has two spectacular escape attempts to his credit since being apprehended two weeks ago. His latest break for freedom came from Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, where he was recovering from injuries sustained when he jumped from a car being driven by Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox of Cross Plains.

His hospital room was unguarded last week and Sutton placed some pillows in his bedsheet, opened a screen and fled. He was free until capture last week by a security guard at

President Lyndon B. Johnson's ranch near Fredericksburg. Sutton reportedly said he was seeking entrance to the ranch to "see if the President can get me out of this mess."

"LBJ had already flown back to Washington so I don't guess he could have helped him anyway," commented Price.

Charged with burglary of Foster's Grocery and Bishop Chevrolet Company in Cross Plains, Sutton recently surrendered to Edgar H. Heard, Cisco policeman and former Cross Plains city marshal. Heard contacted Deputy Sheriff Cox, who went to Cisco for the prisoner and was taking him to the county jail at Baird when the first escape attempt occurred.

Cox was reportedly driving between 60 and 65 miles per hour, when the handcuffed prisoner opened a door of the car and leaped out. He is said to have skidded and rolled 42 steps after hitting the pavement, sustaining severe cuts and

bruises, several about the head. Cox immediately radioed nearby officers and recaptured the man, who was then placed in an ambulance and taken to the Abilene hospital.

Sutton's escape from the hospital had fulfilled a prophecy by District Attorney Bradley Miles that the man would flee if given a chance.

Miles said his fear was based on the fact that an appeal by Sutton's grandmother that his \$3,000 bond be lowered was re-

fused since the violation of parole jumping was an unbondable offense.

In returning from Fredericksburg, officers did not take Sutton back to Abilene but committed him at the Callahan County Hospital in Baird and placed his room under guard.

Observers are now watching what some say resembles a game of cat and mouse, to see if the teenager will make good on a third try for freedom from the law.

16-Man Policy Committee Searches For Opportunities Inside Callahan

A 16-man policy advisory committee was named at a meeting Thursday night in the courthouse at Baird of the Callahan County unit of Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. The organization will work for development and increased opportunities for all communities in the county.

Two functions were immediately assigned the 16-man committee. They were (1) to se-

lect two directors from this county to work with the central office in Coleman, and (2) to formulate ideas and plans which may be implemented to aid any non-profit organization within this county.

The 16-man committee is composed of: from Clyde, Ferrell Newton, Mrs. Jess Pyeatt, Sam Ramos, Billy Shelton and Dan South; from Cross Plains, Jack Scott, Ted Souder, Duke Mitchell and Manuel Dominguez; from Eula, Billy Mac Coppinger; from Putnam, R. W. Reynolds; from Baird, Roy Gilbreath, L. B. Howard, Jerry Lopez, Frank Morena and Leo Rodriguez.

During the past year L. C. Cash and J. Rupert Jackson of Baird have served as directors for Callahan County.

Big Recreational Center Now Taking Shape

Construction on Lakewood Recreational Center was classed as 93 per cent complete — ahead of schedule — Friday afternoon by Leon Decker of Abilene, consulting engineer, after a tour of the project in company with Gerald Bowden of Cross Plains, general contractor, and E. L. Foster of Eastland, executive, of the Farm Home Administration.

"We found all construction met standard specifications," Decker said, "and there is no reason to believe that the present contract will not be completed well ahead of the mid-October deadline."

Foster expressed himself as being enthusiastic about the possibilities for success of the center, located midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star, and opined that it would attract visitors from a wide area to enjoy the facilities offered.

Foster explained that an application is now in the hands of FHA which asks for a \$45,121.10 loan to supplement the original \$112,000. That amount would be used in building a number of additional facilities. Cost of these were said to be: a miniature golf course \$13,500; fencing of the property \$1,000; a reunion pavillion \$4,256.50;

three golf tee box shelters \$1,351.90; four picnic shelters \$5,558; a floating boat dock \$3,560; a boat landing ramp \$660; children's playground equipment \$1,750 and \$825 to complete the water system.

Although 242 persons paid initial fees of \$20 apiece for original memberships in the Center, Foster declared that a membership of only 200, with some fees from casual use of facilities would retire the original debt and the supplementary loan now being sought.

"The \$5 monthly fee from members is below that usually charged by clubs with comparable offerings," he said.

The debt retirement schedule would call for monthly payments of \$541 for the original loan or \$812 to take care of both it and the supplemental grant now being sought. Operating budget of the club has been tentatively set at \$426 monthly. It was pointed out that \$14,860 annually should operate the club and retire the debt on schedule. Income from 200 memberships would run \$12,000 and additional revenues have been estimated as follows: green fees from non-members \$1,200; fishing and boating fees from non-members \$300; the minia-

ture golf course \$1,200 and rental of the clubhouse and pavillion \$160, making the total based on 200 members \$14,860 annually.

Members of the club's board

of directors are: R. D. (Bob) Needham, president; J. A. Ruthford, secretary and W. E. Tyler, Dave Lee, L. B. Forbes, Jack Jackson, A. A. White and Charles Rutherford, directors.

School's Enrollment Rises; Faculty Now Numbers 27

An increase of 13 was reported in enrollment of Cross Plains schools this week, bringing the total to 473.

The local faculty has been

enlarged to include 25 teachers and two aides.

A second section became necessary in the first grade and Mrs. S. E. Paige, who taught here from 1944 through 1954, is teacher for the added room. She formerly taught at Albany five years and in Kingman, Ariz., seven years.

The present enrollment of 473 was said to include 313 in elementary grades and 160 in high school.

Superintendent Wayne Ford revealed that 370 of the 473 students are presently taking noon meals at the school lunchroom.

"Things are going well and we're grateful for the cooperation of so many parents and patrons in helping us get off to a successful start," Ford commented.

City Resumes Battle On Mosquitoes Here

The battle to keep Cross Plains a healthy and fine place to live was continued last week.

City Councilmen instructed a contractor to spray insecticide to insure freedom from the vexing mosquito reportedly carrier of the disease encephalitis which has reached epidemic proportions in some Texas cities.

No suspected cases had been reported to City Health Officer Dr. Carl J. Sohns Tuesday.

New Peanut Drying Equipment Ordered

Two enlargement projects have been contracted at Cross Plains Grain and Peanut Company, in an effort by the owners to better serve peanut farmers.

In addition to the large peanut warehouse which is to be built at the southwest corner of the firm's property, Glenn Winfrey, partner and manager of the business, said Friday that new peanut drying equipment will be added in time to handle the upcoming crop. It will be the drive-on type, allowing trucks and trailers with false bottoms to drive directly into the dryer, eliminating unloading and reducing costs by \$2 per ton.

Both the warehouse and the drying equipment will be ready for the approaching peanut harvest, Winfrey emphasized.

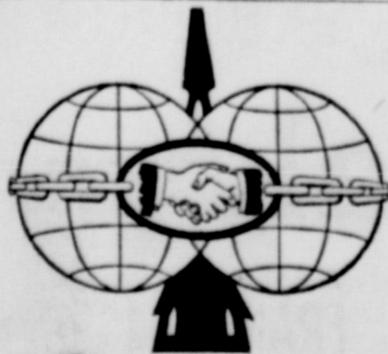

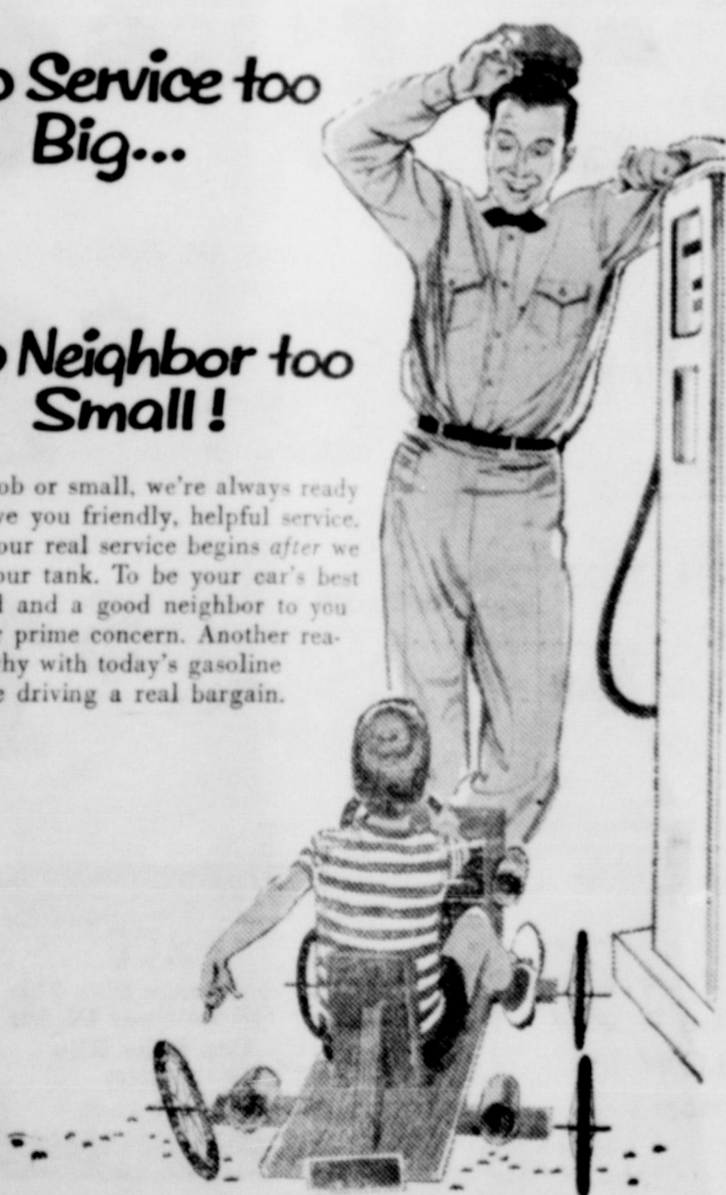

Apply For Medicare Before Reaching 65

Every month 120,000 Americans reach the age of 65. The soon-to-be-65's are asking these days, "When is the best time to sign up for medicare?"

R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene social security district manager, advised Cross Plains area residents that they should sign up two or three months before they reach 65.

If they wait until the month they reach 65 or the following three months, their hospital insurance protection under medicare begins right away, but their coverage under the voluntary doctor bill insurance will not start until one to three months after they sign up for it.

Tuley explained that the medicare law provides a seven-month initial enrollment period for the voluntary doctor bill insurance part of the program. This period begins with the third month before the person is 65, includes the month in which he reaches 65, and ends with the third month thereafter.

"The best time to enroll," he said, "is in one of the three months before you reach 65. If you do so, your protection starts with the month of your 65th birthday. Waiting until that month to sign up will mean the coverage can't start until the following month. And enrollment in one of three months after the month you are 65 can mean a delay of up to three months in the start of your protection."

He further explained that failure to sign up during the seven-month initial enrollment period may mean that the individual will have to wait until the next general enrollment period. This is always the last three months of odd-numbered years. But even then, the older person will have to wait until the following July for the protection to start, and the premium payments will be 10 per cent higher.

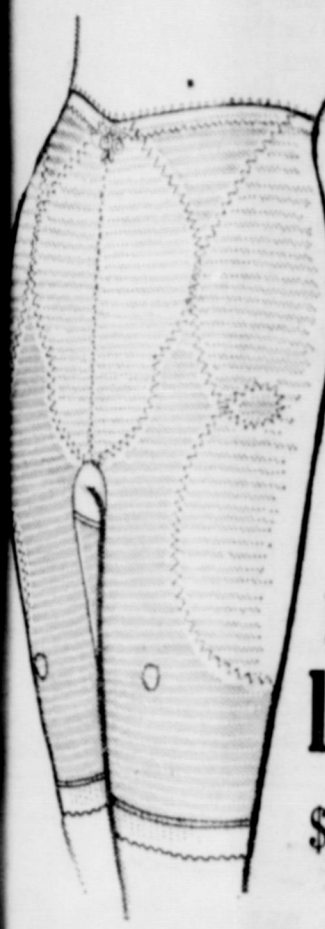

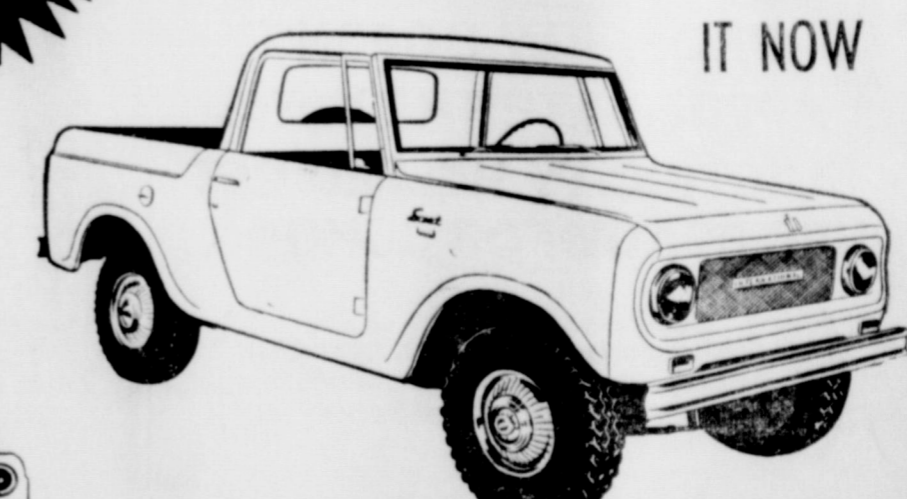

Jesse McAdams, local automobile dealer, was named president of the Philpeco Country Club to fill the unexpired term of Ted R. Smith by the directors recently.

Cross Plains School District and Commissioner's Precinct 4 has asked \$21,191.90 from the federal government's WPA program.

September 6, 1940

Contracts were let Wednesday afternoon for a new fire truck for Cross Plains to replace the antiquated Reo which has served the city since 1926. The new truck will be mounted on a Chevrolet chassis and will be equipped with a 550 gallon per minute centrifugal pump.

Lee Porter, who lives four miles southwest of Cross Plains, brought in the first bale of cotton Wednesday. The 440 pound

bale brought nine and one-half cents and a \$20 premium. A. H. McCord arrived at the gin an hour later with the second bale.

Nearly four inches of rain fell in the Cross Plains area in the month of August.

In a few days Cross Plains is expected to be designated as a site for a government warehouse for peanuts.

September 7, 1945

Cross Plains schools opened here Monday with a student increase of 40 pupils. Pioneer High School transfers account for the increase.
