## \$690,000 Pocketed By Area Peanut Producers

With peanut harvesting near completion in the Cross Plains area, estimates yesterday were that the crop marketed here will approximate 3,000 tons with a cash value of near \$690,000.

Glenn Winfrey, partner and manager at Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Company, said Monday at noon that 2,515 tons had been processed and warehoused here. Harvesting is expected to be finished in another 10 days.

### \$240 Per Ton

"This year's crop has averaged between \$225 and \$240 per ton," he said.

Even before the 1966 crop is completely marketed, Winfrey has started enlargement plans to be completed before next year's harvest begins.

"We will build another warehouse to store bulk and bagged peanuts," he stated, "and have already bought 10 more drying units to give us a total of 38 for next season."

### Bank Deposits Soar

Bank deposits in Cross Plains have skyrocketed as one of the largest peanut crops in history moved to market. The Citizens State Bank reported deposits totaled \$3,601,477.10 at midday Tuesday.

Although harvesting is nearly done, local peanut farmers are reported already planting cover crops to protect fields until Spring planting time.

Quality of hay from this year's peanut crop is said to be exceptionally good, having been undamaged by rainfall or anything to cause darkening.

### TOWN WILL CLOSE ON THANKSGIVING

Thursday will be a holiday in Cross Plains.

Most all business concerns will be closed in observance of Thanksgiving. Some firms, though, will operate on "Sunday schedules".

Cross Plains schools will take a two-day recess, dismissing Wednesday afternoon and remaining closed Thursday and Friday. Classes will resume at the regular hour Monday.

### Bryan Offers Tips For Yule Mailing

Postmaster Lloyd Bryan reminds Cross Plains and area residents that there are only 30 mailing days before Christmas.

"While that may seem like a long time to most people," he said, "it is frighteningly short to postal service employees." It has been predicted that a record number of pieces of mail, eight billion, will have to be delivered between now and Christmas.

"Mailing early and spreading the flow out over the pre-Christmas season is the key to better mailing service," Bryan explained, and continued, "it is hoped that the tremendous co-operation received last year will again be forthcoming."

The local postmaster offered the following mailing tips:

Use ZIP codes on all mail. If codes are needed, call or come to the post office.

Prepare gift list now. Early shopping and early mailing insures delivery in time for Christmas.

Wrap packages well. Include sufficient padding. The parcel may be shipped in a sack with a set of encyclopedia riding on top.

Include a card or piece of paper inside parcel with return address and recipient's name and address in case of wrapping being torn away. Insert a list of the package's contents.

Address gifts and greeting cards clearly. Use first-class postage on cards to insure delivery or return.

Most important, mail early.

Former Cross Plains merchant now a New Mexico law is credited with having led a mob and solved two cases within minutes after occurred.

### PEANUT GROWN BY TRUETT DAWKINS

This has been an exceptional year for peanuts. Many farmers have reaped record yields.

To Truett Dawkins, well-known Sabanno area grower, though, belongs the distinction of producing the only triple-kernel peanut on this season. It was brought into the newspaper office one afternoon last week by one of his neighbors, Cowan Hutton, who called it a "Dawkins dandy."

The nut seems normal in every way with the exception that at one end there is a double shell, containing two usual size kernels, while the other end is just a tiny perfect specimen which can be found in number one Spanish peanuts.

He was quickly captured by King, though, and admitted to having been a look-out for three safe-crackers who were at that time inside a lumber store.

After summoning aid of state troopers and the sheriff's department, King entered the lumber concern and captured another burglar. Two other suspects, however, are still being sought.

Inside the car which had been abandoned by the look-out, officers found jewelry taken a few hours earlier in robbery of a Portales store. The loot contained 28 rings, 17 watches, clock radio and change from a cash register.

At the lumber store robbers had broken into a soft drink dispenser and looted the coins. When interrupted they were in the act of "peeling" a safe which contained \$18,000 in checks.

They had managed to open a smaller safe which was empty, and were well on the way to getting the bigger safe open when they were surprised.

The burglars had managed to break off the hinges and had peeled a section of the door to allow them access to the locking mechanism when police arrived.

The tools taken at the lumber company were all recovered, although drills and drill bits were worse for the wear as they had taken new tools out of stock to make their safe breaking attempt.

## Bible Reading Program Urged from Now Through Christmas

Reading the Bible an "extinct book," Voltaire predicted it would be extinct in years, but continuing desire by the world's exploding population keep the Bible atop best-seller list.

Urging local residents to participate in the 23rd annual worldwide Bible Reading program of the American Bible Society from Thanksgiving

through Christmas, the Rev. Roger Butler, pastor of the First Baptist Church, pointed out that 20 million persons took part in the Bible reading program in 1965.

Today — less than 200 years since Voltaire's death — at least one Book of the Bible is available in 1,250 languages and dialects. By reading the same pre-selected Scripture portion

each day, a spiritual bond is forged between Christians in many lands.

Since World War II when a lonely marine on Guadalcanal sparked the idea by asking his parents to join him in reading the same Scripture passage each day, the American Bible Society has developed the Worldwide Bible Reading program around the globe.

This year the program takes on special significance with thousands of servicemen in Viet Nam expected to participate as did their counterparts during World War II and the Korean conflict.

Worldwide Bible Reading bookmarks, containing a calendar and daily Bible selections, are available at First Baptist Church.

This year's reading begins with Psalms 145 on Thanksgiving and concludes with Luke 2:1-20 on Christmas.

The couple married Nov. 17, 1916, at the home of the bride's parents with the Rev. W. E. Green, a Presbyterian minister, solemnizing the vows.

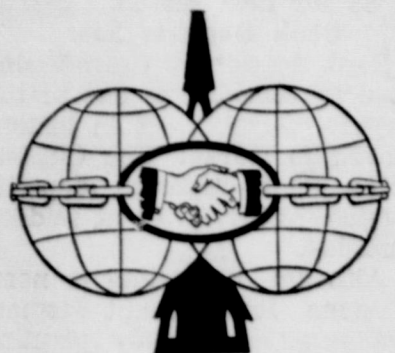

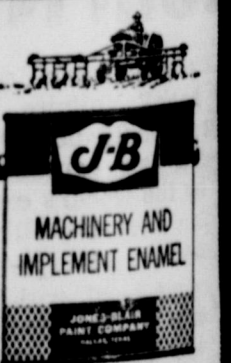

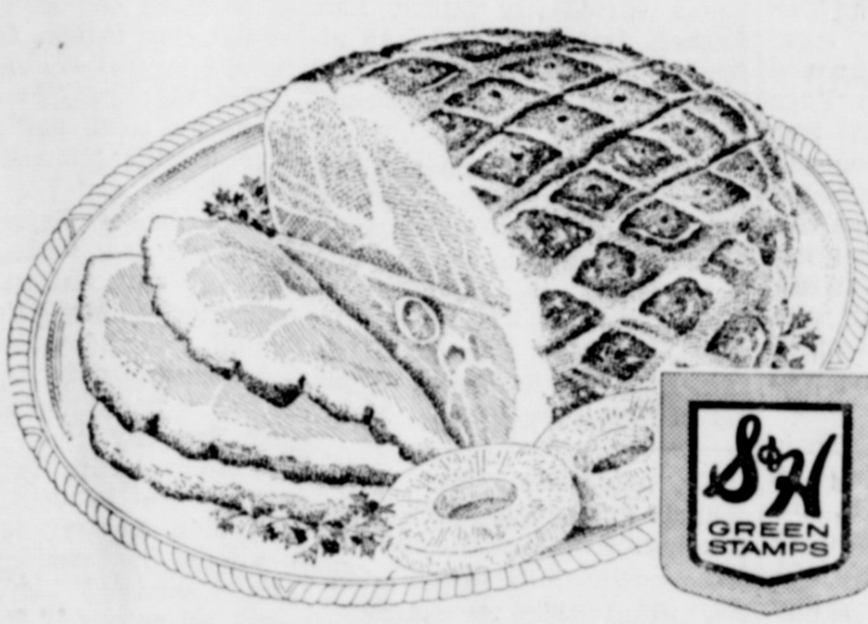

Supper will be provided by the hosting congregation at 6:30 p.m. Formal program will open at 7:30.

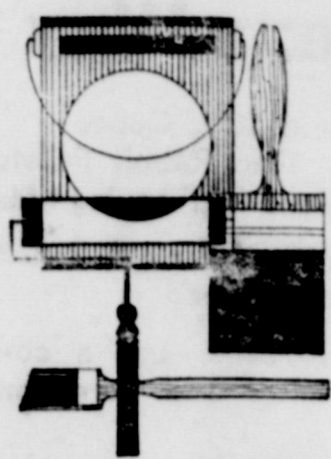
