## Surcharge Talked To Buy New Fire Truck

Cross Plains City Council is pondering the question of setting up a fund to purchase a new pumper fire truck.

A discussion was held at the board's last meeting on the matter but no action was taken. However, it was the consensus of the council that a surcharge of 50 cents on monthly municipal utility bills might be the most economical answer to the question of financing the expensive fire fighting apparatus.

If adopted 50 cents would be added to each utility bill every month. Council members estimated that the additional income would net the fund about \$250 per month. Money would be put into a savings account.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield said, "There would not be any increase in rates for utilities (gas water and sewer) but simply an addition of 50 cents." He added that lawyers had assured the surcharge was legal and could be invoked or canceled at any time.

Both Burchfield and Fire Chief J. T. Foster stated that it is only a matter of time before Cross Plains is forced to purchase a new pumper. The mayor pointed out that the pres-

ent truck is 26 years old and is obsolete. Foster explained that the 1940 model pumper will not meet present requirements for a new Class A truck and is rated a Class B unit.

In a test conducted two years ago under National Board of Fire Underwriter standards, the equipment was graded "... delivered rated capacity (500 gallons per minute) but pressure tests slightly inadequate."

Recently just over \$300 was spent to bring the unit back up approximate condition of two years ago according to a similar test in Abilene. Burchfield said that the council was trying to look to the future to avoid difficulty with insurance rates. Foster explained that the present truck might be sufficient for the next few years, but would not last indefinitely.

It was noted that when a unit fails the semi-annual tests, the State Board of Insurance can cancel credit on fire insurance. It could raise the rate on fire policies as much as 15 per cent, over the present rate.

Cost of a new pumper of adequate size and equipment for Cross Plains was estimated at \$18,000-\$20,000.

Schools fielding both boys and girls teams other than host Cross Plains are: May, Putnam, Clyde, Albany, Eastland and Talpa-Centennial. Brownwood "B" boys and Coleman girls complete the brackets.

### Local Couple Wins Trip In National Sales Campaign

A Cross Plains couple is basking in the luxuries of Nassau, enjoying the delights of a \$1,200 expense-paid trip. They are Mr. and Mrs. Dan Johnston.

Johnston, local dealer for International trucks, won the trip in a nationwide sales contest of the Scout model. He was one of 100 prize winners over the nation. During the three-month campaign, Johnston sold more Scouts than his two nearest competitors combined. He was pitted against cities several times the size of Cross Plains.

The Johnstons left Saturday night for Dallas, where they planned for the overseas flight. They were to be quartered in Nassau's platial Shearson-British Colonial Hotel with every expense including meals and even tips for waiters and baggage handlers.

In the islands the prize-winning dealers were guests for sight-seeing trips into remote areas, taken on deep sea fishing excursions and offered choices of entertainment customarily enjoyed only by the very rich.

Johnston's outstanding sales record during the campaign not only claimed first prize for him, but also swept his zone manager, Gerald Bastain of Abilene, into the winner's circle as well.

The Johnstons are due to land back in Dallas Thursday and the Cross Plains couple will return directly here. He is expected to be at his desk again Thursday afternoon, heading a firm which serves individual and fleet trucking concerns over the entire Southwest.

Both local cage teams, Buffaloes and Buffettes, will see first round action Thursday. Buffettes will tangle with Clyde sextet at 7:45 p.m., and Bisons will go against the male contingent from Callahan County westside in the initial day's wrap-up game at 9 p.m.

Girls consolation game starts trophy play, and followed by the boys third place tilt. Girls championship game is slated to begin at 7:40 with the boys crown going on the line at 9 p.m.

Talpa-Centennial girls are back to defend the title won last year, but Early's Longhorns did not choose to return to defend their crown.

The returning 1965 champions are perennial tourney winners, but may be severely tested in the initial game Friday with Coleman. Buffettes

also loom as a threat to take the crown this year, but first round foe Clyde cannot be taken lightly. Winners of the May-Putnam and Albany-Eastland games could produce a finalist.

Although 1965 boys winner is not back, runner-up May and consolation victor Putnam return. No clear-cut favorite tag can be hung on any of the eight teams, and close, hard-fought games are expected especially in the first round and finals.

## Kizer Removes Fee For Call From Here To May

Kizer Telephone Co., announces the removal of toll charges for calls between its Cross Plains and May exchanges. These toll free calls can now be made by patrons dialing "0" and giving the number being called to the operator. Patrons are requested to limit their calls to three minutes. This action allows all telephones to have equal service, and gives toll free service between all telephones in all exchanges of the Kizer system.

A new reduction in long distance rates within Texas will be in effect Jan. 1, 1967. This reduction will effect calls between points over 56 miles. On three minute calls charges will be from 5 to 15c less and calls over three minutes will carry greater reductions. Also all station to station calls made after 8 p.m. and all day Sunday will qualify for the lower night rate.

Reductions in charges for color telephones are also announced by the Kizer Co. This one-time charge is reduced to \$5 effective immediately.

The reduction in Long Dis-

tance Rates is the 10th such reduction since World War II.



## Cross Plains Girls Capture Crown At 'Prestige' Cage Tourney

Cross Plains basketball Buffettes added four wins to an unbeaten string last week end en route to the championship of the 16th annual Hardin-Simons University High School Girls' Tournament in Abilene.

Cross Plains grabbed the coveted top prize in the prestige meet by whipping Forsan 60-50 in finals, and eliminating Roby 54-30, Wylie 46-40 and El-

dorado 38-35 in other play.

### Team Effort

Cross Plains took the runner-up place in the meet last year. Buffettes found easy going against an out-classed Roby sextet in initial play Thursday. Locals ran up a 37-12 halftime lead, and reserves carried the

fourth quarter of the final game Saturday night.

He also credited Buffette reserves with a large contribution toward capturing the championship. He said, "They played real fine ball in clutch situations under pressure."

### 3 Are All-Stars

In addition to bringing back a three-foot high first place trophy, a trio of Buffettes landed berths on all-tournament teams. Forward Darylene Hargrove, who scored 75 points in the four game, and Guard Carolyn Tunnell were named to the first all-star unit. Valeta Edington, forward, who tallied 82 points, was selected on the alternate elite squad. Mentor Gray was awarded a watch as winning coach.

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### Trail Twice

Cross Plains lasses found themselves behind an opponent for the first time this season against Wylie in the second round Friday, but superior play in the fourth quarter by Guards Carolyn Tunnell, Connie Roby, Linda Purvis and Betty Purvis brought a 46-40 win.

Although Buffettes took a 22-20 lead into intermission, alternate forwards Peggy Purvis, Sue Walker and Vickie Hargrove got Cross Plains the lead in the second period with eight quick points. However in the third, locals trailed 35-32, but guards limited Wylie to five markers while forwards scored 14 in the final stanza. Darylene Hargrove tallied 22, Edington

and Vickie Hargrove nine.

Near disaster struck the Buffettes in the semi-finals early Saturday afternoon. Eldorado staged a fourth quarter rally that almost upset Cross Plains, but fell three points short, 38-35. Although leading all the way, Gray said, "We probably hit the lowest percentage of field goals and free throws of any game all season."

### Final Thriller

Late in the third quarter Cross Plains finally pulled ahead of Forsan in the see-saw championship game and eventually won 60-50. After leading by one at end of first quarter, the Buffettes trailed by two, 22-24, at halftime. A changed offense in the second half allowed Miss Edington to get loose and head the scoring rally. She tallied 34 points, and Miss Hargrove bucketed 20 although

she was double-covered most of the time.

A strong bench again proved its worth in the fourth canto as Judy Albrecht did a creditable job after two starting guards were lost on fouls.

Forsan was a state finalist in Class B last year, as was the Buffettes in Class A. Jayton claimed third place and Merkel took consolation in the meet.

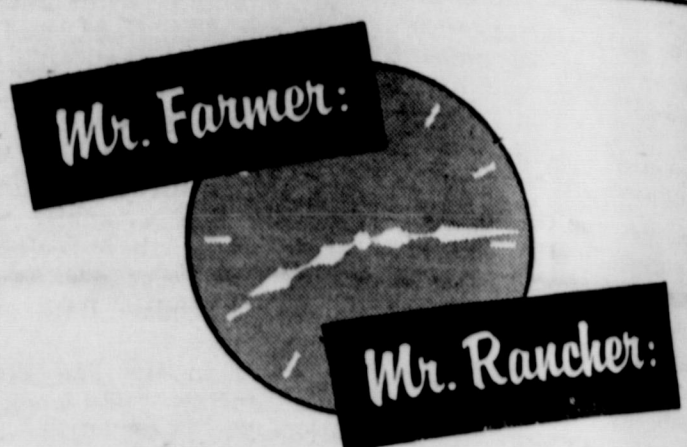

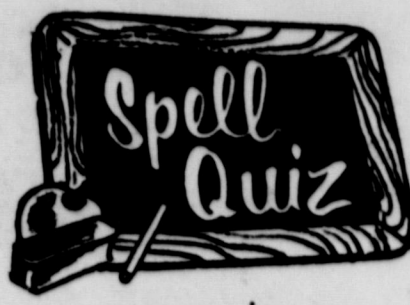
Arcadia has been producing oil in the Cross Plains area about 40 years.
