Cross Plains basketballers registered two straight wins before bowing to Sands and settling for second place in the Board of Community Development Annual Christmas tournament at San Angelo last week. Bisons out-defensed Mason Punchers 39-28 and bowled over Sterling City 59-39 to gain the finals berth. Sands, near Big Spring, decided the Herd 62-46 in the championship game.

Buffis raised season record to 10 wins against seven losses during the tournament.

Buffis began tourney play with an 18-point first quarter against Mason, who tallied 14 points, Tuesday afternoon. Thereafter both units cooled down, and only equalled first period out-puts in the final three stanzas.

Joe Pierce's 10, Randy Walker's nine and Mike Bright's eight points kept Cross Plains out front all the way en route to the 11-point win, 39-28.

Second tilt Wednesday night, again all Buffaloes, 12 on trav-

eling squad, saw action in a 59-39 romp over Sterling City. Coach Carter Williams said, "We were hitting real good, and things might have been different if we had played that kind of game against Sands."

The Herd jumped to a 17-10 first quarter lead and added to the margin in each following frame. Pierce paced Buffalo scoring with 14, and Billy Mac Lee and Walker each bucketed 10 markers. Sterling City had previously defeated Sonora, which won consolation honors, by a single point.

Sands Slows Buffaloes

A well balanced Sands quintet dumped the Bisons 62-46 in finals Thursday night with sharpshooting from the outside. Opposition hooped 26 field goals while the Buffs managed only 16. Although the Herd committed 20 fouls and Sands 16, Cross Plains gained four points at the free toss line.

The two teams played to an 8-8 first quarter deadlock, but Sands jumped to a 29-21 advantage at intermission. Buffaloes stayed in hot pursuit, but loss ground in the last half. Williams rated the winners "a real good outfit" and four Sands players hit in double figures.

Pierce again led Cross Plains attack with 17 markers, and Walker tallied 14.

Buffaloes will not see action again until opening District 9-A warfare at Rising Star Friday, Jan. 13. Cisco was to have been here Tuesday night for a triple header.

March 3: Last day to sign up for 1967 wheat, cotton, feed-grain and C. A. P. Also final date to release or request additional cotton acreage.

April 4: Final date to release

or request additional peanut acreage.

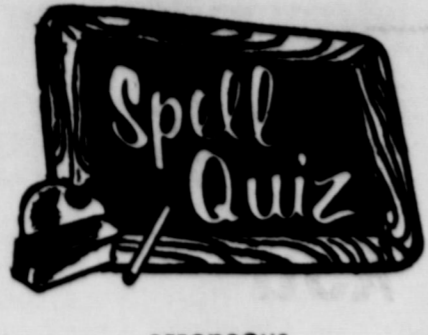
Mrs. Hill had been in declining health for a number of years and was a semi-invalid the past 12. She had been taken to the Abilene Hospital Wednesday of last week.
