Beteween 1920 and 1936 a two-room building was built on the Burkett school grounds and another structure was moved in from the old Independence District. During the Summer of 1936 the first building was remodeled and used as a homemaking cottage until the end of the 1956-57 school year, at which time Burkett High School was discontinued. The second building was wrecked in 1936 as part of the construction project underway at that time.


MODEL WAGON BUILT; BUT MUCH TIME SPENT
