Winner of that tilt will participate in the regional tournament at Denton Feb. 24 and 25.

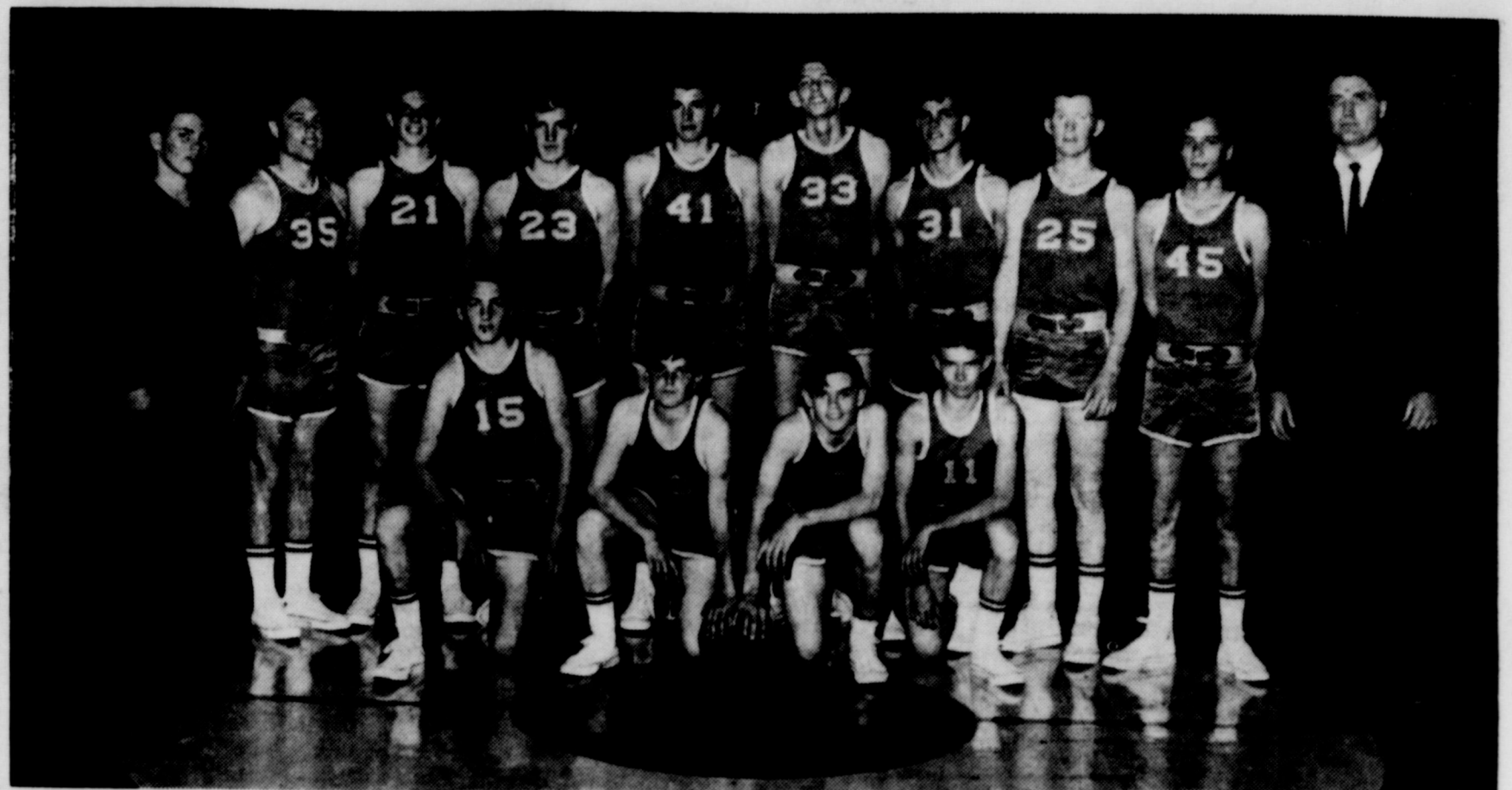

## \$49,500 Construction Job Underway At Club

Work on projects provided for in a \$49,500 supplemental Farmers Home Administration loan to Lakewood Recreation Center has begun.

Bowden Lumber Co. of Cross Plains began leveling sites for picnic facility shelters, tee box shelters, reunion pavillion and parking area and preliminary dirt work for a boat dock and loading ramp was started Friday. A miniature golf course is also provided for, but work will begin later on that, as will the building of a fence on the east and south boundaries.

The supplemental FHA loan also includes money for purchasing equipment for upkeep of the grounds and nine-hole golf course.

Gerald Bowden, contractor, said that he would oversee all phases of construction, and his company would build all structures. High Plains Paving of Midland and Abernathy has sub-contracted the asphaltting of parking areas, and Hornsby Electric of Cross Plains has submitted bids on electrical work.

Contract calls for the project to be completed in 90 calendar days, and directors of the center, which is located mid-way between Cross Plains and Rising Star, hope to open the huge playground this Spring.

Bowden announced that loca- tion of the boat dock and ramp had been changed, and approval received. The ramp will be built north of the old railroad dump on the east side, and docks will be located on the south side of the dump, near the "cut."

The pavillion will be just north of the clubhouse, and tee box and picnic shelters will be scattered over the Center's grounds.

Previously Bowden submitted low bid of \$100,008 for re-build- ing and irrigating golf course clubhouse and swimming pool. That portion of the project was finished several months ago, and over 200 members have been anxiously awaiting the supplemental loan approval and opening. The \$49,500 loan was okayed last month.

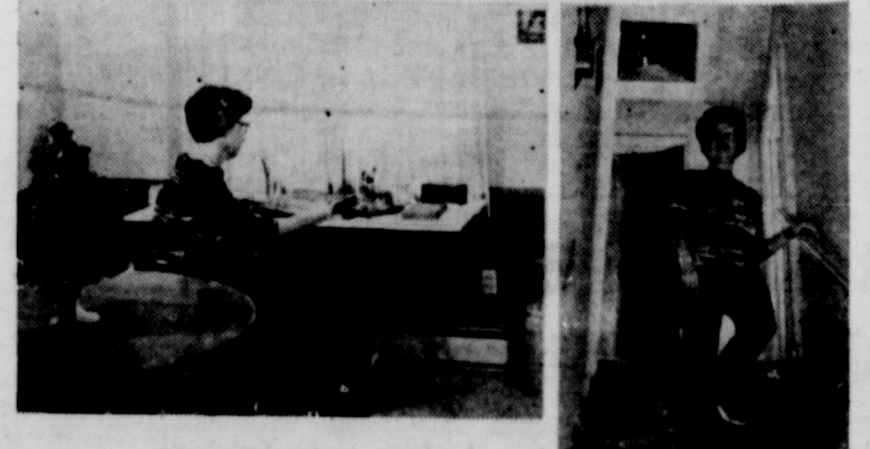
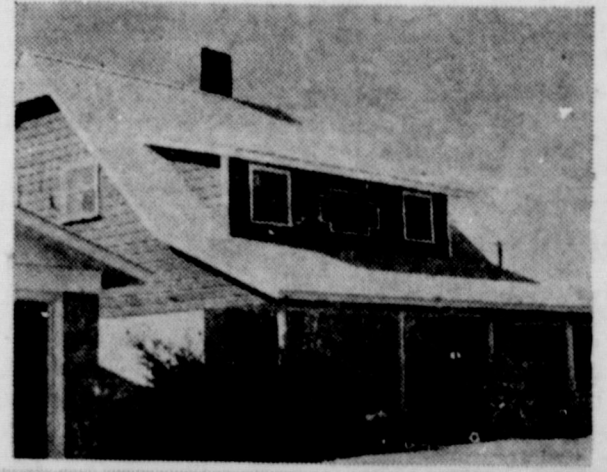

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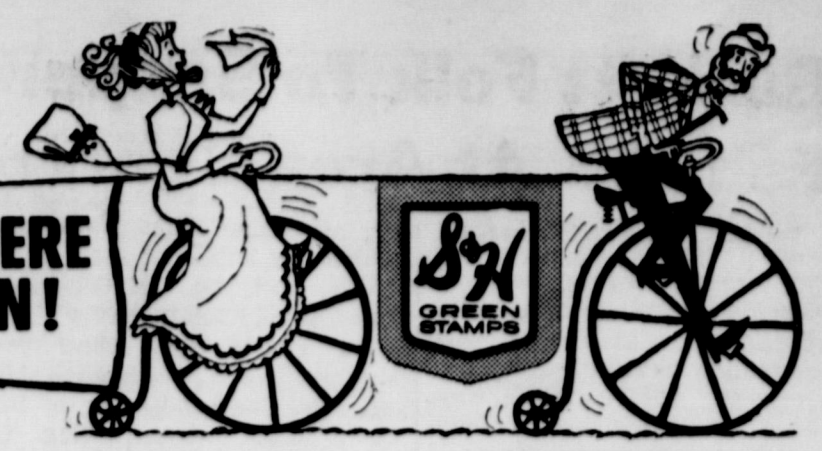
