Deadline Facing Cotton Farmers

Farmers must decide immediately if they are going to plant, release, or request cotton acreage this year. Friday March 3, is the last day to designate intentions.

"There will be no extension of that time," says J. C. Earp, manager of the Callahan County ASCS office in the courthouse at Baird.

Producers are reminded that in order to protect their allotments for future years they must either plant 75% of the allotment, divert from 12 1/2% to 35% and plant some cotton, divert 12 1/2% and release remainder, and release all except one acre and plant and cultivate in a workmanlike manner, or release the entire allotment; provided it is not for three consecutive years.

Fire Chars House Here On Thursday

Fire, thought to have started from a faulty connection on a cook stove, heavily damaged a house owned by Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Smith Thursday afternoon.

The structure, located on Live Oak Street in the southwest part of town, was being occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Al Dounahoe. The family's personal possessions were either destroyed or sustained damage.

Smith told the Review that he planned to repair the dwelling, but no damage estimate had been made. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Major damage was confined to the kitchen by Cross Plains firemen, however, heat and smoke also damaged all other parts of the structure.

\$36,896 Federal Grant Given Callahan Schools

A telegram received by the Cross Plains Review from Congressman Omar Burleson advises of a \$36,896.23 grant for 228 Callahan County school children in low income families. The funds are for the benefit of children between 5 and 17 years of age, as provided under the Elementary-Secondary Education Act.

County Superintendent L. C. Cash explained Friday that the grant amounts to about \$161.82 per student involved.

"Persons intending not to plant any or all of their peanut acreage should release it for re- apportionment to other farmers in the county," he said.

Open House Slated At Local Schools Tuesday

Cross Plains schools will host patrons at an Open House on the local campus Tuesday night of next week. The event will be a part of annual Public Schools Week, which begins March 6 and continues through the 10th.

Superintendent Wayne Ford reported yesterday that visitors are being asked to come to the high school building around 6 p.m. and spend some time in examining exhibits and demonstrations which will be set up

for public viewing. Departments to be highlighted include: athletics in the gymnasium, agriculture displays in the vocational agriculture building, experiments underway in the science laboratory, orientation

at the library, girls activities in the homemaking cottage and modern methods employed in music instruction at the Band Hall.

The tour of exhibits is due to be completed before 7 p.m. at which time refreshments will be served in the school cafeteria.

At 8 p.m. visitors will be assembled in the school auditorium to hear an address by Burl King of Abilene, Taylor County Tax Assessor-Collector, who is to speak on financing public education.

The current observance of Public Schools Week is in celebration of 113 years of public schools in Texas.

"We're hoping to have a large representation of not only parents and guardians of students at Tuesday night's event," said Supt. Ford, "but friends who seldom get an opportunity to look in on the scholastic program."

Earp Explains Wheat, Feed Grain Programs

Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office at Baird has issued further explanation of similar programs concerning wheat and feed grain.

In order to be eligible for payment on one farm in either the wheat or feed grain programs, acreage on each nonparticipating farm, in which the producer has an interest, must not exceed the total feed grain base or wheat allotment it was noted. The producer must also comply with all commodity allotments on the participating farm.

J. C. Earp, office manager, also pointed out that a landowner cannot escape the responsibility for feed grain base or wheat allotment being exceeded by leasing or cash renting part or all of the farm. He continued, "If a landlord wishes to participate in either program, he should make certain the rental agreement prohibits excess feed grain or wheat acreage."

Church Of Christ Begins Gospel Meeting Monday

A gospel meeting will begin at Cross Plains Church of Christ Monday night, March 6, and continue through March 12.

Evening services will start at 7:30 p.m. Morning services are scheduled Tuesday through Friday, beginning at 7 o'clock. Usual schedule will be followed at Sunday worship services.

Evangelist for the meeting will be Claude A. Guild, who served as minister of the Church of Christ here in 1938-39, while a student at Abilene Christian College. He is well known throughout this area, having held revival meetings at Cottonwood, Burkett and Rising Star.

After graduating from ACC, he did extensive missionary work in Alaska, Canada and the northwestern portion of the United States. He returned to Fort Worth where he has been associated with Riverside Church of Christ 13 years, six as a local preacher and seven as a missionary.

He served as president of Columbia College in Portland, Ore., from 1954 to 1961. At the time he returned to Texas he became president of Fort Worth Christian College, which position he held three and one-half years. He resigned that post to return to fulltime work in the ministry.

In May, he and Mrs. Guild will go to Australia to lead a three-year mission project at Perth. The meeting in Cross Plains will be one of his last in this country before departure for Australia.

Dublin Beats Buffaloes 61-59 In Playoff Game

A thirteenth straight victory and a berth in the Region II-A basketball tournament at Denton eluded Cross Plains Buffaloes Tuesday night of last week at Ranger in a preliminary play-off game.

Dublin Lions, District 10-A kings, nipped the Herd, District 9-A champions, 61-59 before a large, howling audience.

An old nemesis, missing free shots returned to plague the Buffs in their bid for a region tourney spot. Cross Plains sank only seven of 17 charity tosses, 41 per cent, while Dublin connected on 15 of 21, 71 per cent.

Buffaloes countered with more field goals and a better percentage from the floor, but the one-on-one foul spelled the Herd's doom. Buffs collected 26 two-pointers while the Lions tallied only 23, but the six point margin from the floor failed to equal the eight points lost at the free toss line.

What would have been an equalizing two free shots were canceled by Buffs stepping over the lane lines too quickly. That mistake had not been made by Cross Plains in 29 previous games this season.

Although Bisons were stopped in bi-district play, it was a successful campaign. Cross Plains won two high places in three tournament tries, the conference championship for the first time in 11 years, and rolled up a 22-8 season record, helped by an 8-0 District 9-A mark.

Coach Carter Williams said, "Although it is disappointing not to advance further, we had a good season."

The District 10-A winners took command of the game almost from the beginning, but a scrappy Herd kept the score close through most of the first half. Although Dublin led by nine points at one point in the first half and seven at intermission, Cross Plains rallied in the third and fourth stanzas.

Buffaloes had cut the margin to three points, 43-46, at beginning of the final eight minutes. Then late in the final frame Cross Plains got a three-point edge, 57-54, but Dublin center Gary Greenway connected on two baskets in the final 90 seconds and turned the tide in the Lions favor.

The famed Cross Plains press forced 22 turnovers, but loose play by the Buffs nixed the hoped for easy baskets.

Buff Joe Pierce bucketed 27 points in the losing cause on 11 field goals and five free tosses. Randy Walker and Ricky Jones both counted 13 points on identical six field goals and one charity connection. Billy Lee got four points and Jerry Strickland counted two to round out scoring.

Bryan Spurger led Dublin with 20 points.
