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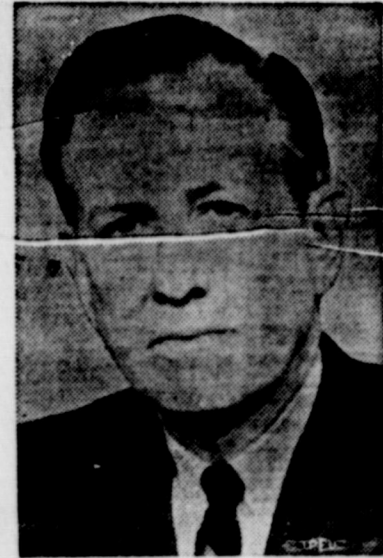

Burleson Coming Here To Inspect New Lakes

"The annual Spring tour with Congressman Burleson will afford an opportunity for inspection of the conservation program on farms and ranches of the area which is so vital to the safe functioning of flood prevention dams," said E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area conservationist, in Cross Plains yesterday.

All persons interested in soil conservation are being invited to join the tour at 8:30 Tuesday morning. The trip will be concluded at the White Ranch, near Abilene, where luncheon will be served and Congressman Burleson will address the gathering.

Trustees Re-Elect All Local Faculty

Twenty-three teachers in Cross Plains school system have been re-elected for the school year of 1967-68.

Mrs. S. E. Paige, first grade instructor, asked not to be tendered a contract for the ensuing year due to her planned retirement. Superintendent Wayne Ford said yesterday that it was not yet known whether or not next year's enrollment would justify a replacement for Mrs. Paige.

Conservationists in the Middle Clearfork Soil and Water Conservation District will tour the Upper Pecan Bayou watershed Tuesday of next week.

Plans call for visits at recently completed lakes on the Frank Windham ranch west of Row-

den, at the W. L. Cutbirth, Jr. place 10 miles south of Baird, and the Leo Chrane place in the Oplin area.

Trippers will assemble at 8:30 a.m. at the roadside park on U. S. Highway 283, one mile south of the intersection of 283 with State Highway 36.

Tenants Move To Housing Projects Here Wednesday

First occupants of 20 new Cross Plains Housing Authority apartments were to be moving in Wednesday.

Mrs. Gene Rhodes, local housing board executive secretary, said Tuesday, "We took possession at 9 a.m. this morning."

The \$202,000 contract was finished 114 calendar days ahead of the date specified at the letting of the bid late last

year. Deadline called for was July 12.

Housing Not Full

Mrs. Rhodes said that the 20 dwellings were not all taken as previously thought. She said, "Some of the applicants did not qualify, and some have changed their minds." She added that she will be in her office, located on the northwest corner of the downtown site the remainder of

this week for those who wish to inquire about residence there.

The local secretary opined that it would take approximately 90 days to completely fill the units.

Final inspection of the project has been made. Only two major portions of the development have not been completed, on which the contract is still open. An alarm or emergency system which has been incorporated into the elderly apartments is not complete because of delay in acquiring parts. Sodding of the lawn at both sites, aged downtown and general in the northeast part of the city, will be started next month.

"So far as I know," Mrs. Rhodes stated, "all members of the board are delighted with each phase of the project." She explained that the contractor, B-F-W Construction Company of Temple, did a good job, and we are real happy with it. Presently Mrs. Rhodes and a maintenance man will manage the unit here.

Fire Department For Burkett Is Pondered

A volunteer fire department may be organized at Burkett.

All men of the community, including farmers and ranchers who reside outside the village, are being asked to meet at Burkett Community Center Monday night, March

27, to discuss formation of a fire company.

Plans call for procurement of fire-fighting equipment which would be available for use both inside and out of the Burkett townsite.

Monday night's meeting has been called by Gilder Adams.

Carolyn Tunnell Makes All-Texas Cage Squad

For the first time in history of Cross Plains High School a local basketball player has won a place on a first all-state team.

Last week the honor came to Carolyn Tunnell, 18-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Tunnell. She is a senior and one of the Buffettes' tri-captains. Miss Tunnell, who has earned four cage letters, was a starting guard for the Buffettes for the past two years, assigned primarily to defense the post player. She was a leading rebounder, and did an outstanding job all season according to Coach Jack Gray.

All-State Team
Sports writers covering the girls Class A state tournament selected the following as members of the elite squad: Carolyn Tunnell of Cross Plains, Mary Rosebrock of George West, Pat Edwards of Brownsboro, and Susan Britton, Judy Glover and Vicki Sanders of champion Springlake of Earth.

Miss Tunnell led a trio of outstanding guards on the most successful basketball team ever fielded by Cross Plains schools. The Buffettes were state Class A runners-up, and posted a 32-2 season record.

Additional Laurels
In regular season play, the local all-stater was chosen on two all-tournament units, Hardin-Simmons University girls meet and the annual Cross Plains tourney.

Other accomplishments during her high school career include Buffalo Band librarian for four years, vice-president of the junior class and Cross Plains High School's 1967 Future Homemaker of Tomorrow of the local FHA chapter of which organization she has been a member the past two years.

The local senior plans this year, as last year, to participate

in the interscholastic League competition in number sense and slide rule. She won second in the district meet in slide rule contest as a junior.

Miss Tunnell plans to enter Texas Technological College at Lubbock next Fall.

Rising Star Hospital District Bill Introduced In State Legislature

A special bill has been introduced in the Texas legislature which would authorize the creation of a Rising Star Hospital District. It would be composed of portions of Eastland, Brown and Comanche Counties.

Styled House Bill 1106, the proposed legislation was introduced by State Representative Burke Musgrove of this district.

The district, which would coincide with the Rising Star independent School District, would be given all the powers and duties that hospital districts are given, including the taxing power. However, the district would not be able to tax more than 75 cents per \$100 assessed property valuation.

Before the district could actually be created, a petition signed by at least 25 qualified taxpaying voters within the district would have to be submitted to the Eastland County Commissioners Court, which would then call an election on the issue.

The district would be man-

aged by a board of five directors which would be elected.

Recreation Center Gets \$1,720 In Finance Drive

A financial campaign being made for Lakewood Recreation Center has thus far resulted in \$1,720 being raised. A goal of \$5,000 had been set.

It is pointed out that in obtaining the \$167,000 loan from Farmers Home Administration to build the Center, no provision was made for furnishings and equipment in the clubhouse. Too, failure to get open last year necessitated pre-paid dues for four months, which had been made by 225 members, being used to meet first installment on the mortgage.
