The Rev. H. Grady James of Oklahoma assumed his duties as pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church in Cross Plains as of Sept. 1. He will also be the pastor of the church in Comanche.

He and Mrs. James will live in the manse in Comanche. They moved to Comanche from Tahina, Okla., where he has been pastor since October of 1963.

Mr. James graduated from the Austin Presbyterian Seminary in 1935. That same year he was married to Miss Treasure Tenney in Austin, by the late B. K. Tenney, brother of the bride. Their first pastorate was in Tahina. They had two daughters.

Other pastorate served by Mr. James are Wewoka, Okla., Cisco and Fairfield, Tex., the Larger Parish in Durant, Okla., and for four years he was superintendent of the Goodland Presbyterian Children's Home near Hugo, Okla.

Treasure James died in 1960 in Hugo. In 1964 Mr. James married Mrs. Alice Wade Winnie. Mrs. James has a son by a former marriage.

While in Oklahoma, the Rev. James was the moderator of the Synod in 1937 and was stated clerk of the Synod from 1943 to 1953.

New Lights And Markers Ordered For City Streets

Cross Plains streets are to be brightly lighted and plainly marked.

City councilmen have approved both projects and authorized placing orders for materials. The two improvements are expected to be completed by Thanksgiving.

The street marking project came after the Rev. Roger Butler and O. B. Edmondson, acting as a committee from the Chamber of Commerce, made a study of the town and determined the number and type of street signs necessary to plainly mark all public thoroughfares. They met with the City Council, outlined their proposal and were given an official okay, together with a request from city dads that they represent the incorporation in making the purchases, expected to total \$990.

Modern Markers

The type of street sign selected for Cross Plains is of sheet aluminum with reflective lettering. It is a six inch sign with four inch letters and is the design which has been adopted for all future installations in both Abilene and Brownwood. The Rev. Mr. Butler, who visited both cities and made an intensive study of the project, describes the new type

sign as one which is not only attractive and plainly visible, but exceptionally durable.

"It is something which I believe our people will appreciate," he said.

Attractive Town

John Pruet, local manager of West Texas Utilities Company, outlined the street lighting project which councilmen approved. It calls for changing 38 existing incandescent street lights to the brighter (8,000 lumens) mercury vapor lights, as well as adding 40 more mercury vapor lights of the same brightness at other intersections throughout the city. The new type lighting will cost the city approximately \$109 more monthly, but will give a total of 126 bright lights placed at strategic points over the town, including illuminations on the school campus.

"Cross Plains should be one of the brightest small towns around when the lighting project is completed," Pruet said, "and I know it will be helpful to home owners and the general public."

Local Riflemen Win In State Competition

Two local sportsmen won high places in the state championship of bench rest shooters at Midland Sunday.

Jim Gilmore, presently of Abilene and son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Gilmore of Cross Plains, placed third overall in Class I Hunting Rifle matches. J. L. (Pokey) Bonner was fourth overall in Class II Hunting Rifle.

Gilmore won the 200-yard championship with a score of 240-9X out of a possible 250, and placed fifth in 100 yard competition with an aggregate of 243-12X.

Bonner claimed first place in the 100-yard, Class II match scoring 226-5X, and was fourth in the 200-yard contest totaling 218-2X.

Eastlanders Buck Herd 21-12 In Season Opener

An explosive 155 pound junior halfback almost single handedly defeated the Cross Plains Buffaloes for the Eastland Mavericks in the season opener in Buffalo Stadium Friday night.

Eastland's one-man wrecking crew is Steve Wilson. He scored 19 points, intercepted a Buff aerial which set up a touchdown and rambled for 173 yards rushing on 27 carries.

Although the Buffaloes bowed 21-12, the Herd accomplished a feat it took them eight games to do last year. Bisons scored a touchdown offensively on the second possession of the pigskin, an achievement denied the Buffs until the Early game in 1966.

Buffs Take Lead
Buffaloes moved 80 yards in 14 plays in the first quarter Friday, and took a 6-0 lead with 48 seconds left on the clock.

Wingback Randy Montgomery capped the march with a brilliant 15-yard broken field run for the tally. He started around left end, cut diagonally right and romped across the double stripe untouched. Quarterback Ricky Jones circled left end for the two-point conversion, but an illegal motion penalty erased it. A pass from Jones to Montgomery was incomplete on the second try.

Two key plays kept the drive going. First was a 20-yard toss to end Bo Barr with a 15-yard penalty attached. Second was a pass interference call on the Mavericks on the 19.

Eastland blitzed to the Buff 19 before defenses held, and Elisons began moving upfield. Then Eastland safety Steve Lund swiped a Cross Plains pass setting the Mavericks' first tally in motion.

Wilson capped the 51-yard, 11-play drive with a one yard blast at right guard. He kicked the point and with 38 seconds left in the first half Eastland led 7-6.

Scoreless Third
Neither team could score in the third period, although Bisons had to choke off two Maverick thrusts. Buff Safety Montgomery stole a pass early in the stanza at the Herd's 11, and Cross Plains defenders halted another at the eight.

Maverick Wilson broke loose on a 67-yard gallop, running through two tackles in the process, to give the visitors a seven point advantage early in the last stanza. A pass from quarterback Eddie Kincaid to right halfback George Simms rolled to score to 15-6.

Herd Counters
Buff safety Jerry Strickland swiped a long aerial at the Herd's 18 which set up the local's second touchdown. Two pass completions to fullback Vernon Johnson and end Mike Bright, plus a 12-yard scamper by Johnson, netted Cross Plains a first on the Buff 42. Jones then found Montgomery behind defenders with a missile in the tight flat. Fifty yards later Montgomery was bounced out of bounds. Strickland angled left eight yards and the touchdown. A pass went awry on the conversion, and Eastland lead 15-12 with 4:12 left.

The fighting Buffaloes quickly repulsed Eastland offense, but Wilson intervened to steal a pass on the Herd's 27. From that point it took Wilson seven carries to cross the goal. Eastland the victory 21-12 with six second remaining in the game.
