## Old Age Assistance To Be Raised October 1st

State Representative Burke Musgrove announces that Old Age Assistance checks and grants to the permanently and totally disabled will be increased effective with the October payments.

Musgrove explained that the increase in payments is a result of the larger appropriations for these two programs made by this last session of the Legislature. Musgrove pointed to the fact that two counties in this legislative district, Eastland and Callahan Counties, rank fifth and seventh in the state for the percentage of population over 65 years of age.

The amount of increase in

payments was revealed this week to Musgrove by Burton G. Hackney, Commissioner of the State Department of Welfare. Old Age Assistance grants will be raised \$4 per month above the amount currently recommended by the local worker, therefore making the maximum Old Age Assistance grant \$104 per month. Effective also in October, all aid to permanently and totally disabled will be raised \$5 per month above the amount currently recommended by the local worker. The maximum aid under the program will be increased to \$79 monthly.

Musgrove said that each recipient will receive an individual explanation along with the October check.

# Consolidations Leave 7 Voting Boxes In County

Consolidation of Callahan County voting boxes, reducing the number from 11 to seven, was approved by the Commissioners Court in session at Baird Monday afternoon.

The action was taken to comply with a recent enactment of the Texas legislature, which specified that all boxes with less than 50 registrants in 1964

Atwell and Cottonwood voting precincts were merged with Cross Plains.

Rowden and Dudley voting precincts were combined with Oplin and Denton Valley and reformed. Polling places will henceforth be at Denton Valley and Oplin. Dividing line between the two begins at the west boundary line of the county, along what is known as the Caldwell Road, one mile

south of Dudley, and goes along this road about two miles past FM Road 604, where it then turns south for about four miles, thence directly east crossing the Coleman-Baird pavement (Highway 283) at Pecan Bayou Bridge, and onward east to the line of Commissioners Precincts two and four. Persons living north of that dividing line will vote at Denton Valley and residents to the south at Oplin.

The consolidations leave Putnam and Cross Plains the only polling places in their respective Commissioners Precincts, two and four.

Commissioners precinct one will continue to have Baird, Clyde and Eula.

Commissioners Precinct two will have Denton Valley and Oplin as described by the new

boundary line, which was said to be necessary to leave Commissioners Precincts unchanged.

Commissioners had delayed the consolidations until just five days before the deadline, hoping to work out arrangements for preserving at least some of the rural boxes. When efforts proved futile Monday's action was taken to meet requirements of the new law, said County Attorney James Paul Shanks.

When new election officials are appointed, representation is expected to be given the boxes which were necessarily consolidated with larger polling precincts.

County Judge Roy Gilbreath reminded Tuesday morning that since the changes in voting precincts does not become effective until Jan. 1, 1968, voters at Cottonwood will ballot at the general election there on Nov. 11 as heretofore.

## Baird And Cross Plains Renew Gridiron Rivalry

Cross Plains Buffaloes will attempt to annex the mythical gridiron championship of Callahan County in Baird Friday night.

It will be the 37th renewal of the Baird-Cross Plains football rivalry beginning at 8 p.m. Buffalo Herds have claimed 18 wins, and Baird Bears have won 16 times. There have been two ties. In 1925 and 1945 two games were played by the two teams.

Cross Plains is fresh from its first win of the year. Buffs defeated Clyde last week 32-14, the largest score a Herd has managed since 1965 when Ranger was victimized 34-8. Bisons have lost two.

Baird hopes to end a losing string which runs back two years, although Baird almost upset the Bisons last year, finally bowing 14-7. Although the county seat Bears have not triumphed this season, they have tangled with two Class A powerhouses, and fell to Santa Anna 33-13 and Merkel 41-6.

Both units have met the Class AA Eastland Mavericks, and both lost, Baird 32-8 and Cross Plains 21-12. Buffaloes have tallied 56 points this season, but have given up 93, while the Bears have racked up 27 and allowed 106. On that basis, Bisons would seem to be favored in Friday's clash, but in the old rivalry records and statistics mean little.

Fourteen lettermen return to the Bears' den although some played only a partial season last year, and a quartet of others are back from the 1965 season. Baird sports a solid backfield. It includes returnees Franklin Alexander, 185-pound junior Tommy Townsend, 135-pound sophomore, and halfback Donnie Rowe, 145-pound sophomore.

Size is the big asset in the Baird forward wall. Donald Barron, 190 senior, and Eddie Curtis, 220 junior, ably man tackle slots. A pair of two-year lettermen are guards, Bun Barry, 140 senior, and John Lambert, 155 junior. Three monogram winners return at end including junior Chris West, senior Allen Lovell and junior Bryon Reese. Two experienced centers are on the roster in 185-pound Mike Sadler and 150-pound James Collins.

Buffaloes incurred no injuries in the Clyde scrap, and will be in top physical shape for Friday's tussle barring practice misfortunes.

Weak on the ground in first two games, Cross Plains rushed for 228 yards last week, the best since Nov. 5, 1965, the Ranger game.

## Soldier Known Here Decorated For Valor

The Silver Star Medal, the nation's third highest award for gallantry in action, and the Purple Heart Medal, for wounds received while fighting in Vietnam, were recently presented to Pfc. James W. Robinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wyatt Robinson, 145 South Avenue 58, Los Angeles, former longtime residents of Cottonwood. The presentation was made by General James K. Woolnough during a visit to Letterman's Hospital.

The citation accompanying Pfc. Robinson's award reads in part "... he distinguished himself by heroic actions on 27 February 1967 ... Pfc. Robinson was seriously wounded by one of the initial mortar rounds which landed in the base camp his company had established in the Filhol Plantation. He bandaged his own wounds then vainly attempted to save a mortally wounded comrad. When his efforts failed, Pfc. Robinson crawled under intense mortar and automatic weapons fire to another bunker and showed a squad leader how to administer morphine. Pfc. Robinson, still in pain from his own wounds, then crawled to another bunker to tend the wounds of other men.

He had to be helped into the bunker where he administered aid to the wounded for the remainder of the battle. His actions reflect great devotion to duty and a deeply instilled sense of compassion. His courageous acts were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army."

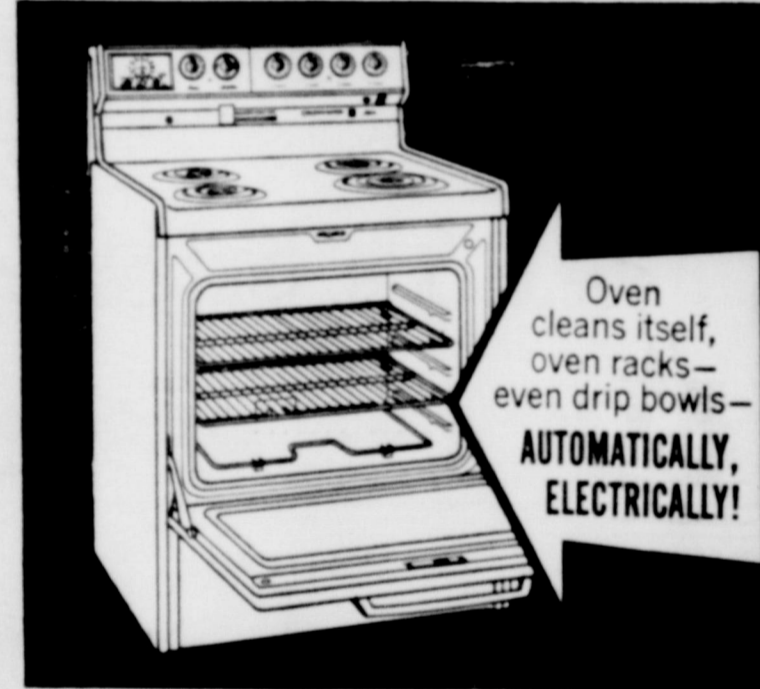

# Buffalo Second Half Rally Quiets Clyde Team 32-14

A 20-point third quarter lifted Cross Plains Buffaloes to a 32-14 victory over the Clyde Bulldogs here Friday night. It was the Herd's first win of the season while losing two, and it broke a seven-year losing streak to Clyde by the Bisons.

After playing on almost even terms during the first 24 minutes, Cross Plains thundered back in the second half capitalizing on breaks to out-distance adversaries from the county's west side. The first half ended deadlocked 6-6, but wingback Randy Montgomery ran the second half kickoff back for a touchdown which was followed by an intercepted pass tally and a score on a fumble recovery.

Cross Plains used a punishing ground attack to clip the Clyde unit. Buffs rushed for 228 yards. Tailback Jerry Strickland accounted for 137 of the yards on 20 carries, an average of 6.85 yards.

Buffalo defenders allowed Clyde just one first down in the second half.

**Buffals Take Lead**

For the third consecutive game, Cross Plains took a 6-0 lead in the first quarter. Quarterback Ricky Jones capped the 59-yard, 10-play drive with a one-yard sneak. He was stopped short on the two-point conversion try. The tally was set in motion when guard Vern Webb and linebacker Rusty Beggs collaborated to recover a Clyde fumble.

Following the pattern set in previous Buffalo games this year, Clyde retaliated to knot the score. Herd offensive efforts were hampered by mistakes. In the second quarter left halfback Mickey Blanks cracked over from the one on fourth down, but a pass fell incomplete on the conversion try. It was gainers of 11 and 15 yards by Clyde fullback Jim Alexander that carried the drive. Blanks began the push with a Buff fumble recovery.

The Bulldog halfback smothered another Herd bobble later, but the drive was cut short by a pass steal by Buff Mike Bright. A punt gave the ball to Clyde, but Buffalo Webb corralled a Bulldog fumble, however, the 39-yard march bogged down at the Clyde 16 as the

first half ended.

**Big Third Quarter**

Buff Montgomery brought the score to 12-6 favoring the locals and fans to their feet with the 72-yard runback of the opening kickoff. He hesitated momentarily about mid-field before Buff blockers opened a path to paydirt. Strickland was stopped on the conversion.

With 4:48 left in the third stanza, Strickland powered and spun his way 18 yards for the Herd's third touchdown. It climaxed a 60-yard, nine-play march. Cross Plains then executed its only successful two-point conversion when Jones hit Montgomery in the right corner of the end zone with an aerial.

Three and a half minutes later right corner back Bo Barr swiped a Bulldog missile on the run, and rambled 30 yards untouched for the third tally in the quarter. Jones' pass failed to find its mark for the conversion.

With the clock showing 5:12 in the game, Bison center Greg Williams realized a lineman's dream. He scored a touchdown. The Buff fell on a loose ball in

the Clyde end zone after another Bison had jolted the pig-hide free after a low snap from center on an attempted punt by Clyde near the goal. Quarterback Rusty Beggs was stopped on a conversion run.

**Clyde Counters**

Clyde quickly rebounded. First play from scrimmage following the kickoff, right halfback Eddie Craig skirted left end and sprinted 61 yards for the second Clyde tally. Blanks circled right end for the two points.

A Bison thrust was stopped on the Bulldog 24, and Buff Bright got his second interception just before the game's end.

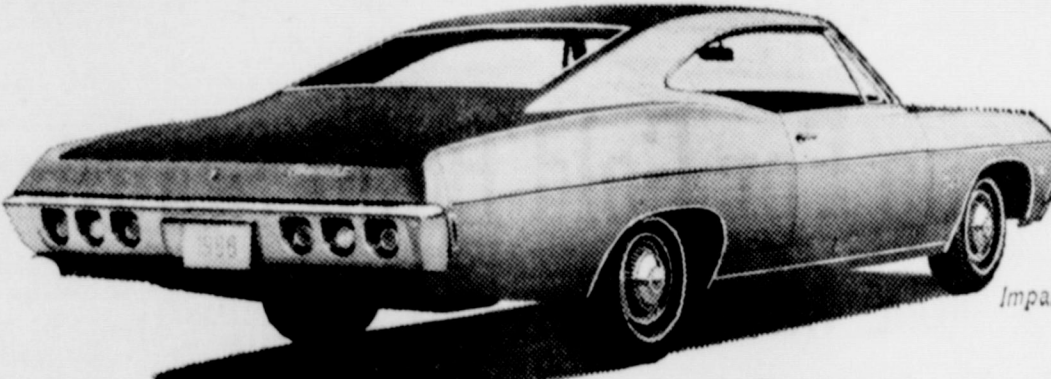

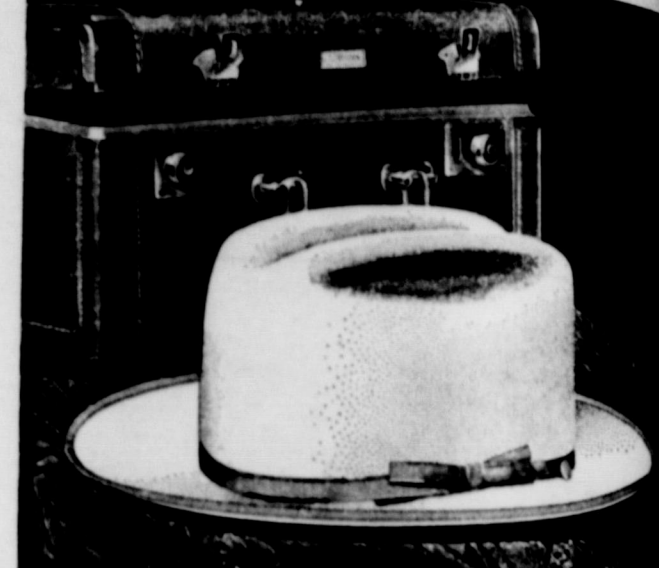
