7 Ladies Hope To Raise \$2,500 In UF Campaign

Cross Plains accomplished a task that most will spend weeks to that question will Thursday night when they wind-up a house-

to-house solicitation for the annual United Fund Campaign. Goal of this year's undertaking is \$2,500.

Mrs. J. C. Claborn, chairman of the current drive, said yesterday that ladies who are to work in the charitable undertaking will meet at Odom's Restaurant Thursday morning at 9 o'clock for a short coffee session and orientation.

"Every lady I have contacted has expressed an enthusiastic

willingness to help," Mrs. Claborn said, "and we are really hopeful that the entire job can be finished with one day's effort."

It is being suggested that to meet the goal — \$2,500 to finance the program for the ensuing 12 months — that individuals contribute the equivalent of one day's pay and that business firms give 25 per cent more than last year when the quota was only \$2,000.

Cowan Hutton, United Fund president, points out that this year's goal was set after U.F. officers and directors studied applications for aid and carefully budgeted every dollar.

Steps aimed at accomplishing that purpose were taken by the Chamber of Commerce in monthly session in basement of the First Methodist Church Tuesday at noon.

It was decided that all Christmas lights, including those in the business section will be switched on the night of Dec. 1, and burn throughout the month.

A committee composed of Joe Hanke, Jr. and Fred Tunnell was named to work out details for awarding prizes to the best-decorated homes. No prizes will be given in the business section, however, the following firms have already pledged to cooperate by decorating: V. L. Hobby's Western Auto Store, George Hutchins' Mobil, West Texas Utilities, Citizens State Bank, Souder Grocery, Cross Plains Review, Mayor Doyle Burchfield promised that the City Hall would be decorated, and the Rev. Lloyd Coker, Methodist pastor, and the Rev. Roger Butler, Baptist pastor, pledged the same for their churches.

Ted Souder and Benny Glover were named to a committee to purchase and work out arrangements for packaging and distributing Christmas candies to children and shut-ins.

John Pruet was authorized to purchase necessary materials for repairing Christmas lights which are traditionally strung over streets in the business section of town.

Churches Aid South Texas Flood Victims

Two Cross Plains congregations have undertaken a drive to help residents of the hurricane and flood ravaged sections of South Texas.

Members of the First Baptist Church and the First Methodist Church are co-sponsoring a campaign to collect household furnishings, food and clothing to be sent to the disaster area.

Local contributions will go to Harlingen.

The Rev. Roger Butler, Baptist pastor, said this week that not only are the memberships of the two churches asked to help, but everyone including other churches, organizations and individuals. "It's a community undertaking," said the Rev. Lloyd Coker, Methodist pastor.

The Rev. Butler continued that clothing, canned goods, linens, furniture and especially mattresses are being sought. He explained that all clothing should be good, repaired and clean. It was emphasized that shoes should be tied together to avoid separation.

All articles should be brought to the Baptist Church. Collection point will be in a room in Dressy Hall, located immediately behind the old Baptist Church. "It would help greatly if the clothing, canned goods and linens were already boxed," the Rev. Butler stated.

The items should be at the point of collection before Friday. Articles will be taken to Abilene either Friday or Saturday where transportation by truck to Harlingen is available.

The tour will begin at 9:00 a.m. at the Brown Jug Cafe in Gorman. From there the group will visit five peanut farms in the Gorman area. Visitors will see results of various practices including the use of herbicides, irrigation, and disease control.

The morning tour will end at Gorman at noon.

FIRST KILLING FROST

The afternoon tour begins at the Truck Stop Cafe on Highway 36 in Rising Star. Five stops will be visited in the Rising Star, Pioneer and Nimrod areas during the afternoon.

Gorman Imperils Buff Winning-Streak

A high-g geared offensive squad of Gorman Panthers will be in Cross Plains Friday night attempting to stop the Cross Plains Buffaloes' win string at two games.

Kickoff for the non-conference affair is set for 7:30 p.m., an half an hour earlier than previously this season.

Gorman sports an impressive 3-1 record, and has scored 100 points in the four outings. Defense has been stingy in allowing only 38 points. Offensively

the Bisons compare favorably. The Herd has registered 80 points in four clashes, and owns a 2-2 mark. Defensively, however, Bisons have allowed 111 points to opponents.

Cross Plains will be the fourth members of District 9-A to combat the Panthers, although the two teams have not met a mutual opponent. Twice Gorman has conquered 9-A opponents, Rising Star 12-6 and Early 32-0. Santa Anna, 9-A member who is ranked eighth in the

classification in the state, handed Gorman its only loss, 32-6, last week. Gorman romped past Evant 50-0 in the season's opener.

Cross Plains brought its record to two wins and two losses last Friday with a 24-18 victory over the Baird Bears. The Herd claimed a 32-14 win over Class AA Clyde, but two other AA teams defeated Buffaloes.

Size Is Strength
Gorman boasts good size and returns a dozen lettermen, nine

of whom are seniors, from the 3-2 squad which clipped the Bairds last year 8-0.

A very capable backfield is led by three-year letterman Daryl Hirst, 180-pound senior who can play any position in the ball totting quartet. Ample help can come from David Guthery, 185 senior, and Doyle Shipman, 170 junior.

Veteran seniors can man positions from tackle to tackle, and experienced ends make Panther forward warriors a

potent power. Three 1966 all-district players claim line spots including tackle Tommy Simmons, 190; end Jim Tom Garrett, 155; and guard Jimmy Warren, 180. These are spiced with junior end Leslie Sharp, 175, tackle Ed Sutton, 215; guard John Shell, 180; and center Wayne Huff, 160.

Strickland Questionable
Buffaloes figure to be in top shape Friday night with the possible exception of tailback Jerry Strickland. The hard run-

ning Buffalo sustained a knee injury in the first half against Baird last Friday.

Head Coach Les Cowan said that Strickland is a possible starter against Gorman, and added that he believed that he would be ready to go. He added only time would tell if the injury would be sufficiently healed by game time Friday.

Other Buffaloes were expected to work out minor hurts in practice sessions during the week.

Fourth Quarter Surge Earns Buffaloes 2nd Straight Win

Two fourth quarter scoring strikes through the air lifted the Cross Plains Buffaloes to a 24-18 victory over an inspired crew of Baird Bears Friday night in the county seat.

Trailing 18-8 early in the fourth quarter, Buff Greg Williams recovered a Bear fumble on the Baird 23. Two plays later quarterback Ricky Jones launched a missile into the awaiting arms of wingback Randy Montgomery in the left flat. The same combination worked for the two point conversion, but with 8:50 left to play Cross Plains still trailed 16-18.

Winning Tally
After a brief thrust by Baird,

Cross Plains regained possession on its own 22-yard line. Tailback Steve Fortune picked up seven yards in two tries. Then Jones hurled the pigskin to Montgomery deep downfield behind all defenders. The Buff wingback bested Bear Billy Collins the final 50 yards to complete the 71-yard touchdown. Amid the reverberating cheers of Cross Plains supporters, Jones sneaked over for the final two points and the 24-18 triumph.

Cowan Praises Bears
Buff Head Coach Les Cowan praised the Bears for efforts in the game. He said, "They were the physically toughest team we've played all year." He added, "They're as good, possibly better than any other team we have met."

Conversions spelled the difference in the furious battle. Each team scored three touchdowns, but Cross Plains added six points on three, two-point conversions after tallies. Statistically the two squads were almost even. Baird held the edge in first downs 14-12, but Cross Plains netted 313 yards total net offense while Baird totaled 222 yards.

First Blood
Baird claimed the lead late in the first quarter on a 68-yard march Franklin Alexander, Bear work-horse all night, climaxed the drive with a two-yard blast over right tackle for the tally with 1:15 remaining in the initial period. End Bryan Reese's kick was blocked by Montgomery.

Baird fans joy was short lived, however. First play from scrimmage following the kickoff, tailback Jerry Strickland sped through a big hole at left tackle, shook off one tackler, and raced 80 yards down the sideline for the Buffalo counter. Jones found right end Bo Barr for the two-points and an 8-6 lead.

Baird Retaliates
Bear wingback Donnie Rowe ran the ensuing kickoff back 27 yards to the Bison 45 to set the hosts' second touchdown, in motion. Eight plays later the block-busting 179-pound Alexander cracked in from four yards out. On the conversion a pass from quarterback Tommy Townsend to right end Allen Lovell was nullified on a penalty, and the second aerial went astray.

Cross Plains then began a sustained march which carried 71 yards to the Baird three, but there Bear defenses held and took the ball on downs.

Punt Runback
First portion of the third quarter was taken up by mild advances by both teams. Baird's Rowe put life back into the game with a 90-yard return of a Buff punt. A fine wall of blocking cleared the way for Rowe's romp down the sideline. Reese's kick was wide, but Baird owned an 18-8 advantage with 4:10 left in the third stanza.

Buffalo supporters' hopes of a victory faded after Rowe's return, but were quickly revitalized when Cross Plains took to the air in the final quarter.

Following the Jones-Mont-

gomery touchdown spectacular, Baird mounted another threat, but Bison Montgomery blunted the drive with theft of a Bear aerial. He grabbed it at the Herd's 16 and returned it 30 yards. With less than a minute to play Baird regained control of the ball, but time cut the desperation attack short.

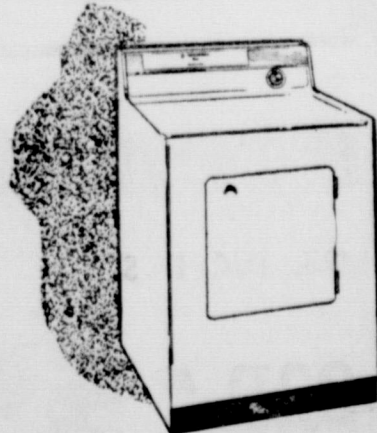

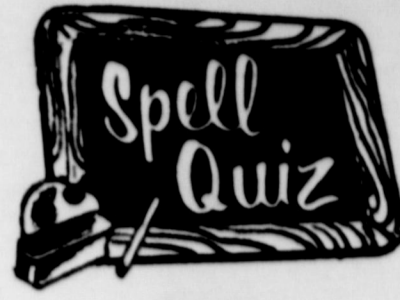

OTTIE KNIGHT HOME HAS TOMATOES IN ABUNDANCE

It is a good thing Mr. and Mrs. Oattie Knight like tomatoes because they have raised a bumper crop this year on a small plot at their home about nine miles southwest of Cross Plains.

Proof of that was shown in Cross Plains Monday. A single limb from only one of the nine irrigated plants had 15 tomatoes clinging to it, weighing two and one-half pounds. One of the fruits gathered earlier this year weighed one pound and measured more than 13 inches in circumference.

Knight said that he did not know what variety the yellow tomatoes were, but that each had very few seeds. He could not estimate total production, but said that the vines were so large that a person could not walk between them although three feet in each direction was allowed when planted.
