Mrs. J. A. Wilson, who lives two houses north of Bowden Lumber Company, has string beans which measure a yard in length. They're tender and a table delicacy.

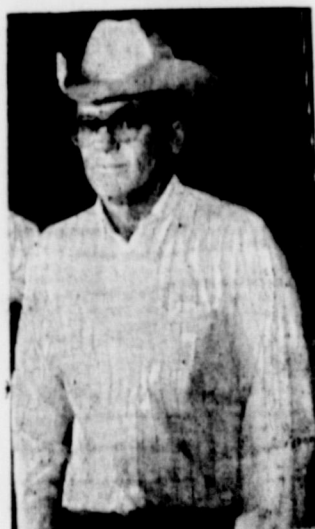
Seed for the unusual vegetable was sent to Mrs. Wilson by her daughter in California and grew exceptionally well in Cross Plains soil.

Palatial Pig-Parlor Produces Prized Pork Profitably

Call it a pig paradise, swine sanctorium or any name you choose but accommodation given hogs at the Morris Odom farm, four miles west of Cross Plains, are about as plush as you'll find.

Morris and his son, Sam, are raising Specific Pathogen Free swine, which in plainer words means hogs which have no diseases which characterize their specie.

A large, air-conditioned farrowing house was recently

built at the farm and now quarters 16 sows and their litters simultaneously. When visited by newsmen one afternoon last week 151 pigs and their mamas were basking in all the comforts of the proverbial "fat hog in the sunshine."

To prevent the swine being exposed to any of the diseases which beset their breed, and act as a thief of profits, visitors to the farrowing house must first wade through a disinfectant to sterilize shoes.

Thermostats keep temperature inside the house constant, always between 65 and 70 degrees. There are, though heat lamps in each wire-slatted pen to provide additional warmth for newly-born litters. Well-supplied feed troughs keep a scientifically balanced rations available at all times.

The Odom sows, bought from Homer Norris' SPF herd, are crossbred Hampshire, Yorkshire and Duroc. They are bred to quality-reputation boars, which the father and son purchased in Wentworth, Mo.

Pigs are left in the farrowing house five weeks, then weaned and placed into feed lots. When three months old they approach 220 pounds — most desirable weight — and are sold. The SPF

hogs customarily command about one cent per pound above the going-market. There has been strong demand for animals raised at the Odoms' plush premises.

Like all other types of modern agriculture, the investment in the swine operation at the Odom farm is a far cry from the old time pig sty. The two men were reluctant to estimate the investment but even an untrained eye could see more than \$4,000 worth of swine in the farrowing pens and nearby sanitation pasture, possibly \$5,000 in the farrowing house and pens, plus another \$2,000 in feeders and

equipment evident about the place.

The operation has attracted attention of agriculture scientists and numbers of specialists from Texas A & M University and the Extension Service has stopped by to look-in on the place.

Should a pig get outside the Odom farm, though such seems impossible for fences appear jackrabbit-proof, it can never be returned. Even the slightest chance of having picked-up contamination forbids re-en- trance.

One wonders, though, why even a hog would want to escape.

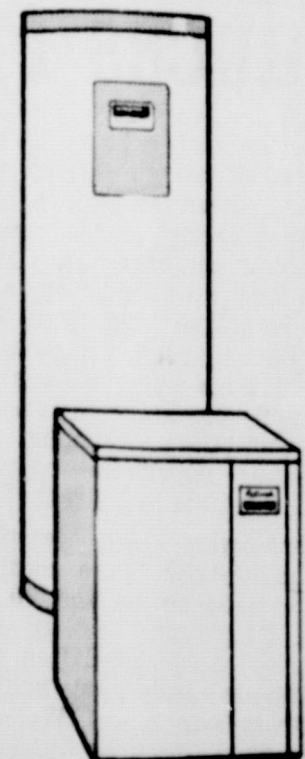

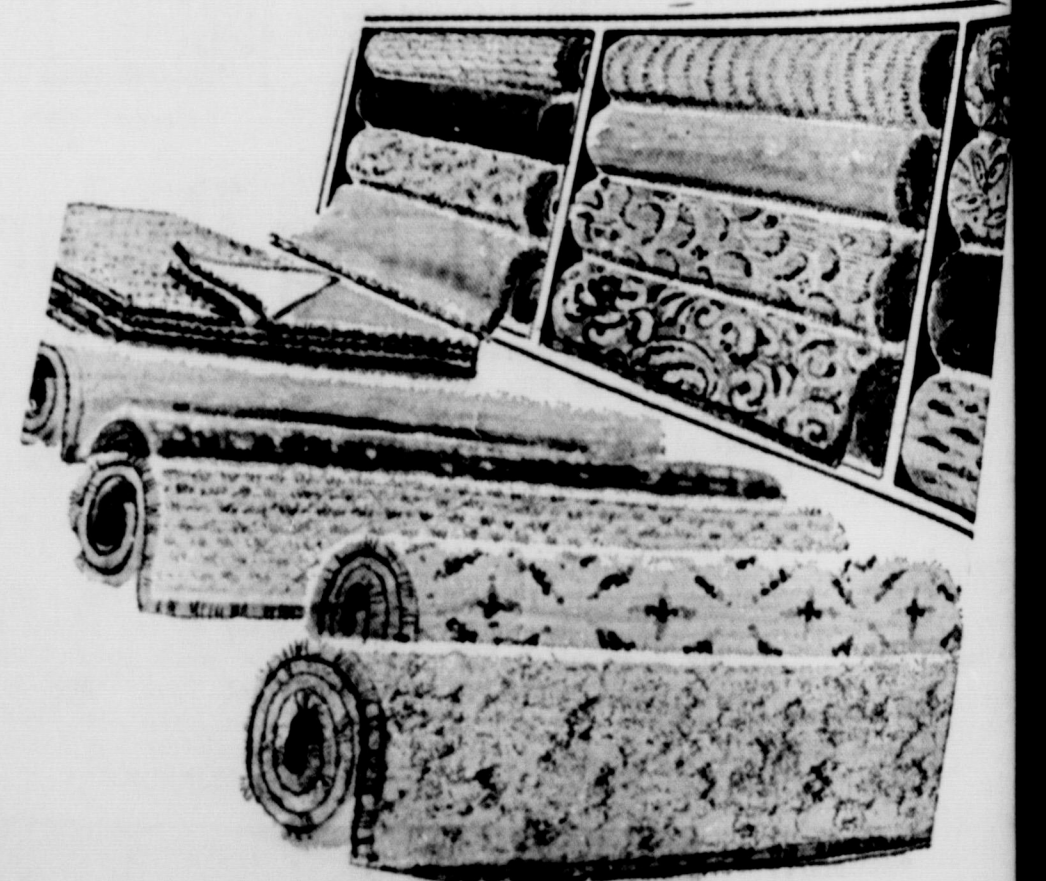

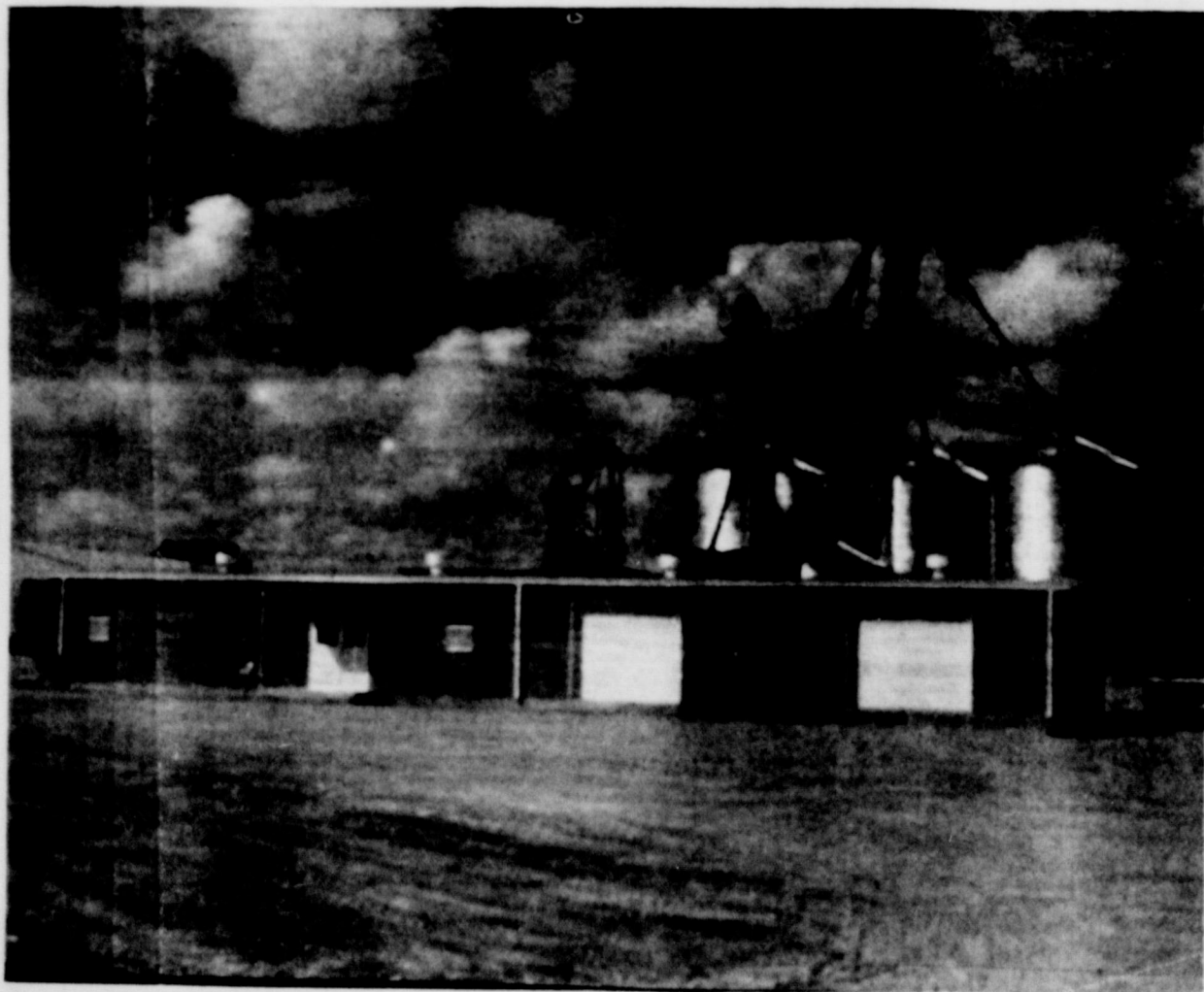

Rally Nets Buffs 16-15 Win At Bangs Saturday

A fighting herd of Cross Plains Buffaloes came from behind twice Saturday night to nip the Bangs Dragons 16-15.

The victory was the fourth straight for Bisins this season, longest winning string for a local high school grid squad since 1956.

Although the end result disappointed a large crowd of Bangs homecomers, twice the exes' spirits soared as the Dragons took the lead. Bangs drew blood in initial quarter. Cross Plains rallied in the second period for an 8-7 margin, but the third period saw the hosts claim a 15-8 advantage. Buffaloes then grabbed the victory late in the final canto after once being rebuffed.

Bangs Booms
The fired-up crew of Dragons crossed the double stripe on second possession of the pigskin. It was a 90-yard blitzkrieg in five plays. Tailback Tommy Stephens was the big gun in the drive. He scampered 77 yards for a first down on the Herd's 1 before Buff Bo Barr brought him down. Two plays later Stephens strode though a gaping hole at right tackle for the final yard. Wingback Charlie Sneed booted the extra point, and Bangs owned a seven point lead.

After a mild threat which died on the Bangs 36, Dragons took the ball on downs, but were forced to punt. The ball was bobbled by the kicker, and Bisons Greg Williams and Rusty Beggs collared the Dragon for a 21-yard loss at the hosts' 23.

Upon gaining a first down, a personal foul pushed the scrimmage line back to the Dragon 27, but on the fourth play Tailback Jerry Strickland slashed over right tackle for 10 yards and the equalizer. With 10:09 left in the second quarter, a pass from Quarterback Ricky Jones to Wingback Randy Montgomery in the left flat netted Cross Plains and 8-7 lead.

Speedy Dragon
Midway of the second stanza Buffaloes began another march which moved 52 yards to the Bangs 20 before shifty Dragon Stephens cut the effort short with a theft of a Jones pas.

The rapid Bulldog tailback further singed the Buffs late in the third quarter with a 45-yard touchdown return of a Bison punt. A jump pass from Quar-

terback Tommy Levisay to Right End Mike Templeton regained the top spot on the scoreboard 15-8.

Understudies Sparkle
Two alternate Buffaloes provided the beginning and the end of the successful final scoring drive.

Defensive halfback Joe Dodds recovered a Bangs fumble at midfield which ignited the missile bombardment leading to the touchdown. Jones abandoned his long bomb strategy in favor of the shorter launchings. He connected on four of six aerials alternately to Left End Mike Bright and Right End Bo Barr. The climax came on a 14-yarder to Barr who went up between two defenders to grab the oval and fall into the end zone.

Finishing touch was applied by Tailback Steve Fortune who angled around left end for the two-point conversion and the 16-15 victory with 2:55 remaining in the game. During the drive Bright hauled in tosses of 18 and four yards, and Barr duplicated the tally pass yardage upfield.

Buff Barr nipped any notion Bangs had of a comeback by intercepting a pass on the second play after the kickoff. He returned the ball 38 yards to the Dragon 33, and in six plays Buffs had penetrated to the 10 as time ran out.

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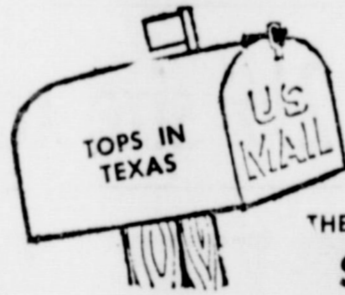

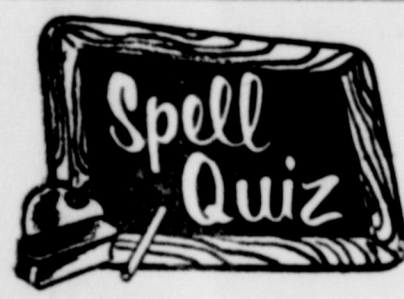

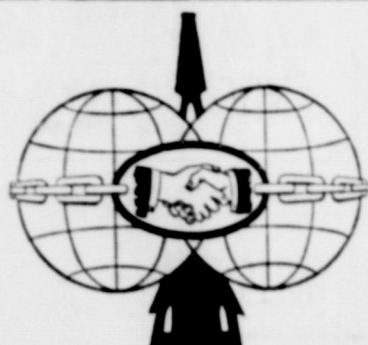
