## 100 Club Ladies From 14 Cities Due Here Saturday

Delegates from 26 clubs in 14 area cities will gather in Cross Plains Saturday for an annual fall meeting of Division I, District V of Texas Garden Clubs, Inc.

One hundred visitors are expected.

Mrs. J. C. Bowden of the host club, vice-governor of Division I, will preside.

Business of the convention will be preceded by registration and coffee in the school auditorium Saturday morning from 9 to 9:45.

The official program, the theme of which is "Garden of Jewels," begins at 10 o'clock. Greetings will be extended by Mrs. Ross J. Newton, followed by a solo by Mrs. Roger Butler. The Rev. Roger Butler, Baptist pastor, will offer the invocation and Jack Scott, local newsman, will extend a brief welcome. Response will be made by Mrs. C. E. Tinsdale of the San Saba Garden Club. A business session, gavelled by Mrs. Bowden, and closing prayer at noon completes the morning agenda.

Luncheon will be served in the school cafeteria and accommodations have been provided for 100 out-of-town visitors. Business will be resumed at 1:30 and following its transaction, Mrs. J. Peyton Smith will introduce Mrs. Ross Ferrier, Jr., national flower judge of Fort Worth, for a lecture on "flower arranging from traditional to modern, emphasizing the district meeting theme 'simplicity of beauty is a jewel'."

It is pointed out that non-members of garden clubs may attend the afternoon session, beginning at 2 o'clock to hear Mrs. Ferrier's lecture; a \$1 fee, though, will be required.

## Bufs Go To Santa Anna Friday In 'Must' 9-A Tilt

Cross Plains Buffaloes will travel to Santa Anna Friday night to engage the formidable Santa Anna Mountaineers in a District 9-A grid clash. Kickoff is slated for 7:30 p.m.

Santa Anna, defending 9-A champion, has been rated by many to again take the loop title. The Mountaineers have

been defeated only once, 14-6 by Ranger, in compiling a 7-1 record. Buffaloes own a 5-3 mark, and stand 1-1 in 9-A warfare. Santa Anna has won two league conflicts without a loss. Cross Plains must win or fall from contention in the race for the district crown.

### Veterans Numerous

A dozen seniors head the list of no less than 15 returning lettermen Mountaineers, 10 of which were either all-district selections or honorable mention picks last year.

The backfield is speedy and elusive, but not exceptionally big. Quarterbacking chores are handled by no less than three able signal callers, Larry Williams, Dickie Horner and Roy Joe Harvey. All are capable runners and can handle rushing assignments at other positions.

Additional backfield talent is available in Dale Herring, who is rated as an exceptionally fine runner, and Tommy Blanton, a heavyweight who has lettered three seasons at an end slot.

The line is, if possible, even stronger than the backfield. Ends are manned by seniors Davy Beal and Tommy Wardlow. Big tackles, Lin Wristen and Korky Wise, are flanked by talented guards in sophomore Raymond Valdez and seniors Ted Ford and Phil Huggins. Bob Rutherford is the strong pivot in the Mountaineer line.

### Bisons Stronger

Head Coach Les Cowan said last week end that the Herd should be stronger for the Santa Anna game. End Bo Barr is troubled with an ankle injury, but the hurt is responding to treatment. Tackle David Merryman, who has been severely slowed by a bad ankle, should be a lot stronger according to Cowan. Rusty Beggs, starting linebacker and fine alternate quarterback, has been bothered by a knee, but is expected to be okay by Friday.

Buffaloes firmly established a running attack last week against the Early Longhorns. Bisons rushed for 328 yards, although the usually dependable passing game was not a success.

Cross Plains Buffaloes will play a vastly different football schedule during the next two years, according to a card released by Head Coach Les Cowan.

Seven teams remain on the list which tangled with the Herd this year, however, only two are on the same date. There are three newcomers to the slate. The season begins Sept. 13 with the Class AA Eastland Mavericks, but at that point the schedule takes on a new look, except that Early will be the seventh foe. Wylie, Jim Ned and Central Catholic of Abilene are the additions replacing Clyde, Gorman and Hamilton.

Eastland is the only Class AA team on the Buff slate next year. Rising Star and Jim Ned, down from Class A ranks, are the two Class B schools, and Central Catholic is a member of Texas Catholic Interscholastic League. Cowan opined that the Chargers have about a Class A enrollment.

### Harris Comments On 1968 Wheat Program

The federal government's wheat program for next year will be virtually the same as this year's, says Tommie Harris, chairman of Callahan County ASCS committee.

In order to be eligible for certificate payments, a producer will be required to seed between 40 per cent and the farm's wheat allotment. There will be no diverted acres under the wheat program. Under certain conditions, wheat may be substituted for oats, barley and feed grains.

Wheat producers are instructed to contact the county ASCS office on the second floor of courthouse in Baird for additional details.

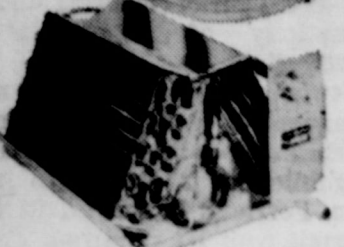

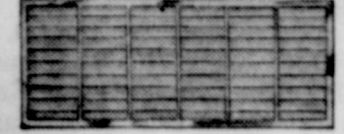

## Thundering Herd Tops Early Longhorns, 32-6

Cross Plains Buffaloes rolled to the easiest victory of the season here Friday night decisively Early Longhorns 32-6. The win improved the Herd's season mark to 5-3, and leveled the Bisons' 9-A record at one win and one loss.

Buffaloes had their finest game of the season on the ground. Cross Plains rushed for 328 yards, four touchdowns and two, two-point conversions. Although the air game lacked its usual luster, it did work for a pair of two-point bonuses.

After rolling up a 16-0 lead in the first quarter, Head Coach Les Cowan went to his bench in the second quarter, and liberally substituted reserves in the second half.

### Bufs Take Lead

Cross Plains wasted no time getting on the scoreboard. Linebacker James McMillan crashed through the Longhorn line to block the first punt of the game and give the Herd possession on the visitors' 32. Five plays later Tailback Jerry Strickland rambled 16 yards up the middle for the touchdown. Strickland then slanted over the left side for the two-point conversion with only three minutes and nine seconds having elapsed in the game.

Wingback Randy Montgomery then upped the lead to 14-0 three minutes and 47 seconds later. The speedy Buffalo zipped through a gapping hole at left tackle and outran pursuing Longhorns 77 yards. Fullback Vernon Johnson cracked up the middle for the two points.

### Fumble Stops Drive

Early mounted a brief offense, but surrendered the ball on downs at the Bison 30. In 10 plays Cross Plains had moved to the Longhorn nine, but there a fumble was recovered by Early Tackle Keith Ward.

Defensive End Mike Bright regained the oval for the Bufs as he intercepted a Longhorn pass and returned it eight yards for a first on the Early 33. Two first downs and five plays later Johnson rode the backs of his right guard and tackle for the final yard and the touchdown. Quarterback Ricky Jones passed to Montgomery in the right flat for the two-point bonus. The clock showed 2:13 remaining in the first half, and the Herd led 24-0.

### Increase Margin

A Cross Plains alternate unit took the second half kickoff and drove 56 yards to the Early 19 before losing the ball on downs. The Herd defense forced Longhorns to punt, and Bufs began a 57-yard march to paydirt. Quarterback Rusty Beggs culminated the sustained march with a four-yard sweep of left end. Beggs then passed to Wingback Ronnie Pancake for the two-point conversion.

The drive was interrupted by a Cross Plains punt, but Tackle J. S. Archer recovered the ball for the Herd after it touched an Early player.

Archer again gave the Bisons the ball on a fumble recovery at the Early 27 in the fourth quarter, but Longhorn Guard Ray Potter stopped the drive with a bobble recovery at the three.

### Early Scores

From that point it took the Longhorns 13 plays to cover the 97 yards to the promised land. Tailback Dale Dodson climaxed the long drive with a five-yard blast at right tackle. Right End Joe Grissam had visions of a placement kick, but a high center snap forced Quarterback Robert Lee, holder, to try to make a two-point-er. A host of Bufs dumped him short of the double stripe.

Cross Plains then tried an aerial barrage, but was forced to punt. Guard Delbert Turner regained the Herd possession, however, when the Longhorn receiver fumbled. Another passing attack netted nothing, and Early took over at the Longhorn 35.

From that point Early drove toward the Herd's goal, but the clock and downs ran out at the same time at the Buff nine.

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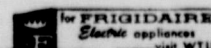
