## 93 Students Make School Honor Lists

Just over 18 per cent of enrollment in Cross Plains schools achieved honor status during the second six-week period according to figures released yesterday by Superintendent Wayne Ford.

The four high school classes placed 19 students on the elite list, and elementary grades had 74, a total of 93 from the student body numbering 502. Freshmen numerically led the higher division with six. Five sophomores earned places on the roll, junior and senior classes each gained four berths.

The sixth grade topped the eight grammar school classes with 14 members of the total of 74 honor scholars. Second grade was close behind with 13, and both the eighth and fifth grades placed a dozen students on the honor roll.

A student must have a cumulative average of 90 or above during the prior six weeks to be named as an honor student.

## Pioneer Co-Op Sets Open House Sunday

Open house will be held from one until five o'clock Sunday afternoon at Pioneer Farmers Cooperative on State Highway 36, four miles east of Cross Plains.

Refreshments will be served and door prizes awarded.

The event is being held to mark completion of the cooperative's first season in business. It is expected that the current peanut crop will be 98 per cent harvested and marketed at that time.

The cooperative was built after a \$185,000 loan was obtained from the Farmers Home Administration. It opened for business Oct. 19, and has handled approximately 1,500 tons of peanuts with a net worth of \$322,500.

Decomposition of the body at first led authorities to speculate that the man had died of a heart attack or other natural causes. An autopsy by Dr. B. B. Trotter of Abilene, however, revealed two bullet wounds. One of the shots entered the back and came out at mid chest and the other entered the right groin and exited through the right buttock. ## Ancient Indian Camp Sites Near Cross Cut Studied By Internationally-Famous Expert

Dr. R. L. Du Bois, formerly of the University of Arizona but now teaching in the University of Oklahoma, spent the week end at the Eubank Ranch on the Bayou south of Cross Cut. Dr. Du Bois is an authority on the recently-developed method of dating ancient firesites, or any spot where the ground has been heated sufficiently to oxidize iron in clay.

He is interested in the Indian hearths and middens of this locality. This is his first work in Texas. He collected a number of specimens from one site which is believed to have been occupied by the Archaic Tortugas Culture. He promises to return soon for further exploration. Unfortunately the most ancient appearing site was too wet to work. A number of other ancient camps were visited including that at the large mortar holes on the Raymond DeBusk tract down on the "Big Level".

An article in the May 1967 issue of the "National Geographic Magazine" explains and illustrates some of the work that Dr. Du Bois has done in Arizona and New Mexico.

He was accompanied by Mrs. Du Bois and daughter, Michelle, graduate student at Johnson of Chicago and undergraduate student Larry Gillespie of Henrico Co., Va.
