Callahan County Commissioners Court was told by the Texas Highway Department Monday that construction will get underway within six months - possibly before - on hardsurfacing on a new Farm-to-Market road from Cross Plains westward toward Oplin.

Construction will begin on this end and the first letting will call for completing the thoroughfare 3.5 miles, approximately to the home of Mrs. Flem Johnson. The route will follow the present road, however, the right-of-way will be widened 20 feet on each side. Land owners signed to set back and rebuild their own fences for an agreed stipened of \$600 per mile.

Texas Highway Department earmarked \$81,000 for the first 3.5 miles of the road last June. Contract awarding is expected early in 1968.
