Crime Continues As J R B Robbed

J.R.B. Grocery in Cross Plains was robbed Monday night. When Jimmielee Payne, manager, opened the business Tuesday morning the back door was open and between 150 and 200 cartons of cigarettes missing. "We will not know exact extent of the loss until after an inventory," he said.

Officers working on the case surmise that the thief was possibly locked inside the store at closing time Monday, and waited until an opportune moment to break out with the loot.

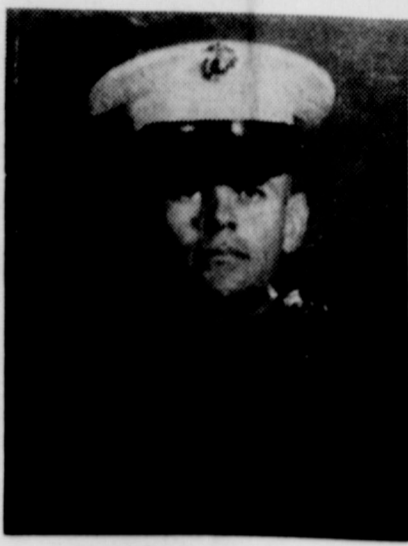
Watkins Grocery in Rising Star suffered a similar loss Monday night. Reports were that about 200 cartons of cigarettes were taken.

State's Top Biology Teacher Is Grandson Of Local Woman

Gary Alan Atwood of Dallas, a grandson of Mrs. Sallie Atwood of Cross Plains, was recently named "Outstanding Texas Teacher of Biology."

He teaches at Bryan Adams High School in Dallas.

Atwood was recently selected to represent outstanding biology instructors of this state by the National Association of Biology Teachers.

The announcement was made by Dr. Thomas S. Matney, state director of the association and associate biologist at the Uni-

versity of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute in Houston.

Atwood, named "Outstanding Chemistry Teacher in Texas" in 1967, joined the Dallas Independent School District in 1960. He teaches honor courses in chemistry and advanced classes in chemistry and biology.

He attended Kermit Independent Schools. He received a B. S. degree from North Texas State University. He has done graduate work at North Texas

State University, Southern Methodist University, East Texas State University, Hope College and the University of California at Berkeley.

He is president of the Science Teachers Association of Dallas, vice president of the North Texas Biological Society and vice-president of the Science Teachers Association of Texas.

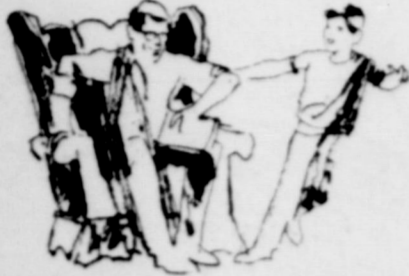

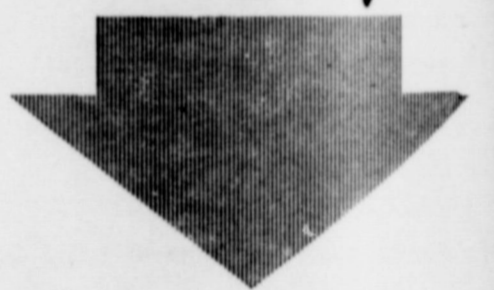

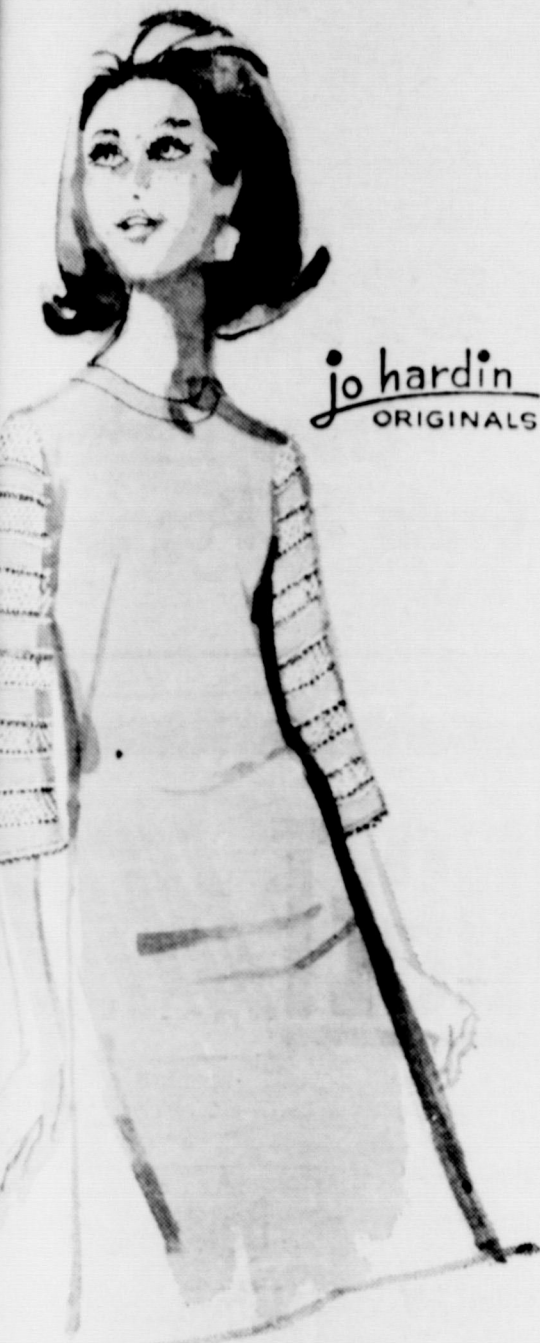
