35 Round Out High School Careers On Monday Night

Commencement exercises Monday night will ring down the curtain on public school careers for 35 graduating seniors.

Principal speaker for closing exercises will be W. O. Trogdon, president of Tarleton State College at Stephenville.

Vesper service for the graduating class will be Sunday night in the school auditorium with Minister Dan Flournoy of Cross Plains Church of Christ delivering the message. The Revs. Roger Butler and Lloyd Coker, local Baptist and Methodist pastors respectively, will also have parts on the program.

Beginning time for both Sunday and Monday night programs will be 8:15.

Valedictorian of this year's graduating class is Don Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howet N. Wilson. Salutatorian is Peggy Purvis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Purvis. Addresses by the two honor graduates will be a part of Monday night's exercise.

Although commencement program is Monday night, classes will continue at the local school system through Wednesday for all students except the graduates. Then Wednesday, official last day of the current term, will be devoted to final exami-

nations for those who are not exempt from final tests.

City Council Ups Water, Gas Rates

Mayor Doyle Burchfield announces increases in city water and gas rates, which become effective with June 1 billings.

Action authorizing the new rate schedule was taken by members of the City Council Tuesday night of last week.

Minimum charge for water will be upped from \$1.50 to \$2 per month. The minimum charge allows use of 1,000 gallons.

There will be no change in the minimum for gas; it will remain at \$2 and allow use of 1,000 cubic feet. Gas used in excess of that amount, though, will henceforth cost 65 cents per thousand cubic feet instead of 55 cents.

"The increased rates are necessary to meet rising costs of materials and services," Burchfield said.

He estimated that the higher rate structure would bring in between \$500 and \$600 monthly.
