## Buzzes With West Activities

Both yields and grades are running better than last year, which was one of the most profitable years for peanuts in the past decade, exceeded only by 1966.

Damon D. Jones brought in the yield from an irrigated crop near Cottonwood which averaged slightly more than 163 bushels to the acre. It grossed better than \$600 per acre.

Highest test peanuts seen in Cross Plains were grown by Harold Holden of Clyde. They graded 79 and sold for \$4.04 per bushel.

A humorous story — said to be true — was being told in Cross Plains this week, which tends to support the theory that "fertilizer pays dividends".

Dwayne Wilson is harvesting a dryland crop that was given 300 pounds of fertilizer per acre. It is surpassing all fields near his. It is explained that when fertilizer was being put down, his wife came by and operated the spreader for him a few hours. She applied it about three times as generously as her husband had intended. The acreage she covered, though, is doubling remainder of the Wilson fields.

It is estimated that three local peanut handlers: Cross Plains Grain and Peanut Company, Farm & Ranch Supply and Pioneer Farmers Co-Op, will receive 2,500 tons, worth well over a half million dollars, from the current harvest.

# Opposition Forming To School Shakeup

A plan to centralize secondary education in Texas into only large, consolidated schools is meeting mounting opposition. People from cities of 10,000 and less population and those from rural areas appear to be gaining sufficient strength to blunt

proposals advocated by Governor Connally's Committee on Public Education.

A report recently issued by the committee urged consolidating all schools with less than 2,600 average-daily-attendance. In sparsely settled areas the committee recommended countywide districts with a minimum of 1,600.

Every Callahan County school would fall victim to the consolidation movement.

Trustees and school administrators of all schools in this county have attended sessions in Austin, where Texas Education Agency speakers have tended to indicate that broad changes are coming, despite public opposition, and the fact that a 250 per cent tax increase that will be necessitated.

Many people throughout the Cross Plains area, opposed to consolidation movement, take the position that school districts cannot be abolished merely because some educators wish it done. They point out it is still up to the legislature to enact enabling legislation, and they predict that this will not be forthcoming.

The Rev. Roger Butler, president of Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce, has contacted a number of state leaders in regard to how they feel about the proposal of the Governor's Committee on Education, Preston Smith, Democratic nominee for Governor, to succeed Connally, in a letter this week.

Opponents say that adoption of this amendment would be the first step toward over-centralization of government at the county level, and could result in too much authority and too many functions in the hands of a select few. They say that corruption and graft are generally more prevalent where controls at local level have been relinquished.

They opine that it would be unwise to adopt an amendment applicable only to two counties with large urban areas and overlapping functions of government where there are at least 21 other metropolitan statistical areas in the state which face similar problems. It is their contention that the Constitution should not be cluttered with amendments of purely local application, but should be reserved as a vehicle for statewide mandate.

"The only information I have on this program," Smith continued, "is the report from news sources. I know that the consolidation features and the tax features will be very controversial in the Legislature. I am opposed to concentration of authority in whatever form it is brought about. I am in favor of Texas having an outstanding program in education, but not at expense of destroying many of our good school districts."

The Rev. Mr. Butler has also written to Lieutenant-Governor nominee Ben Barnes, State Senator David Ratliff and State Representative Burke Musgrove. He said yesterday that Barnes is also against the recommendations of Governor Connally's Committee on Public Education but that his opposition did not seem as outspoken as did Smith's.

Neither Senator Ratliff nor State Representative Burke Musgrove have yet replied to the minister's correspondence. Their positions on the proposal are not known.

Wayne Ford, superintendent of Cross Plains schools, has been endeavoring to get Musgrove here for a public appearance, however, he said Monday afternoon that this would not be possible before early in November. Musgrove had appeared in a number of other communities and shown a film explaining proposals of the Governor's Committee, however, this was returned to Austin early this week and could not be brought to Cross Plains at this time.

Another report is due from Austin early in November showing proposals for consolidating Texas school districts.

## Resolution By Trustees

Cross Plains school board in a recent meeting enacted a resolution opposing changes in Texas schools as outlined by the Governor's Committee on Public Education.

The resolution follows:

Whereas survival of the smaller schools is a matter of deep concern of this board and this community, and

Whereas the quality of education of our youth is of great importance,

Be it, therefore, resolved that the board of trustees for Cross Plains Independent School District goes on record as favoring the maintenance of our local school and the continued upgrading of existing system.

Furthermore, the board of trustees urges patrons of Cross Plains schools to contact elected officials at all levels of government to support the maintenance of our local school system.

## Proposed Amendment 11 Discussed Briefly

Editor's Note: Here is the 11th of 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which are being explained in order in which they will appear on the official ballot to be voted Nov. 5. These analyses are intended to be unbiased.

Number 11 of the proposed amendments which you will vote FOR or AGAINST, reads as follows:

"An amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions and giving political subdivisions authority to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant Counties."

Proponents claim that more efficient and economical operation of government would come about through consolidation of functions which must be provided in cities, towns and other political subdivisions. They contend that costly duplication of facilities as well as effort can be eliminated in the two counties on a permissive basis, after approval of a majority of voters in subdivisions or under terms and conditions of a legislative act.

They say that under the proposed change, one governmental unit could be authorized to make assessments for all political subdivisions under an equal and fair assessment ratio, hereby providing more equitable ap-

portionment of ad valorem taxes.

They point out that by consolidating functions of governmental offices in each of these two counties on an areal basis, which is possible under the proposed amendment, planning could be coordinated to meet the needs of these growing metropolitan areas.

Opponents say that adoption of this amendment would be the first step toward over-centralization of government at the county level, and could result in too much authority and too many functions in the hands of a select few. They say that corruption and graft are generally more prevalent where controls at local level have been relinquished.

They opine that it would be unwise to adopt an amendment applicable only to two counties with large urban areas and overlapping functions of government where there are at least 21 other metropolitan statistical areas in the state which face similar problems. It is their contention that the Constitution should not be cluttered with amendments of purely local application, but should be reserved as a vehicle for statewide mandate.

## Buffaloes To Host Santa Anna Eleven In First 9-A Tilt Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will begin searching for a District 9-A championship in Buffalo Stadium Friday at 7:30 p.m. against the Santa Anna Mountaineers.

The contest will be the first district encounter for both elevens.

It has been 12 years, 1956, since the Thundering Herd has annexed a conference crown. Buffs had been picked as favorite in pre-season, but showings of other 9-A schools thus far this season has put at least three other contenders into the trophy room.

The Mountaineers, riding a two-year win string over the Herd, has yet to win this year, but played powerful Ranger hard last week before finally bowing 28-0.

Ricky Abernathy, a senior weighing 190, is the backfield strongman. He fills the tailback spot. Able assistance is available in back Joe Hawkins, 150-pound senior, and Don Fitzpatrick, 150 junior who is quarterback on a portion of the several offensive formations Santa Anna runs.

A pair of outstanding veterans are nucleus of a big forward wall. They are Raymond Valdez, 170-pound junior guard, and Jim Eubank, 190-pound senior tackle. Filling the other guard slot is Roddy Dean, 185, sophomore, and dividing time at the other tackle are juniors Dale Hicks, 185, and Nolan Perry, 195. Junior David Yancy, 155, is the pivot.

Mutual Foes

Only at ends are the Mountaineers light. Two 135-pounders, Danny Williams and Dale Little, fill the terminal posts. Buffaloes and Mountaineers have met two mutual opponents, and in both instances Buffs have triumphed while Friday's visitors have bowed. Baird defeated Santa Anna 26-8 in the season opener, and Rising Star gained a 14-0 verdict Cross Plains defeated Baird 43-6 last week, and nipped Rising Star 6-0.

Comparison of scores mean little, and Santa Anna was termed a "real tough team" in a scouting report received here.

Cross Plains escaped serious injuries in the Baird game, and Coach Les Cowan has opined the Buffs will be in good physical condition for the initial 9-A encounter.

## Dick Brown Reveals Hike In Postage For Packages

Postmaster R. C. Brown reminded postal customers yesterday that higher parcel post and catalog rates go into effect Saturday, Oct. 19.

The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional 10 cents postage per parcel.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be

raised from 50 cents to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post. Postmaster Brown pointed out.

There will be a 15-cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20-cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

## Clyde Water Supply Due Abilene Hearing Oct. 23

Discussion of whether a new water supply for the city of Clyde shall come from a new reservoir to be built on Pecan Bayou south of that city or by purchase from the city of Abilene will be on the agenda of an Oct. 23 meeting of the Government Application Review Committee of the West Central Texas Council of Governments. The committee will meet at 1:00 p.m. in the council office in the Mims Building at Abilene.

It is the function of this committee to recommend to the COG Executive Committee whether it reviews favorably the Clyde water project, as being compatible with other planning of similar nature in the area. This a planning coordination function of the COG established in the Housing Act of 1966 when an application calls for federal financial assistance under a number of federal programs.

Clyde has applied to the Housing and Urban Development Department for assistance in financing a pipeline and other facilities to transport and distribute water from its own new lake. HUD officials requested that study be made of water purchase from the city of Abilene as an alternate source.

Clyde Mayor George Eager and city councilmen, and Clyde's engineer and attorney will present to the COG committee results of a study of cost of employing each proposed water supply source.

**No Favorite**  
 Cross Plains was tagged as favorite to take the 9-A crown by a couple of pre-season polls, and Goldthwaite was favored in another. Much has happened to confuse this picture during the non-conference battles. Early, rated out of the picture in some polls, is the only unbeaten unit in the district. Neither Cross Plains nor Goldthwaite has lived up to pre-season billing. The Buffaloes have a mediocre 3-2 mark, and Eagles have won just once in five outings. Bangs shares the possibility of snaring the diadem with Early, although the Dragons have only a so-so record too. Santa Anna is winless, and had little prospect of improving until playing powerhouse Ranger close last week end.

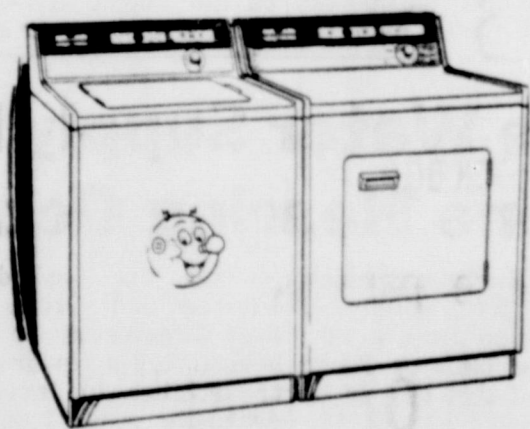

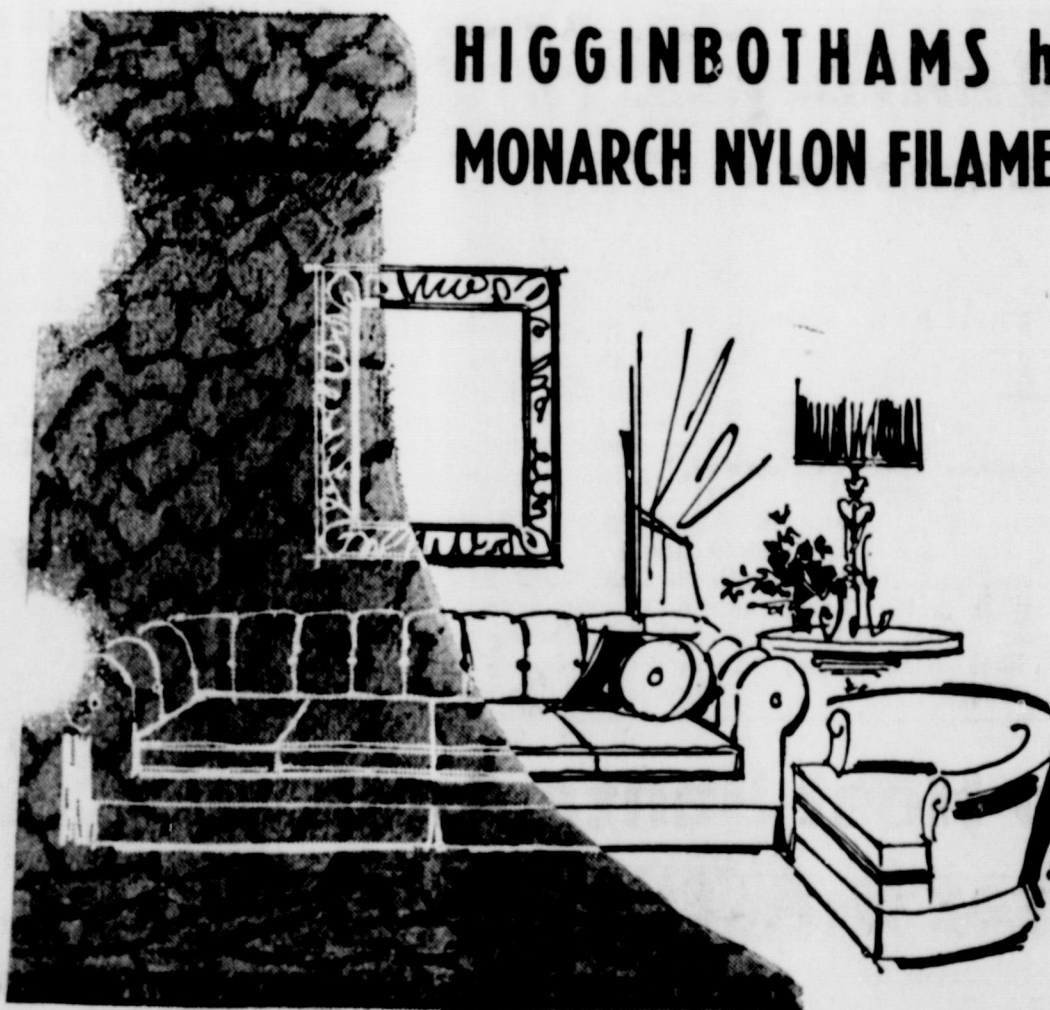

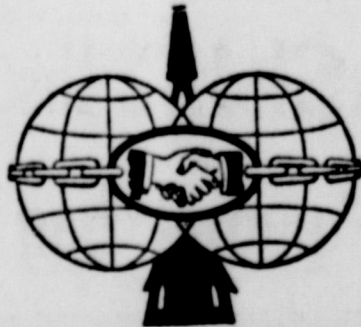

# Bufs Bop Baird Bears 43-6

A second half surge carried Cross Plains Buffaloes to a 43-6 win over cross-county rival Baird Bears here Friday night.

It was the worst defeat, point-wise, Cross Plains has ever handed the county seat Bears. Nearest point spread favoring the Herd was back in 1949 when Buffaloes took a 40-6 win. The fourth straight triumph over Baird moved the Bisons above the 500 mark for the first time this season by upping the season mark to three wins against a pair of defeats.

**Close First Half**  
The two Callahan County teams played on almost even terms through the first half with statistics about even at the mid-point. Cross Plains led 13-6 on the scoreboard, however. But in the second half Buffalo defenses denied the Bears field position with the exception of one thrust which carried to the Herd's 31.

Mistakes played a big part in the game. Six fumbles were grabbed off, one by Baird and five by Cross Plains, and eight

pass interceptions were made, five by Bufs and three by Bears.

### Scoring Begins

Game started slow with fumble losses occurring on three of four offensive series, and the latter one gave rise to the first Buffalo scoring march.

Quarterback Ricky Jones rammed in from the one on fourth down. Leslie Cowan kicked the point Jones' sneak capped a 58-yard drive in eight plays spiced by a 15-yard kicker roughing penalty against Baird and a 34-yard pass from Jones to Cowan.

Baird stormed back on next possession moving 73 yards for a touchdown. Quarterback Donny Rowe was the driving force of the march, and he skirted left end for the final three yards for the tally. An attempted kick was spoiled, and Cross Plains led 7-6 as the first quarter ended.

Leslie Cowan got the Bisons moving again midway through the second period with his pass interception deep in Bear territory. A 17-yard aerial from Jones to Left End James McMillan got the touchdown on the fourth play of the 30-yard blitz. A foiled conversion left the score 13-6 with 4:36 left in first half. McMillan swiped a Bear pass late in the quarter to stop what had the beginning of another Baird drive.

### Blocked Punt

Center Gregg Williams recovered a Baird blocked punt by Williams, Tommy Merryman and Larry Bishop, early in the second half to get Bufs in possession at the Bear 16. Fullback Steve Fortune got the tally with a one-yard blast. Jones to McMillan combination worked for the two points.

Just over four minutes later, after Guard Delbert Turner had smothered a Baird bobble, the Jones to McMillan partnership worked perfectly on a screen pass covering 60 yards. A fine wall of blocking allowed McMillan to dance down the sideline into the end zone. Jones circled right end for the two-point conversion.

Buff Joe Dodds blunted two Baird thrusts with pass inter-

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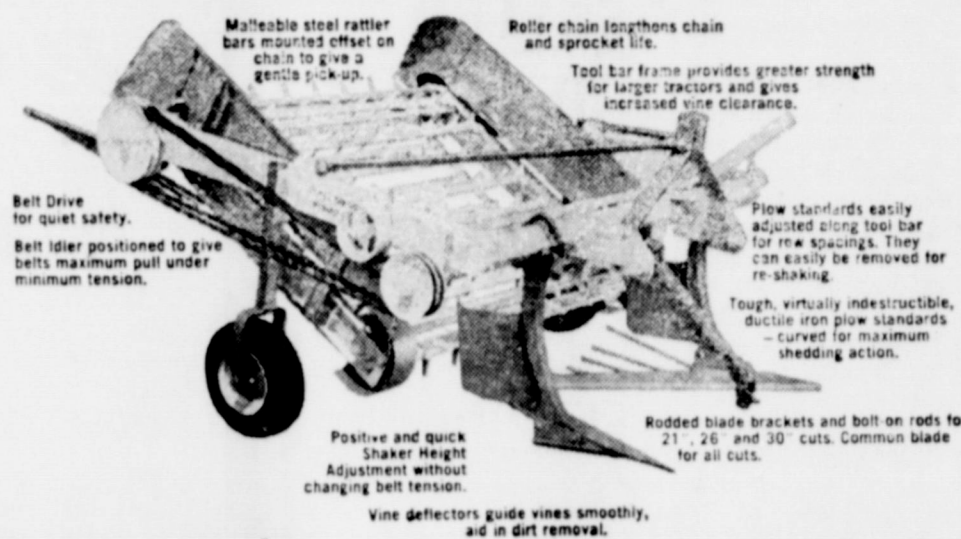
