86 Students Gain Honor Status At Local Schools

Approximately 18 per cent of the students attending Cross Plains schools completed the first six-weeks period with a general average of 90 or better. Honor roll released from the office of School Superintendent Wayne Ford this week shows

62 elementary graders and 24 high schoolers attained the distinctive rating. Of the 86 scholars, 30 are boys and 56 are girls.

Count Shows Cross Plains Has 535 Occupied Houses

A house numbering project, started by the 1968 graduating class at Cross Plains High School, has been completed.

Rev. Roger Butler, Chamber of Commerce president, who worked with students in the undertaking, complimented the young people for a job well done, one that was ultimately completed five months after graduation.

A survey made during the project reveals that there are 535 occupied homes and business houses in Cross Plains. Of this number, 426 placed new numbers on their buildings, representing an 80 per cent participation.

Persons who did not get house numbers and now desire them may secure them at the City Hall, the Rev. Butler reported.

New Residents Must Vote By November 1

County Clerk Mrs. Beatrice Deal has reminded new residents of the county that they must vote in her office by Friday, Nov. 1, if they wish to participate in the coming general election.

Nov. 1 is also the last day for absentee voting and for voting by persons who qualified to vote in the presidential election as new residents of the state during the 15-day application period in September.

Persons who have lived in Texas more than a year but have moved from one county to another since May 5, 1968, may vote on all statewide offices, including President and Vice-President, and on the 14 proposed constitutional amendments, but they may not vote on local offices. In order to vote, they must be registered as voters for the 1968 voting year.

Buff-Eagle 9-A Showdown Set In Goldthwaite Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes or Goldthwaite Eagles could take a giant step toward annexing the District 9-A football championship Friday night as the two units collide at Goldthwaite.

Both units won league openers, and preseason polls divided roles of loop favorite between the two units.

No Mutual Foes

The two teams have not met a mutual opponent, and no comparison is therefore available in that category. Defensively, however, the two units are on an even keel, with Goldthwaite giving up 111 points and Cross Plains 108 to six teams. Offensively

Buffaloes rate a slight nod on the statistic sheet. The Herd has scored 141 points while Goldthwaite has tallied 74. It must be noted however, that the Eagles have faced a more rugged schedule.

Bisons have posted a 4-2 season mark while the Eagles have exactly reverse, a 2-4.

Eagles Lighter

Goldthwaite is smaller in size than the usual Mills County team, and experience is also shorter than normal. Buff Head Coach Les Cowan said, after viewing the Eagle-Bangs game Saturday, "Whatever they (Goldthwaite) lack in size and ex-

perience, they more than make up for it in winning tradition."

Two veterans return in the talented backfield in Fullback Ted Roberts, 180, and Left Halfback Mike Wright, 155. Two other lettermen fill out the quartet, Byron Harper, 125, at quarterback, and Ray Hill, 140, at right halfback. Roberts and Wright were all-district selections in 1967.

Eagles have two all-district choices back in tackles Gaylon Jernigan and Paul Kirkpatrick, both weighing 180. Largest Eagle is Mack Casbeer, 190 pound guard.

Goldthwaite possess a potent, explosive offense was the point being driven home by Coach Cowan this week. An alert defense also foiled the Bang team which was in a spirited, upset mood.

Buffaloes Ready

Cowan said that all Buff mainliners should be ready to go with the exception of David Merryman, tackle, who has been out with a slight concussion. "We are going to try to have all of them ready," he stressed.

12th Proposed Change In Texas Charter Aired

Editor's Note: Here is the 12th of 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution which are being explained in the order in which they will appear on the official ballot to be voted Nov. 5. These analyses are intended to be unbiased.

Number 12 of the proposed amendments which you will vote FOR or AGAINST, reads as follows:

"An amendment granting the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Proponents say that adoption of this amendment would place Texas in a competitive position with neighboring states in inducing new industries to locate in the state.

They point out that these bonds issued by cities and counties would be repaid through lease payments made by industry for land and plants and,

therefore, would not be a burden on the taxpayers or state revenues. At the same time, they say, availability of plants and sites made possible by industrial bonds would be incentive for new industries to locate in Texas, and stimulate growth and overall economy of state.

Opponents contend that authority granted legislature by the proposed amendment to permit cities and counties to issue industry-attracting revenue bonds is another form of subsidy for new industry and places local governments in the commercial real estate business for other than a direct public purpose. They say that credit of cities and counties could be jeopardized and existing industries penalized by giving newcomers unfair advantages.

They also believe the amendment could induce harmful competition between cities to provide the most favorable conditions for an industrial concern.

Work Starts Thursday On New F. M. Highway

Construction will get underway Thursday on a new Farm-to-Market Road to be built westward from Cross Plains.

Allan Construction Company of San Antonio has the \$90,979.61 contract to build 3.5 miles of pavement.

E. L. Harris of Abilene, Texas Highway Department engineer, who will supervise construction of the local project, said in Cross Plains Monday that first work will include building grading and drainage structures and the laying down of base material. No asphalt will be poured before next April.

Preliminary plans are now being worked up for another 6.5 miles of construction on the road.

Open Letter Sent School's Patrons

Is your child going to college? For your high-ability students admission is no problem. But what about the average or one who barely graduates?

Admission to college prior to World War II was open to all high school graduates. Today most colleges have some restrictions on admission. For instance, Rice University will consider only the top five per cent of high school graduating class and would like to take only the top two per cent.

Not all students who graduate from high school want to go to college, however, most of the high school graduates need further training either in college or a technical institute. Depending upon the individual desires and interests, the high school graduate who only earns enough credits to graduate

from high school may be admitted to some colleges.

The results of the college entrance examination and high school grades are good predictors of success in college. Many boys in high school do not expend any more effort than necessary to graduate. However, some of these boys will make better than average grades in college due to desire or motivation. Motivation is the one item that cannot be measured by any standardized test.

One big reason for success in any business or work is self-discipline. Self-discipline is helped by habit: "Habit is a cable; we weave a thread of it each day, and it becomes so strong we cannot break it." Horace Mann.

Author Known Here Now Living At Sweet Home, Ore

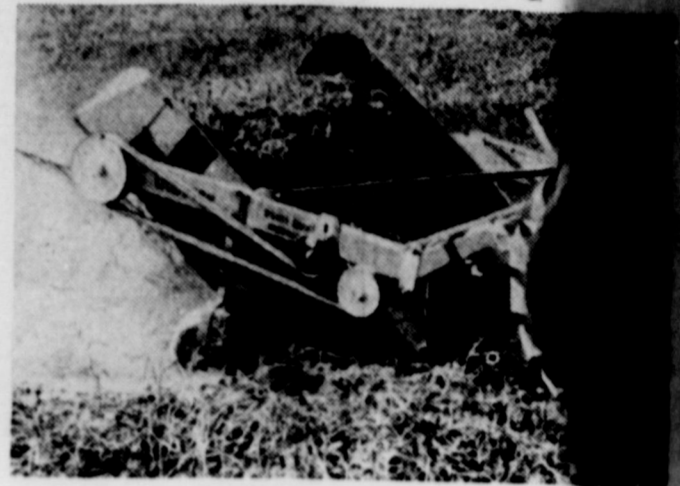

Bufs Blank Mountaineers 29-0 For First District Win

Cross Plains Buffaloes combined a best defensive effort and ground attack of the season to gain first District 9-A win in blanking Santa Anna Mountaineers 29-0 in Buffalo Stadium Friday night.

Herd defenders allowed only 111 yards total offense, 59 rushing and 52 passing, intercepted four passes, recovered a fumble and blocked a punt in blanking the Mountaineers. It was the second time this season that an opponent has been held scoreless.

Offensively the Bisons gained 406 yards from scrimmage, 251 on the ground. The rushing attack was the best of the season. Although sporting a 14-0 lead at halftime, Buff offense was sluggish at the start, but showed much more drive and crispness after intermission. The Herd scored 15 points in the third before giving way to reserves.

yards before Quarterback Ricky Jones passed 18 yards to Wingback Leslie Cowan for the tally. Leslie Cowan missed the up-rights from placement. An earlier Buff drive was nixed on the first of four lost fumbles at the Mountaineer 11.

Buff Left End James McMillan sent the Herd back to the attack late in the second period with a pass interception, but that thrust fizzled at the two. Santa Anna began its only serious threat of the night later in the quarter which was stopped on downs at the Buffalo 12.

Cross Plains then began its second scoring blitz. Bisons covered the 88 yards in five plays, helped by a 15-yard Santa Anna penalty, with a pass from Jones to McMillan going the final 43 yards with 21 seconds left in the first half. Jones hit Leslie Cowan with a two-point conversion toss.
