Result Unknown In Presidential Race

As the Review went to press Wednesday morning at 2 o'clock outcome of the presidential race remained in doubt.

Hubert H. Humphrey and Richard M. Nixon were virtually deadlocked in what may eventually end in the closest national election in history. Each had approximately 43 per cent of the popular vote and George C. Wallace was tallying about 14 per cent.

It was well after midnight when returns from the Clyde box were announced.

Both Cross Plains and Callahan County polled decisive Democratic majorities in Tuesday's presidential voting.

Of the 691 ballots cast here Hubert H. Humphrey received 353 votes, Richard M. Nixon 205

and George Wallace 129. Results were announced 30 minutes after the polls closed, believed to have been the fastest local General Election tally in a decade.

Lt. Governor Preston Smith was an overwhelming favorite at this and all near by boxes in his bid for Texas governorship. Cross Plains gave him 472 votes to 178 for Paul Eggers, the Republican standard bearer. All Democratic candidates for

statewide offices won easy victories.

Callahan County voters approved six of the 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

Deer And Turkey Seasons Opening

Deer, turkey and quail seasons open Saturday, Nov. 9.

The season on deer and turkey closes Jan. 1, however, quail may be legally shot until Jan. 31.

Bag limits are: two legal bucks on deer, two gobblers or two bearded hens for turkeys or one each per season, and on quail 12 a day or a limit of 36 in possession.

Duck season opens Dec. 14 and runs through Jan. 12.

Bufs Seek First Road Win In District Finale

Cross Plains Buffaloes will be seeking the highest finish in district football competition since 1956 Friday in Bangs.

A victory would give the Herd a 3-1 District 9-A mark and second place in the league with an outside chance of sharing the loop championship. Only hope of the latter would be an upset of Goldthwaite by Early.

To accomplish this, however, Buffaloes must achieve a first of the 1968 campaign in the league finale. That is to win a game on the road. Cross Plains has sustained three defeats this season, all on strange gridirons, but owns an unblemished 5-0 mark at home. A Herd has not finished higher than third place in league competition any year since last championship year 12 years ago.

Friday's hosts will be attempting to remain in the district race. Dragons own a 1-1 9-A record, 3-5 on the season, and a Buffalo defeat would leave Bangs in a good position to take the runner-up position.

Friday's opponents have met three foes also faced by Bisons. Both lost to Goldthwaite, Bufs 46-7 and Dragons 14-9. Both defeated Early, Bangs 15-7 and Cross Plains 30-15. Jim Ned

nipped the Dragons 8-7 in season opener, and Bisons clipped the Indians 38-26.

Statistically Bisons hold an edge on offense. Cross Plains has scored 178 points while Bangs has totaled only 64 in eight games. Defensively, however, the pendulum swings almost as far to Bangs favor. Dragon opponents have notched 117 points, and Buffalo foes have collected 159 points.

The Dragon squad is loaded with veteran performers. Ball carrying chores may be shared by at least five returning, quality backs in Phillip Sheffield, 170, Scott Pruet, 150, Roy Martin, 175, Jim Geron, 160, and Billy Nelson, 150.

Heavyweight in the line is Charlie Sullivan, 210, at tackle. He is countered by Emmett Mathews at 170. Paul Rodriguez, 180, is a top hand at guard and Danny Woolridge, 170, is the other. Pivot is manned by John Meador, 190.

Buffaloes should be in near top physical shape for the contest, according to Head Coach Les Cowan. Tailback Bobby Cowan is slated to return to action, but J. S. Archer, tackle, will not see action. There were no Buff injuries in the Early game.

Defense Leads Buffs To Easy Victory Over Early

Cross Plains Buffaloes pushed across scores in every quarter Friday night claiming a 30-15 District 9-A victory over Early Longhorns. The triumph was the ninth straight win for the Herd in Buffalo Stadium, through two seasons, and it was the last home game for the Bisons for the 1968 campaign.

The victory raised the Buffs league mark to 2-1, retaining a slim hope of sharing the 9-A crown, and improved the season mark to 5-3. Early is 0-2 in loop action and 6-2 on the season.

Herd Opportunists
Bisons played the role of opportunists by picking off four Early passes and recovering three fumbles, with one interception and two bobble recoveries ultimately leading to touchdowns. Although Bisons held a wide edge in the statistical battle, Longhorn defenders shared glory by picking off a pair of passes and recovering two fumbles.

Cross Plains moved the ball well netting 338 yards total offense. Passing gained the Buffs 209 yards and rushing got another 129. Early netted 132 yards from scrimmage with all but 14 coming on the ground.

Safety Joe Dodds got Cross Plains moving for its first touchdown by corraling an Early fumble at the Longhorn 20. On fourth and 11 situation, Dodds gathered in a 21-yard aerial from the arm of Quarterback Ricky Jones. Leslie Cowan's kick was wide to the right, but with 5:52 left in the first quarter Cross Plains led 6-0.

Longhorns countered with a drive, but Linebacker Tommy Merryman stopped the drive with a fumble recovery. Defenses continued to dominate until early in the second period when Early's Tailback Dale Dodson returned a Buff punt 21 yards to the Herd's 37. From that point Early began its first scoring drive.

Four plays later Dodson leading area scorer, circled right end from 10 yards out for the tying score. Right End Joe Grissam split the uprights, and Early held a 7-6 lead with 6:46 left in the second canto.

Buffaloes Rally
Late in the same canto, Buffs took possession at their 33, following a punt, and moved the 67 yards in six plays, 60 yards via air lanes. After a 12-yarder to Fullback Larry Bishop, Left End James McMillan took a 30-yard screen pass which apparently went for a touchdown, but referees ruled McMillan had stepped out of bounds at the Longhorn 25. Jones hit Bishop with an eight yarder, and Tailback Steve Fortune got seven before Jones zeroed on McMillan with the 10-yard scoring strike. A two-point conversion failed, but Bisons led 12-7 with 55 seconds left in first half.

Buff Ronnie Pancake aborted a brief Early drive opening the second half by returning a pass interception about 35 yards to the Early 25. Fortune carried three consecutive times for 16 before his hard-driving nine-yard spurt hit pay with 9:04 left in the third. Again a two-point attempt failed, but Buffs owned an 18-7 advantage.

Early Cuts Margin
The two teams swapped pass interceptions, Tommy Merryman got one for Buffs, and

Wayne Lewis got one for Early, before a high snap on a punt attempt gave the Longhorns the ball on the Buff 11. Four plays later Fullback David Kemp cracked over from the one. Quarterback Robert Lee hit end Grissam for a two-point conversion, cutting Buffalo lead to 18-15 with 10:33 remaining in the game.

Buff Safety Rusty Beggs covered another Longhorn misque on the visitors' 35 setting the stage for Cross Plains last tally. It took eight plays to crack the Longhorn defense, but Jones followed his center, right guard and tackle, Gregg Williams, Delbert Turner and Lanny Kellar, the final four yards. Again a two-point attempt failed, but Bisons had a 30-15 win with 4:06 left in the game.

Last four minutes were hectic. Merryman intercepted his second aerial, and Cross Plains began moving under guidance of Quarterback Pancake. However Lewis swiped his second pass to stop the threat at the Early 19. On the next play Buff Dodds got an interception, and a roughing penalty coupled with his return shoved the ball to the Longhorn eight. Time ran out nixing the Buff effort.

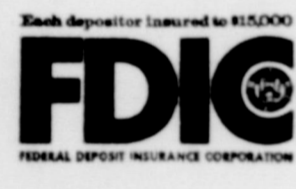

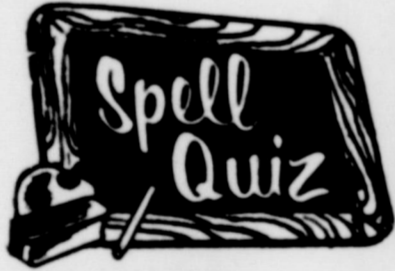
