bought and equipped through
local subscriptions.

It was noted that the State
Board of Insurance, controlling
body for fire insurance rates,
does not officially recognize
booster trucks, those with less
than 500 gallon per minute
pumping capacity, but the city
will receive credit for having
it. Hornsby noted that the new
truck will double capability for
quick, initial application of wa-
ter on fires where the pumper,
which takes longer to get into
action, is needed. "Early water
application to building blazes
can cut damage extensively,"
the chief noted. Two trucks will
also be available to combat rural
fires.

Cost of the new vehicle, which
was ordered Wednesday, and
equipment is estimated to be
approximately \$6,000. The local
fire company has pledged \$3,000
toward its purchase, and the
City of Cross Plains has provided
a matching amount.

The truck, furnished by Bishop
Chevrolet at dealer cost, will
carry at least 1,000 gallons of
water. The vehicle will also
have at least one new innova-
tion, an electronic warning sys-
tem, referred to as a "yeiper."

Mineral Wells, H. McDonald,
Rising Star Church of Christ
minister, and Gary Adams of
Cisco. Burial was slated in Rising
Star Cemetery.

Mr. Tyler was born in Lam-
pasas County Aug. 17, 1887. He
taught school in early man-
hood. His 58-year banking car-
eer was begun June 10, 1910.

He married Myrtle Ruther-
ford in 1922.
Survivors include his wife,
Myrtle; two stepsons, Charles
and James Rutherford, both of
Rising Star; one stepdaughter,
Mrs. Frances Thomas of Mid-
land; one brother, Charlie of
Rising Star; one sister, Mrs.

and several step-grandchildren.

the two schools will be held
later to work out details.

Bisons have scheduled a pair
of practice games with Carbon,
winner of District 24-B. Buffs
will travel to Carbon on Tues-
day, Feb. 18, and Carbon will
be on local hardwood the follow-
ing Friday. Both will be single
games, and will start at 7:30
p.m.

The Herd recorded its sixth
straight District 9-A triumph

and won the loop champion-
ship Tuesday of last week by
besting host Bangs 63-45. A
Bison 18-9 first quarter lead
melted to a 25-21 edge at half-
time. Cross Plains gained four
points in the third, however,
and padded that by an-
other 10 points in the fourth
stanza.

Senior Ricky Jones paced
Buffalo scoring with 18 points
on nine field goals. Leslie Cowan
was close behind with 17,
and James McMillan added an-
other 11. Jesse Moon and Bob-
by Cowan contributed eight
points each, and Larry Bishop
got one. Bobby Nelson paced
Bangs with 15 markers.

Cross Plains Buffettes bowled out of the District 9-A basketball championship race last week as Bangs and Santa Anna sextets, loop front runners, decimated the locals.

A frigid fourth quarter doomed Cross Plains girls at Bangs Tuesday of last week. Locals managed just three points in the final eight minutes while hosts bucketed 20 points to pin a 48-30 loss on the Buffettes. Adding to Buffette woes was poor shooting percentages. Forwards connected on less than 25 per cent of field goals, and collected only eight points of a possible 20 at the free throw line.

Cross Plains led 10-8 after initial eight minutes, but Bangs took a 24-19 advantage to locker rooms at intermission. A good Buffette defense in the third cut the deficit to 28-27, but Bangs rallied to eliminate Buffettes from the district race.

All three local forwards, Lydia Albrecht, Vickie Hargrove and Sue Walker, counted 10 points. Gayle Green paced Bangs scoring with 21 points, 10 of which came in the final quarter.

Santa Anna's Vickie Neff scorched nets in Buffalo Gymnasium Friday night for 40 points in leading her team to a 48-31 triumph over the home sextet. Her 40 markers came on 11 field goals and 18 free tosses.

Trailing by only two points, 22-20, at halftime, Buffettes again faded in the last half, compounded by five players getting into foul trouble. Buffettes drew 24 infractions as a team, and Santa Anna made 20 of 36 charity shots allowed. Locals managed just 11 of 26.

Miss Albrecht led local tallying with 14 points.

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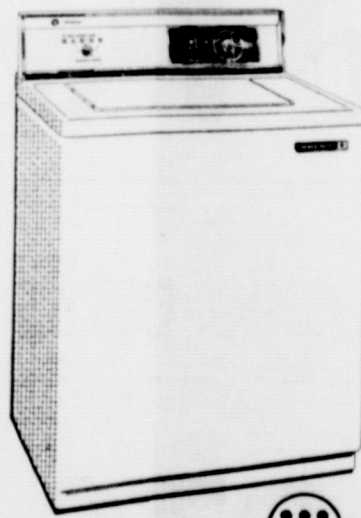


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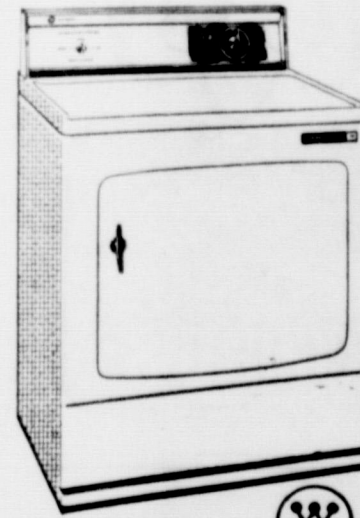

Rev. C. R. Myrick Buried Thursday

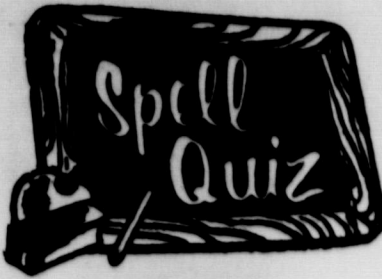
