Lubbock Newspaper Applauds Musgrove

State Representative Burke Musgrove is one of two members of the Texas Legislature being publicly applauded by editorial writers of the Lubbock Daily Avalanche-Journal.

"Two recently introduced bills at Austin are sincere attempts to apply the force of law to growing problems," the newspaper says.

"One, by Sen. Jim Bates, would revise the Liquor Control Act to strengthen punishment for underaged drinkers and for persons who aid or permit them to violate the law. This legislation is urgently needed."

Then in commenting upon a bill offered by Musgrove, the newspaper continued: "Musgrove's bill would provide penalties of from 10 years to life imprisonment for persons over 21 convicted of selling narcotics to minors. A second conviction would carry the same penalty without possibility of

probation or parole." "Both the Bates and Musgrove bills are in keeping with society's obligations to its young people," the paper concluded.

Townwide Clean-Up Ordered By Citizens

Forty-four persons gathered at the City Hall here Thursday night in what was termed as a "town meeting" and discussed ways and means of making Cross Plains a more desirable place in which to live.

The meeting had been called upon initiative of the City Council and Mayor Doyle Burch-

field presided. He asked for suggestions and several were adopted as upcoming projects.

Immediate Action

Given immediate priority, though, was a citywide Clean-Up Campaign to start April 1 and run through April 3. The three-day beautification effort will be directed by a committee

composed of Mrs. J. P. McCord, Mrs. Glen Payne, Ted Souder and Pat McNeel, Jr.

Aimed at having the city look its best by Easter, the campaign begins on April Fool's Day and winds up the day before Good Friday.

Householders are being asked to clear and haul away all

litter and eliminate breeding places for mosquitoes. Next Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday are days designated for city-wide action.

Merchants are being asked to devote from 2 until 5 p.m. Thursday for cleaning of storefronts, sidewalks and the out-sides of their places of business.

Picture Ugly Spots

To help kickoff the drive, a photographer will make a tour of the city, taking pictures of any unsightly places. The pictures will be made into slides for public viewing at the next "town meeting" slated Monday night, March 31. What action will eventually be taken to rid the city of fire hazards and public nuisances is yet to be determined. It is pointed out, though, that there are city ordinances which can be invoked, which provide severe penalties.

Elderly people, who are unable to do the clean-up work around their places and lack the funds to hire it done, will be aided by volunteers, if city officials or committeemen are notified.

At the Thursday night "town meeting" Mrs. Louis Richardson volunteered the services of Girl Scouts and it was assured that Scoutmaster Merlin Franke would pledge his Boy Scout troop to the same civic endeavor. Alfred (Buddy) Thate and Joe Hanke, Jr. agreed to organize a "pick-up fleet" to aid the sick and elderly in hauling off rubbish. Possibly with only one exception — when Cross Plains was thoroughly cleaned during a polio scare of the late 1940's — has sentiment been stronger here for a unified effort to rid the town of unsightliness. Dozens of persons stood up at Thursday night's meeting and declared that the situation here needs immediate correction. Indications are that public sentiment is strong for a citywide clean-up based on cooperation of citizens but if that doesn't get the job done that city ordinances should be enforced.

Enthusiasm ran high at the initial "town meeting" Thursday night. Concensus was that a unified effort should be launched to locate a small industry in Cross Plains. John Pruet and Jimmielee Payne were named to investigate the possibilities and report back what local people can do to aid such a project.

Mark Adair Comments

Sentiment favored asking the federal government to build additional housing units in Cross Plains for low-income occupants. The board, which is composed of Elvis B. Scott, Claude Foster, Mrs. Howard E. Coburn and Mrs. D. C. Jones, will be asked to make the necessary application.

Mark Adair, prominent merchant and owner of several houses, was present at Thursday night's meeting and commented on the building of additional housing units by the federal government.

He said: "When they first started building the present apartment buildings I figured that my rent property would become worthless, that there would be no demand. I could not have been more wrong, the demand gets stronger all the time and I could rent twice as many suitable houses if I had them. I say let's get more housing of every kind available to us."

Wayne Ford and Jack Scott were designated to investigate the possibility of securing a small state-supported eleemosynary institution in Cross Plains.

The second "town meeting," to which all people of the community are invited, will be held in the City Hall Monday night, March 31, beginning at 7:30.

Cottonwood Inspires Pride

How many communities called Cottonwood are there in Texas?

Norman Coffey, popular merchant at Callahan County's Cottonwood, recently received enlightening clippings from the San Antonio Light, which attempted to research the question.

The big town newspaper found that there are Cottonwoods in Erath, Freestone, Somervell and Madison Counties, in addition to the one in Callahan. There may be others.

The nearby Cottonwood is the only one ever to have a post office. Too, it has probably always been a bit larger than its namesakes. Even though the community is only a fraction of its former size it still has; three active churches, a much-used Community Center building, post office and a dandy little grocery and service station.

Most of all, though, there are traditions about Cottonwood which cause people to continue to call it home, regardless of where they move or how long they stay.

A letter from Mrs. Melvin Hammell of Schertz to the San Antonio newspaper substantiates the general idea. Her missive follows:

"In Sunday's paper you said there was no post office in Cottonwood in Callahan County. But there is. My sister, Mrs. Bill Kelly, is the postmistress. It was a regular post office until a few years ago. Now it receives its mail either from Cross Plains or Baird. But there still is a post office. Con-

tinued to be a large community with several saloons, bank, stores and school with 12 grades. Now little remains. I have traveled much but have never seen a place I'd rather live than Cottonwood (Callahan County) Texas. I wish I could move back to the quiet, friendliness of that community."

Wanda Childers got Cross Plains' only blue ribbon in the 440-yard dash. She was timed in 67.4 seconds.

Two second place finishes were recorded. The Buffette 440-yard relay team, composed of Vickie Stover, Norma Merrill, Lydia Albrecht and Sue Walker, ran second in 56 seconds flat. Miss Walker threw the discuss 79 feet, 6 inches for a red ribbon.

The 880-yard relay team, Kathy Purvis, Paula Petty, Miss Albrecht and Miss Walker, earned third place in a time of 2:03.9, and Miss Merrill took third in the broad jump with a leap of 14 feet, 3 inches.

Buffettes earning fourth places were: Miss Stover in the 60-yard dash, 8.4 seconds; Miss Merrill and Miss Stover in a three-way tie, 13.1 seconds in the 100-yard dash; and the mile relay team, Susan Holland, Miss Walker, Miss Childers and Yvonne Avery, in 4:54.1.

Miss Albrecht added a pair of fifth places in the broad jump, 14 feet, one-half inch, and shot put, 27 feet, 10 inches.

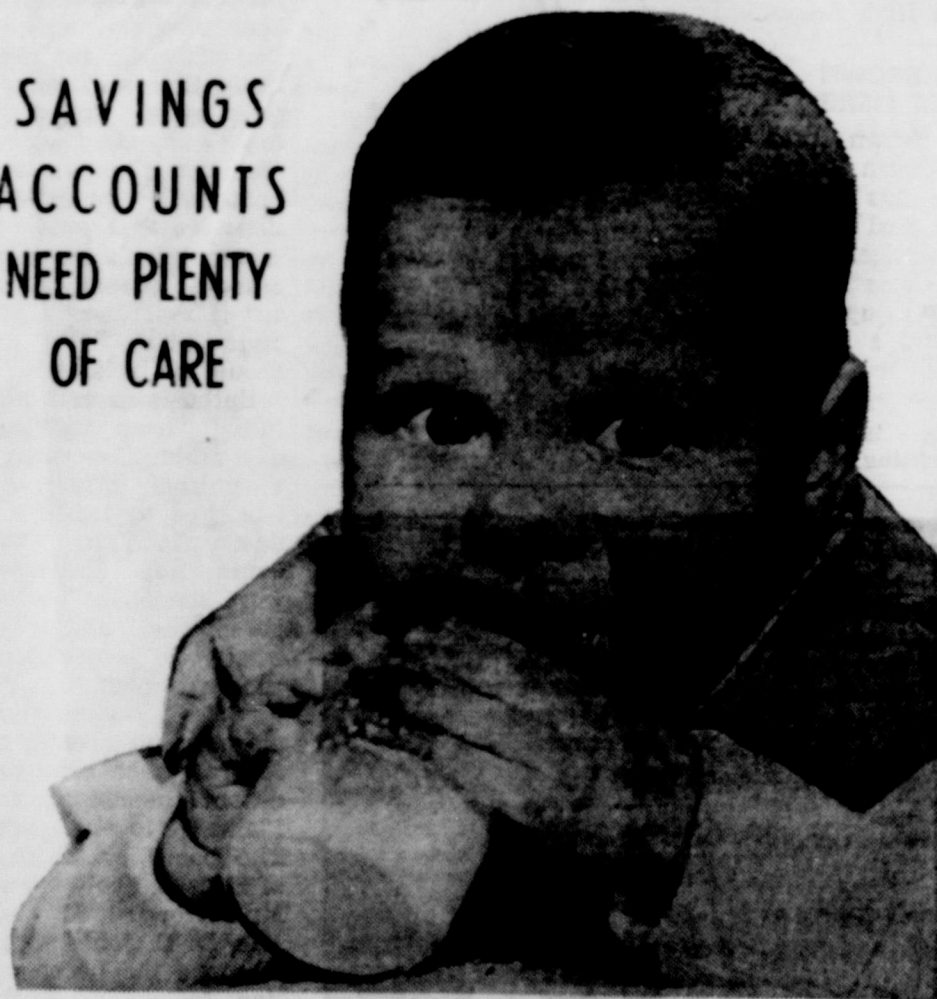



Notice is hereby given that the City of Cross Plains intends to co-operate fully with a community-Clean-Up Campaign scheduled for the first days of April.

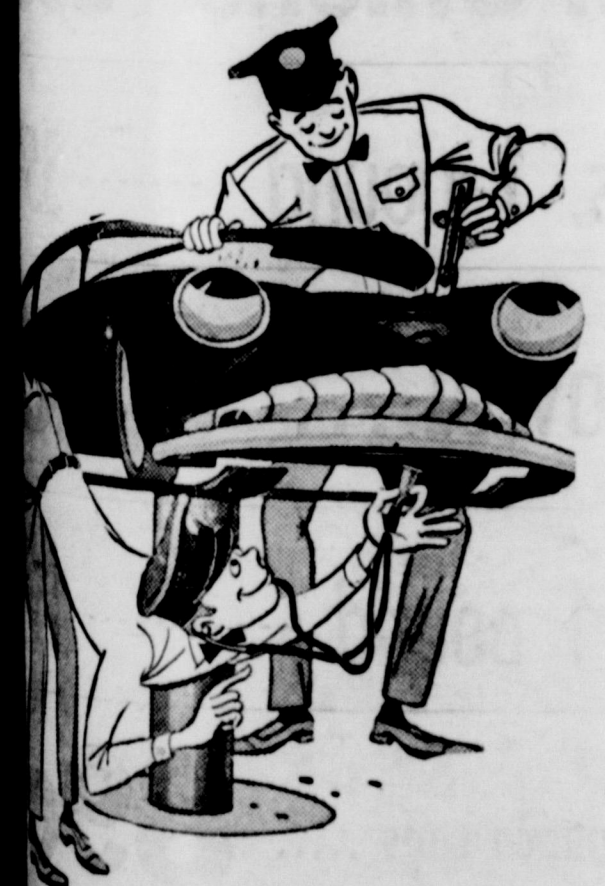
Attention is called to two ordinances now in force in effect.

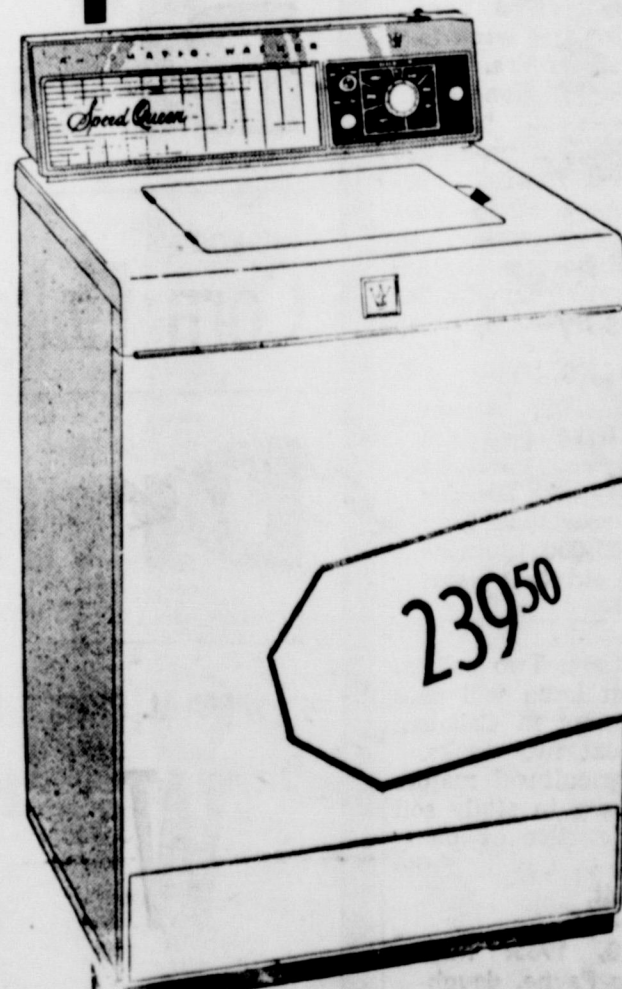

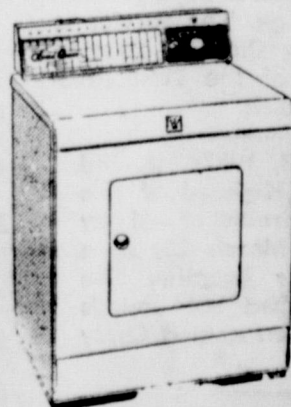

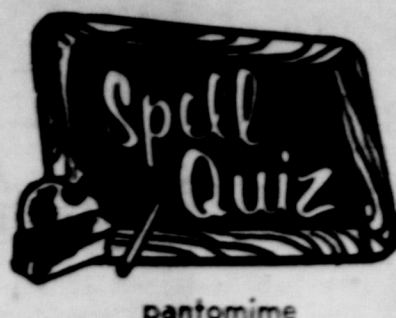
