Citywide Clean-Up Underway

Ten committees, composed of 37 persons and three organizations, have been designated as inspectors for a clean-up campaign which began in Cross Plains Tuesday and is to be completed Thursday night.

At conclusion of the current campaign the committees will inspect the areas to which they were assigned and report remaining "eye sores" to citizens of the city, who are assembling periodically in "town meetings" called by the mayor.

The second of such meetings was held in the City Hall Monday night when a series of slides was shown, depicting unsightly conditions which are readily observed by a person

entering the corporate limits. Pictures were taken from all highways leading into the city and of downtown unsightliness.

Mrs. J. P. McCord, who heads the clean-up committee composed of Mrs. Glenn Payne, Ted Souder and Pat McNeel, Jr., reported Monday night that the city had been advised by an attorney that wrecked automobiles could be hauled away without any legal action being required. "They're public nuisances, which any city has a right to remove," the lawyer is said to have declared.

Mrs. McCord reported also that the city has the right to demolish partly burned buildings, which are not occupied or used, as a means of eliminating fire hazards and filth.

Mayor Doyle Burchfield, who presided at Monday night's session, stressed that cooperation of all property owners be sought. In event that the cooperative approach fails, it was implied that other steps will be instituted.

Elderly people unable to clean around their places and who are not in financial position to hire it done, will be helped if either a member of the clean-up committee or a city official is so advised. The same is true in hauling off trash. Those unable to do it themselves and who cannot pay for the service will be aided by a volunteer, if the need for help is made known.

No. 7 — Residences west of Main, south of 8th to 4th Street: Joe Hanke, Jr., George Barnard and Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Winfrey.

No. 8 — Residences east of Main from north city limits to 12th: J. D. Moore, Mrs. J. D. Dallas, J. W. Fore and Mrs. E. L. Garrett.

No. 9 — Residences east of Main, south of 12th Street to 8th: Mr. and Mrs. Jack Tunnell, Walter Crutchmer and Richard Wagner.

No. 10 — Residences east of Main, south of 8th to 4th: Jimmielee Payne, Mark Adair, Mrs. J. Peyton Smith and Roy Cox.

The inspectors are being asked to contact persons within their areas to ask cooperation in the clean-up and then to report back to Mrs. McCord's committee by April 10.

Other matters discussed at Monday night's gathering included reports on new industry for the town by John Pruet, ways and means of upgrading the local school system to keep it ahead of the average for this part of the state and the naming of a committee to erect a sign depicting a need of the town. That committee will be composed of Gerald Bowden, Raymond DeBusk, T. T. Nichols, Oscar Koenig and J. P. McCord.

Next "town meeting" will be upon call of the mayor.

Six Cross Plains Cagers Win Berths On All-District Team

Six Cross Plains High School basketball players were named to all-district teams selected last week by coaches of the five District 9-A schools.

Two Buffettes and two Buffaloes were chosen on first squads, and a pair of Bisons was elected to the second unit.

Both Buffettes, Vickie Hargrove and Sue Walker, were unanimous choices, and Buff Leslie Cowan was one of three unanimous selections on the male first team.

Ricky Jones was placed on the 9-A varsity aggregation, and Larry Bishop and James McMillan were named to the second team.

All-District Squads

Coaches, who could not vote on players from their school, unanimously named Cowan, Cross Plains junior; Bobby Nelson, Bangs senior, and Joey Griston, Early senior, to 9-A quintet. Also picked were Jones, Cross Plains senior, and Ted Roberts, Goldthwaite senior.

Alternate squad was composed of McMillan and Bishop, Cross Plains juniors; Maurice Huggins, Bangs senior; Ricky Beal, Santa Anna freshman, and Mike Chapman, Early senior.

Feminine team was composed of four forwards and four guards with two honorable mention players at each position.

Forwards included Miss Hargrove, Cross Plains senior; Vickie Neff, Santa Anna junior, and Gayle Green and Jan Hale, both Bangs seniors.

Guards chosen were Miss Walker, Cross Plains senior; Willie Terrell, Santa Anna junior, and Jo Levisay and Nedra Halford, both Bangs seniors.

Honorable mentions went to Sue Kingsberry, Santa Anna junior, and Nita Berry, Goldthwaite junior, at forward, and guards noted were Melvina Stovall, Early junior, and Martha Knight, Goldthwaite senior.

Local Players

Miss Hargrove, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Hargrove, was the Buffettes' leading scorer and ball handler. She bucketed 420 points during the season, an average of 22 markers per outing.

Miss Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Walker, played most of the year at forward, averaging almost 12 points per game, but doubled at guard on occasions. She was the team's leading rebounder.

Cowan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Les Cowan, earned an all-area second team berth, and was the Buffaloes' top scorer. He amassed 369 points, mean of just under 15.4 points per game from his low-post position.

Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Jones, tallied 207 points during the season, and the forward was outstanding in District 9-A play. He averaged almost 13 points in the eight league tilts.

McMillan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy C. McMillan, averaged just over 10 points per game, scoring 215, at his forward position.

Bishop, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Bishop, tallied 127 points from his guard spot, but scored just over an average of 10 points per game in league play.

In the order in which their names appear on the ballot, the aspirants are: Lewis Fortune, Lester M. Wyatt, R. D. (Dick) Koenig and Billy Dillard, Sr. Each is asking a first term on the board.

Then citizens of the city will elect three councilmen for two-

year terms. Four candidates seek the three spots. They are: Jimmielee Payne, asking a first term, and Oscar Koenig, Gerald Bowden and J. P. McCord, who are standing for re-election.

Voting in both elections will be at the City Hall.

Judge for the school election will be Mrs. W. F. (Katie) Kilgore and presiding for the city referendum will be Mrs. Zenovia Strickland.

Holdover members of the school board are: Dr. Carl J. Sohns, Vernon Phillips, Noah Johnson, Tommie Harris and Roy Neil Tatom. Members whose terms are expiring, and who do not seek re-election, are Nathan Foster and Zed Bright.

Holdover members of the City Council are: Mayor Doyle Burchfield and Aldermen Raymond DeBusk and T. T. Nichols.

Polls for voting in each of Saturday's elections will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Results are expected to be announced within a few minutes after closing time.

J. C. Earp, office manager at Baird, said that certification of acreage is a serious matter and not a guessing game. He continued, "There are severe penalties for failure to timely certify or for filing incorrect reports." He cautioned, "Payments can be lost or reduced for errors."

It was pointed out that if acreage adjustment is required it must be made by the final disposition date and before certification of the crop or divert- ed acreage is filed. Small grain measurement service, available until April 15 upon request and at producer cost, can be obtained before or after the crop is planted. After certification deadline no adjustment can be made.

Earp has requested all filings in by April 21, although final date is May 1.

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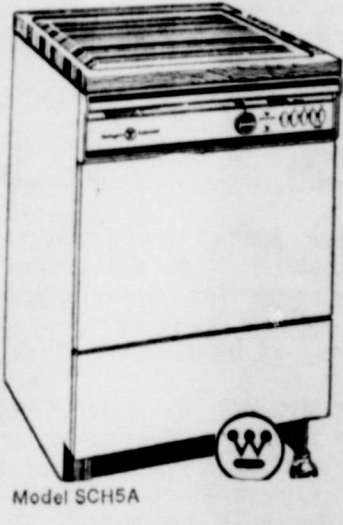
