School Faculty Of Assured Next Term

Faculty members of Tarleton State College, delivering the commencement address.

Vesper services were Sunday evening at the school auditorium with the Rev. W. C. (Bill) Crawford, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, bringing the message.

Superintendent Wayne Ford has received resignations from four faculty members, who will not be back for the beginning of another term here in September. They are: Neudy Radcliffe, who is entering retirement; E. J. Burt, band director, who has accepted a teaching position in Abilene; Jim Ethridge, high school social science teacher and coach of girls basketball, who will be at Leander schools next year, and Larry K. Simpson, who is leaving the teaching field.

Ford said that Cross Plains will have a faculty of 24 accredited teachers and two aides when the new term begins in September.

"We will spend the summer working on a number of additions to be initiated into the curriculum next year," he said yesterday.

Probation Revoked For 19-Year-Old Local Man

In less than three weeks from now — June 8 to be exact — 19-year-old Timothy Howard Dickey of Cross Plains would have been a "free man" with his debt to society paid.

Instead, Dickey will be going to Huntsville State Prison to serve a two-year sentence for felony theft.

That was the decision Friday of 104th District Judge J. Neil Daniel in Abilene, who revoked the probation given Dickey June 8, 1967, by then-District Judge Owen Thomas.

5 Area Schools Get Criticism On Taxes

Members of Texas Legislature have been provided with summaries of tax administration of school districts. The report was provided by the Committee on Public School Education, which has complained about existing practices.

Reports on the five districts in Callahan County showed points which COPSE thinks need correcting. The report called attention to the fact that no assessor-collector of taxes in any Callahan County school office is certified. Only Clyde school district met acceptance on the five following points: (1) appraisal cards maintained, (2) separate land improvement values, (3) building cost schedule kept, (4) adequate property maps and (5) business personality renditions.

COPSE seeks to raise school tax collections in rural areas and has advocated drastic consolidation procedures, which would mean the demise of smaller districts.

Ralph O. Pancake Is Harvesting Flax

Ralph O. Pancake of Cross Plains, who operates custom combines and follows the grain harvest from extreme south Texas to Kansas and Nebraska, lacked just four days in cutting the first 1969 wheat in the United States.

He had moved to a field at Orange Grove, near Alice, when a sudden rain prevented cutting. In the meantime, harvesting began in another nearby field which turned out to be the nation's first current small grain crop to move to market.

Pancake, who was at Cross Plains over the week end, said that his machines are now cutting flax. He reported yields from that crop running at between 17 and 19 bushels to the acre and bringing \$2.62 per bushel.

"Hauling flax is just about like handling water," he said, "the seed is so light that it splashes like a liquid."

 Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE
 Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
 NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:
 "Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
 "FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt non-profit water supply corporations from taxation;" and
 "AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt non-profit water supply corporations from taxation."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

 Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
 NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:
 "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of both houses of the Legislature.
 "(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.
 "(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.
 "(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.
 "(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.
 "(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.
 "(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

 NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:
 "Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and emergency matters as convened by the Governor. When convened in emergency sessions in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, and the emergency matters as convened by the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.
 "Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."
 Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."
