Post Office Quits Cross Cut After 80 Years In Community

Cross Cut rural station, a sub-post office out of Brownwood, was closed Saturday. leaving the community without postal facilities for the first time in more than 80 years.

Mail will now be available to residents of the area on Cross Plains Route 2, for which Joe Hanke, Jr., is carrier, or on a Star Route out of Brownwood, served by Mrs. H. H. Folkner.

A post office was first established at Cross Cut in the 1880's with the late C. C. Westerman as postmaster. It was situated in a general store, which he operated in the valley about a half mile east of the present Cross Cut community.

Cross Cut's post office was

reduced from regular status to that of a sub-station in the late 1950's. C. A. Jackson was the last postmaster. Since his time the office has been a contracted mail point with Hollis Kellar holding the last contract. Mr. and Mrs. Tom Chambers have operated the office for the past year under provisions of that document. J. H. Childs, Brownwood postmaster, under whose supervision the Cross Cut facility has been, was on hand Saturday morning to officially close the station.

Name Confused Ironically it was the Post

Office Department - by whose decree the post office is now gone - that gave Cross Cut its name in the first place. When application was first sought for a post office, early citizens asked that the name be Cross Out. A clerk in Washington mis-read the first letter in the second word and when approval was granted the official designation came out Cross Cut. It wasn't worth the trouble to change. Cross Cut it became.

The late Dick Pentecost bought the Westerman store in 1885, and became postmaster. It was during his tenure that the community was moved westward to higher ground, where it is now situ-

Streets Designated

Pentecost envisioned that Cross Cut should become a city. He employed a Brownwood surveyor - a man named Durham - to lay out

a model township and prepare maps, which are now on file with Brown County Deed Records. The old sketch shows principal streets of the town to be named Main, Live Oak, Pecan, Mesquite and Clark. Eventful Day

In an interview with a Re-

view writer, a few years before his death, Mr. Pentecost said that first families to settle in the Cross Cut locality were: the Bludworths, Westermans. Praters, Arvins, Newtons, Manns, Edingtons, Coffmans, Elderberries and Gains-

One of the most eventful days in Cross Cut's history was July 4, 1923, when an oil test on the W. A. Prater farm, drilled by Brooks Dozier, came in flowing high over the der-

rick and sprinkling fertile acres. Oil was worth about \$3 per barrel and proration was unheard of. New locations were staked by the scores and in less than three weeks the sleepy, little community was teeming with activity. New businesses sprang up on Cross Cut's Main Street almost overnight. Business boomed and leases and royalties sold in four figures.

Worldwide Fame

New tests extended and defined the Cross Cut field, making it one of the best in the oil belt. Today, 46 years later, oil is still being taken from the Cross Cut field, and the sandstone which yields the precious liquid is known by oil men around the world as the Cross Cut Sand.
