\$14,782 Grant Is Okayed For Poor

Congressman Omar Burleson telegraphs from Washington that a \$14,782 grant has been approved for Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., serving Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCullough and Runnels Counties. The funds are to be used in meeting budgetary requirements during the ensuing 11 months. C.T.O. is presently charged with responsibility of supplying needed food and medical supplies to needy families. Officials in the five counties are reported to have said that urgent needs exist.

Only in the category of taxes receivable does the current statement fail to reflect improvement over the year before. The current report, covering the fiscal year which ended April 1, shows \$14,802.52 owed in delinquent taxes, a slight increase from 12 months ago. Totals owed for each of the past three years is listed in the report published on another page in today's issue of the Review, as also is the amount for all years prior to 1962.

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Man Reared In Pioneer Plays Vital Role In Building Equipment For Apollo Moon Shot

A native of the Pioneer area whose parents live in Cross Plains is playing an important role in one of the key experiments in the Apollo 11 mission of putting men on the moon. He is Kenneth D. (Ken) Brooks of Odessa, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Brooks who recently purchased a home in western Cross Plains. His mother is the former Blanche Curry.

Ken Brooks did electrical contract work on a ruby laser which will be aimed at a reflecting device erected on the moon by Astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin Aldrin. One of the primary objectives of the laser project is to measure the distance to the moon to an accuracy of within six inches. The laser will be mounted on a new 108-inch telescope at McDonald Observatory in the Davis Mountains.

Other objectives of the experiment include, according to a recent article in the Odessa American, extent of lunar librations (the slow apparent swinging of the visible portion of the moon causing areas at the edges to be alternately visible and hidden), the lunar radius, fluctuation in the earth's rotation rate on its axis, extent of the wobble of the earth's axis and the intercontinental drift rate (how fast North America is drifting from the Eurasian land mass).

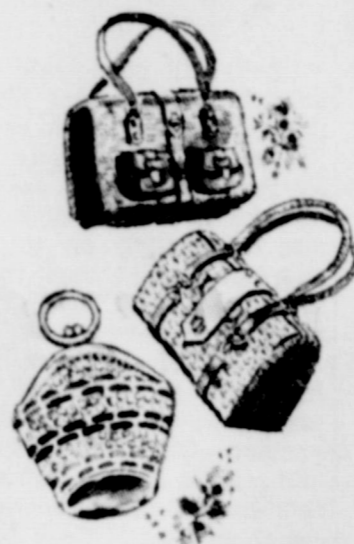

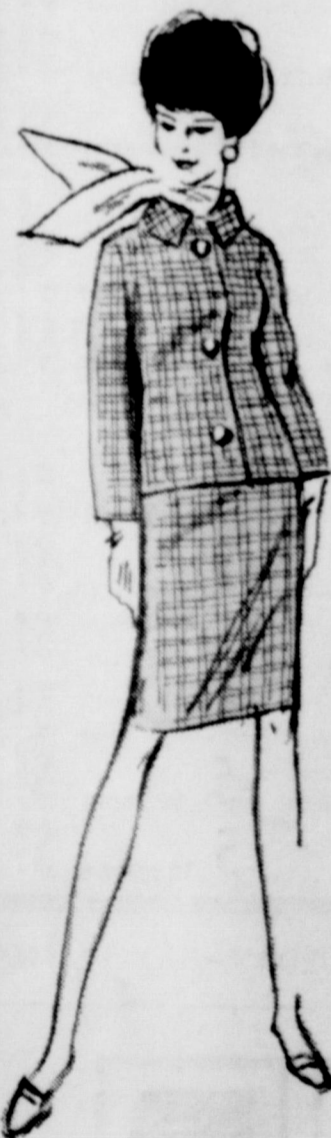

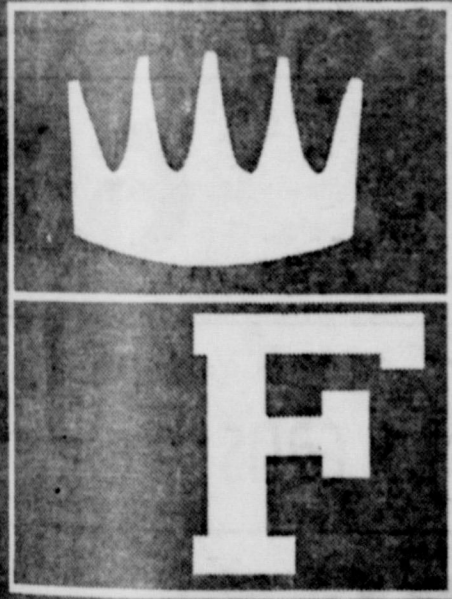
