Peanut Election Set Sept. 24

Producers are collecting and administered by a commodity producers board composed of nine members to be elected at large by Texas peanut producers.

Voters will vote in the referendum on a maximum assessment of \$1 per net ton, farmers stock basis, for the first year of the program. This assessment fee is identical to that in effect in most other major peanut producing states. Any increase in the assessment fee must be submitted to all producers in the state in a biennial election of directors. The change would have to be ratified by a majority of the producers voting in the election.

A meeting has been scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 21, in the American Legion Hall at Rising Star to discuss the upcoming vote. A representative of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association will be present and answer questions from producers. All Callahan, Eastland and adjoining county peanut producers are particularly requested to attend, the Review was told.

Schools Aim At Fast Start For New Term

Classes will get off to a running start as schools re-open in Cross Plains Monday morning. There will be no beginning ceremonies, instead every function of the educational system will operate on a regular workday schedule. Classes begin at 8:07 a.m. and dismiss at 3:25 p.m.

Superintendent Wayne Ford predicted Monday that there will be a drop of about 15 students as compared with the number in attendance when classes dismissed for summer vacation. In high school there will be an increase of approximately 30 students, however, the elementary grades are expected to experience a drop of about 45.

68 Freshmen

Scot Edington, high school principal, apportioned the 200 high school attendance this year as follows: freshmen 68, sophomores 48, juniors 45 and seniors 39. These figures, he reminded may be slightly altered by transfers in and out from last semester.

Jack Watkins, elementary school principal, foresees a drop of 45 in the lower grades. He pointed out that this would be brought about by 68 students going into high school as compared with a starting first grade class of only 22. Elementary grades expect about 265 students.

Curriculum Larger

Curriculum of Cross Plains schools is being genuinely updated for the approaching semester. In high school, courses are being added in Spanish and advanced typing. Then arrangements have been made with Brownwood High School to transport about 25 boys there for a half day's instruction in such vocational subjects as: automobile mechanics, the building trades and metal crafts and industries. These youths will leave here each school day morning, on a bus driven by Pender Mitchell, and arrive in Brownwood in time to receive three full hours instruction and return here for luncheon at 12:30. They will pursue regular academic subjects here in the afternoon.

Cost of this program to the school system will be only 12 cents per mile for the bus and salary of the driver.

26 On Faculty

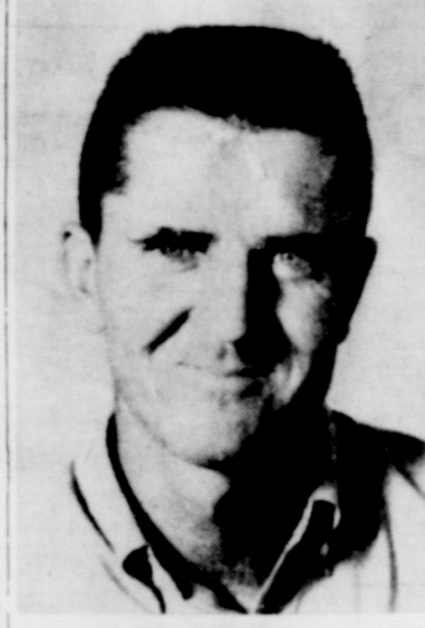

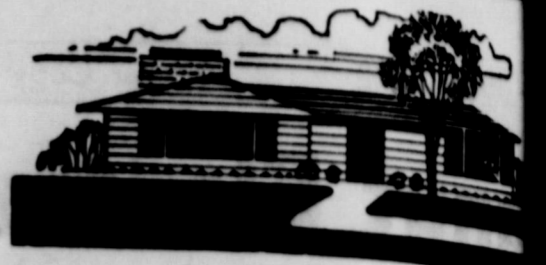

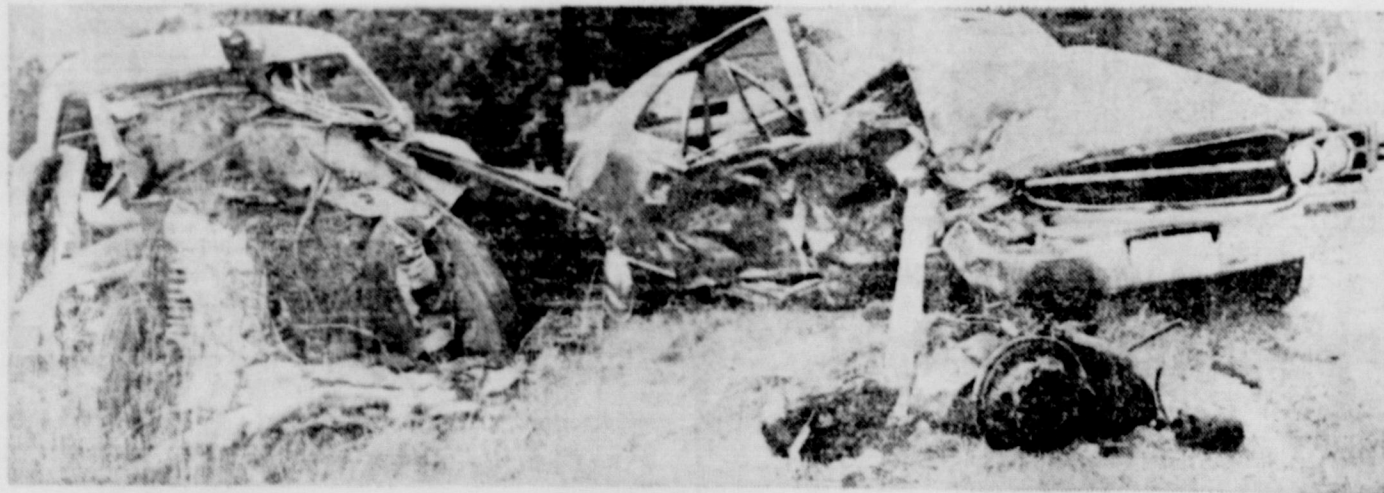
