Bufs Open Grid Season Meeting Eastland Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will open the 1969 football campaign Friday at 8 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium against long-standing rival Eastland Mavericks.

Friday's non-conference contest holds a three-fold objective for Cross Plains. Bisons will be seeking to end Eastland's six-year victory string over the Herd, and Buffs will be attempting to get into the win column in a season opening game for the first time since 1965. The Herd will also be trying to validate a fifth place ranking among area Class A grid aggregations.

Eastland Darkhorse

The Mavericks are rated in pre-season polls as a darkhorse threat to the District 8-AA championship, although the unit was hit hard by graduation. Still thirteen lettermen return to the fold, and some of these are quality performers.

Eight starters, four each way, are back. Topping the Maverick returnees are fullback Randy Lowrance, guard Ricky Culpeper, center Alex Jimenez and tackle Phillip Smith. Randy Boyles, guard, is also a stand-

out. Other bright prospects include end Danny Elrod, tackle Bill Hart, guard Phillip Harrison and backs Ruben Geata and Bobby Williamson.

Buffaloes Sound

Thirty-three of the 34-member Buffalo squad were sound first of the week. Only Wayne Bishop, 155-pound sophomore who had a bruised back muscle, was doubtful as Buffs began polish drills first of the week.

Sixteen returning lettermen are heading daily practice and jockeying for starting assignments from Head Coach Les Cowan. He stated first of the week that physically the Herd should be in top shape for Friday's clash.

A sprinkling of veterans from last year's team enhances Buffalo chances in the opener, including two-way starters, all-district selections Delbert Turner and Jame McMillan.

Scrimmage Deadlocked

Buffaloes and Cisco Loboes both scored two times in a scrimmage session last Friday at Cisco. The Loboes are rated in pre-season polls as top pro-

spect of unseating Granbury for District 8-AA diadem.

Reserves of both units also saw action, and Cross Plains claimed one tally while holding the hosts scoreless.

Cowan said after the controlled session that a lot of work still remained, but he thought that they (Buffs) were coming around.

City's Dads Talk Trash Collecting

Cross Plains Future Farmers and members of the Schaefer family, who live eight miles northeast of here, dominated the agriculture and horticulture divisions of the West Texas Fair in Abilene, for which results of judging were announced Tuesday morning.

Future Farmers placed on 87 of 96 entries, and collected \$189 in prize money. The chapter's booth, featuring grasses, was rated seventh.

The FFA chapter took first places in: red oats, rye, barley, red and yellow milo, vetch, peanuts, Blue Panic grass seed, other grass seed, Sideoats bundles, Indian grass bundles, Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, eggplant, watermelons, cantaloupes, bell peppers, other peppers, pinto beans, dried

First 1969 Peanuts Grade 67 Per Cent

Larry Campbell, manager of Pioneer Farmers Co-Operative, reports that the Cross Plains area's first load of 1969 peanuts, brought in Tuesday of last week by Charlie Sowell, graded 67.

The Schaefer family claimed second places in the following: hegari, guar, cow peas, and mammoth watermelons.

FFA third places: milo, red oats, barley, red milo, vetch, peanuts, Blue Panic grass seed, other grass seed, Sideoats, yellow corn, wheat, guar, Indian grass bundles, Irish potatoes, onions, tomatoes, small tomatoes, squash, cushaw, other peppers, apples, pecans and mammoth watermelons.

Third places won by the Schaefer family included: oats, rye, hegari, guar, cow peas, bundles of Bluestem grass, watermelons and green black-eyed peas.

FFA fourth places: milo, grain sorghum hybrids, sorghum alum bundles, Irish potatoes, onions, squash, cushaw and watermelons.

Another Big Recreational Center Sought For Cross Plains Sector

The Cross Plains area may one day become a vacation and retirement paradise. Recreational facilities are already abundant here as can be found at best inland localities and new things are being planned.

There are presently 32 flood-water retention lakes in this vicinity, offering choice fishing and private campsites. Pecan Bayou, Jim Ned and Turkey Creeks afford more natural facilities. Bird shooters describe

the Cross Plains area as being one of the state's best. Add to the opportunities for these sports the numerous diversions afforded at Brownwood Lake, 23 miles south, and Lakewood Recreation Center, seven miles east, and the total comes to a lot of choices for lovers of the outdoors.

A new recreational facility to outdo anything in this section of Texas is now being planned 21 miles south of Cross

Plains, just off State Highway 279. It would be a \$450,000 installation along the northern shores of Lake Brownwood. By highway Cross Plains would be its closest city.

People from Brownwood, Bangs, Early, May Santa Anna, Zephyr, Cross Plains, Mullin, Goldthwaite and Blanket are planning a meeting at the Flagship Inn, between here and Brownwood, Saturday afternoon, Sept. 13, to take tentative steps

for the mammoth new playground.

If those attending the meeting agree, the Lake Brownwood Recreational Assn. will be formed with a board of directors and a steering committee to be named.

Tommy Young of Bangs is chairman of a temporary steering committee formed to set up the Saturday meeting.

A tentative application has already been made to Farmers

Home Administration for a \$450,000 long-term, low-interest loan to finance construction of the recreation facility.

Preliminary plans being considered include an 18-hole golf course, club house, swimming pool, tennis courts, children's playground, skeet and trap shooting facilities, riding trails and stables, dock facilities and a marina.

A 200-acre site has been offered to Lake Brownwood Rec-

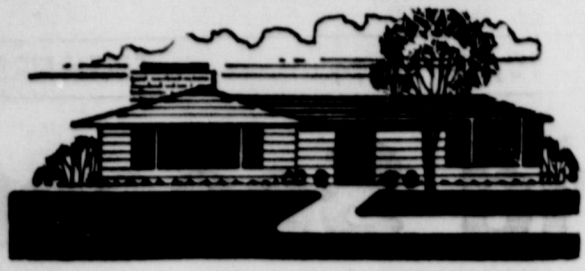
reational Assn. by Lake Brownwood Development Corp. for construction of the facility.

The offer was made through Jack Dietrich, president of the development firm, and has been tentatively accepted pending approval at the organizational meeting.

Preliminary plans call for the recreation club to be built on the shores of Lake Brownwood in the former Turner Estates area.

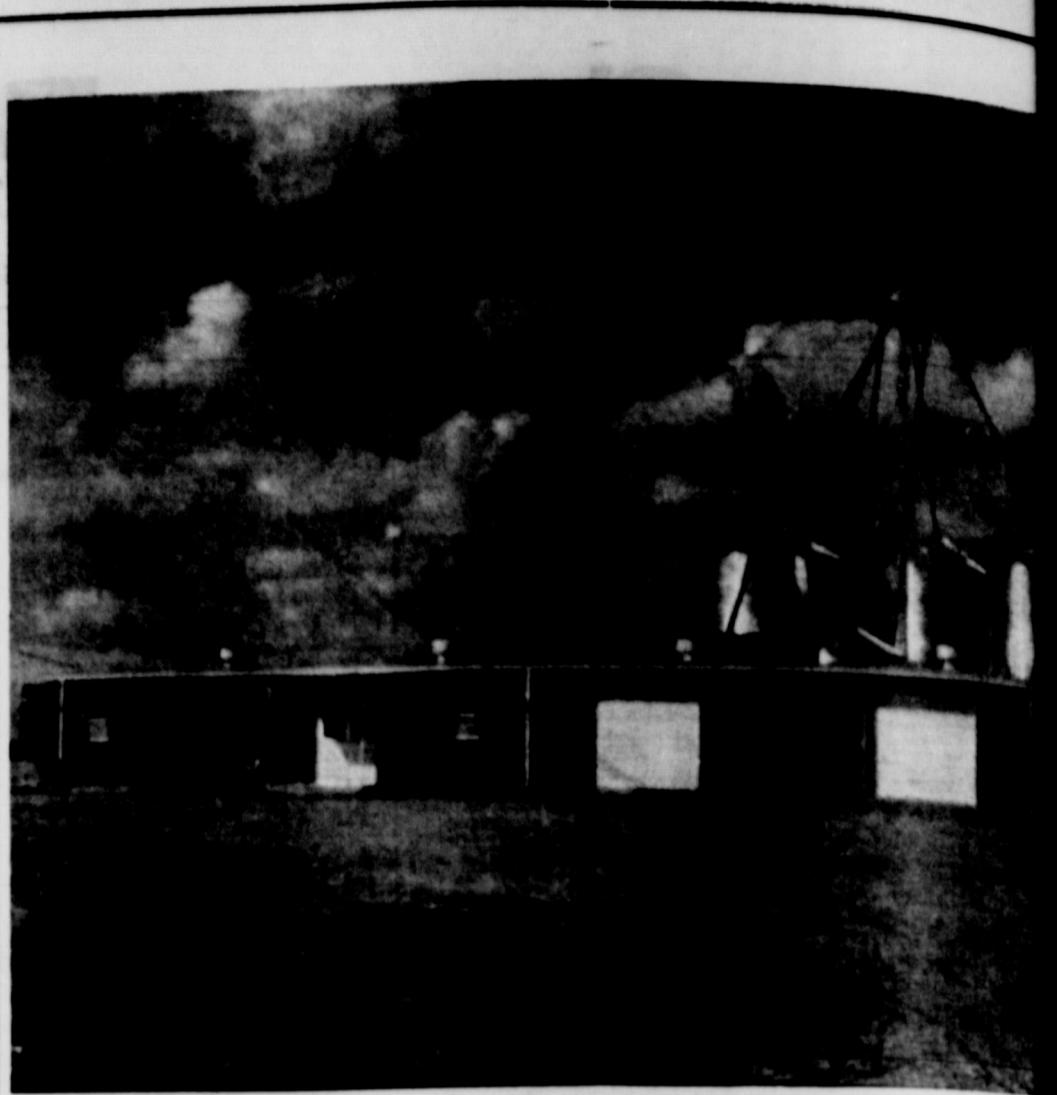

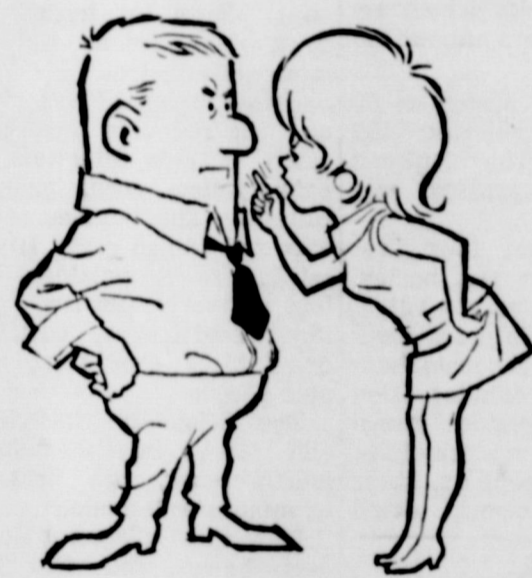

Belle Plain Gets Historical Marker

Callahan County's two most significant historical markers, erected 33 years apart, will soon stand as lonely sentinels on a country road six miles southeast of Baird. They will be less than 75 yards apart.

B. C. Chrisman of Baird, chairman of Callahan County Historical Survey Committee and one of West Texas' most dependable sources of regional history, says that the new marker will be erected within the next few weeks. It will stand some 70 yards west of one put up by Texas Centennial Commission in 1936.

The new marker will commemorate old Belle Plain College, an early-day Methodist institution of higher learning. The Centennial Commission's marker takes note of the first Callahan County seat and organization of the county in 1877.

The Belle Plain College marker will be on an 18 inch by 28 inch bronze plaque with the following wording:

"Site of Belle Plain College, early college of West Texas, founded in 1881 by Methodist Church. Enrollment reached peak of 300 and students attended from throughout the region. College developed a superior course of study with special strength in music. It had an orchestra and a brass band. A girls dormitory was built soon after founding, and in 1885 a three-story stone building was erected. School also had a military branch in town. Pupils wore blue and gray uniforms. After town lost both county seat and many citizens to Baird, 1883, college eventually closed."

The two historical markers will be on a road near the former home of Miss Billy Seale, colorful Callahan County rancher. About five miles south of Baird on Highway 283, a county road intersects the pavement — this is site of the old Seale cattle corrals. It is down this road to the east that the markers are to be located.

The new marker is being installed through matching funds put up by the county and Texas Historical Commission. This marker and its location will appear in next edition of the "Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers," in tourist guides and on maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours and to acquaint the people of Callahan County with their own unique historical past.

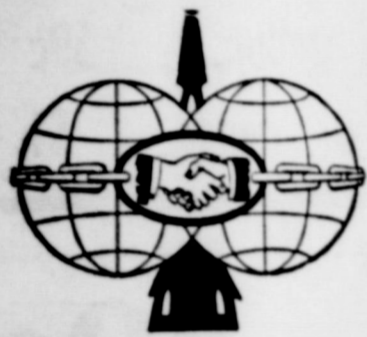

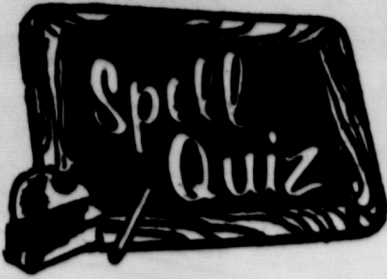
