Peanut Farmers Asked To Cast Votes In Referendum

Texas peanut producers are reminded to vote on the referendum being conducted to determine whether or not an assessment will be effective on peanuts at market time to raise funds for research, promotion,

education and disease an insect control. Ballots for voting on this proposition as well as voting for a producers board to administer this program were mailed to peanut producers Sept. 6. In order to be

valid, ballots must be marked and returned not later than Sept. 24. Growers who did not receive ballots by mail may obtain them at the offices of county agricultural agents.

The assessment program will become effective about Oct. 1, 1969, provided two-thirds of the peanut growers voting favor the assessment, or providing those voting for the assessment produced at least 50 per cent of the peanuts in Texas in 1968. Assessment amounts would be collected at the first point of sale or mortgage, and would be remitted monthly by the producers and warehousemen by the producers board elected to handle the funds. Growers who are dissatisfied with the program may obtain refunds of money collected by contacting the producers board within 60 days following the date of assessment.

Officials of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association stated that every effort is being made to obtain a representative vote from the state's 12,600 peanut growers. SWPGA is the organization certified to conduct the referendum. Association personnel have conducted educational meetings throughout Texas regarding this matter.

Wishing to make the voting procedure as convenient as possible, SWPGA officials are enclosing a return postage paid envelope with each ballot mailed to growers. Peanut growers who have not voted to date are urged to exercise this right prior to deadline date of Sept. 24. In order for ballots to be valid, the 1968 production in pounds must be entered and certified on the ballot. This information is immediately available to all growers at county ASCS offices in the event growers do not know their 1968 production totals.

Belle Plaine College First Institution Of Higher Learning West Of Brazos River

one of the official publications of the Methodist Church at that time, carried the following article:

"The fourth quarterly meeting of the Taylor County Mission was held at Buffalo Gap, a pretty good size town, Brother L. F. Collins, preacher was in charge, and J. G. Warren was the Presiding Elder. The meeting was well attended. The Lord was with them, four bright conversions and seven accessions to the church. The church was revived. On Sunday night, Brother Warren startled the Convention by announcing to the citizens of the Gap that he wanted three plots of ground

for a church, a parsonage and a college."

Before the Convention was adjourned, the liberality of the citizens of Buffalo Gap had met the occasion and before the Presiding Elder had departed, the surveyor's chain had marked the boundaries of a church, a parsonage and a plot of 10 acres was surveyed for the site of a district college.

Although the construction of a Methodist College at Buffalo Gap did not materialize, the idea of establishing a Methodist college in this section of Texas did not die.

In the summer of 1881, Belle Plaine College was founded as a district school with W. F.

Chatfield as Superintendent and Mrs. Chatfield as music teacher.

Members of the Methodist Church, citizens of Belle Plaine and public spirited citizens from all over the county contributed to the establishment and success of the college. Students from all sections of West Texas — Abilene, Cisco, Coleman, Burkett and many other places of the western frontier — were represented on the rolls of this institution.

The rapid increase in the enrollment of the school soon made the construction of a girls' dormitory necessary and a commodious "Girls' Building" was erected and opened under the supervision of the Rev.

Annis and Mrs. Annis. Uniforms of blue skirts and gray blouses were selected for the girls and they occupied the new dormitory, where both girls and boys were served their meals.

Soon after the founding of the college, a military branch, "The Texas Military Institute," was organized under the leadership of Captain Robert S. Goss, a graduate of the Kentucky Military Institute, and military training was given in connection with the regular college work.

The military branch of the school was housed in the upper rooms of several of the business buildings on the main street of Belle Plaine. The stu-

dents of the military branch of the college wore uniforms of dark blue, trimmed in gray and silver braid caps.

The college prospered and some of the outstanding instructors of the day were attracted to the institution. C. H. Virdell, a graduate of Emory College of North Carolina was one of the early instructors and also a manager of the college for a while. In 1887, Judge I. N. Onins came from the North Texas Female College at Sherman, bringing a number of the faculty and students with him. Among the instructors coming with Judge Onins was Judge A. G. Walter, of San Saba, who re-

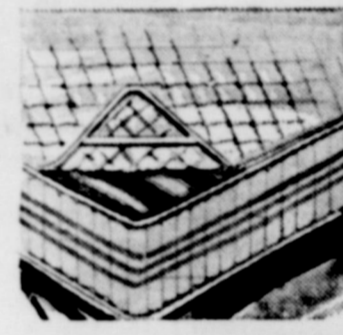

Eastland Overwhelms Buffs In Initial Outing

An unheralded team of Eastland Mavericks roamed into Buffalo Stadium Friday night and soundly whipped Cross Plains 50-0 in the 1969 football opener.

Eastland commanded almost from the start although Bison defenders delayed the eventual scoring onslaught through the first quarter with a stout goal-line stand.

The non-conference contest was marred by many mistakes. Twenty penalties were assessed, six for 52 yards against the Herd and 14 for 90 yards against the Mavericks, and eight fumbles were lost. Eastland added four pass interceptions to its demoralizing attack.

Buffalo offense never got started. The Herd managed only 68 net yards total offense. Buffs cracked Maverick territory six times, but deepest penetration carried only to the 26. Buffs did not mount a serious threat. Eastland rolled up 203 yards on the ground and 162 through the air.

Touchdown Parade

After Buffaloes held for four downs, from eight to the one, miscues and bobbles kept Buffs in deep trouble. A fumble recovery set in motion Eastland's first touchdown. Halfback Reuben Gaeta covered the last 17 yards over right side with nine minutes left in the second quarter. The kick failed, but it cracked Bison defenses. Eight minutes later Maverick halfback Randy Rexroat scampered 60 untouched yards on a punt return. Quarterback Craig Lund circled right end for two bonus points and a 14-0 lead at intermission.

Eastland rolled 55 yards in seven plays upon receiving second half kickoff. Gaeta slashed the final two yards, and end Butch Edison kicked the point. Six minutes later, following an interception, Lund skirted left end for three and a touchdown, and Gaeta added two points.

Only five seconds had elapsed in the final quarter when fullback Randy Lowrance blasted three yards up the middle for a 35-0 lead. Longest drive of the night followed as Mavericks moved 65 yards in six legal

plays after a 65-yard tally run was nullified. The score came on a 33-yard pass from Lund to Lowrance. Edison added the 42nd point. Final touchdown was set in motion by a fumble recovery with Gaeta slicing over right guard from the one. A pass from Lund to end Bob Mace netted the half century mark.

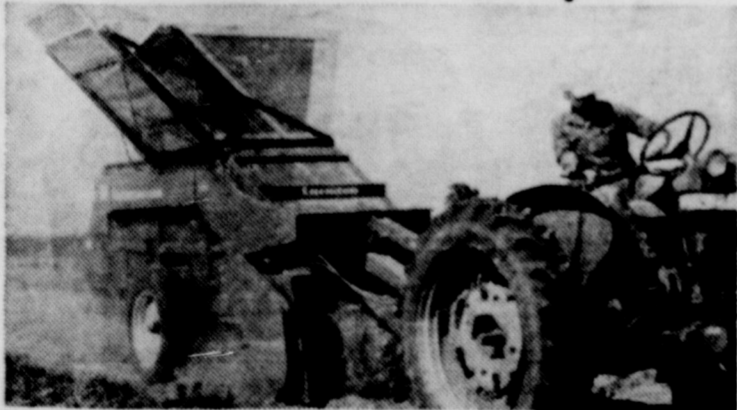

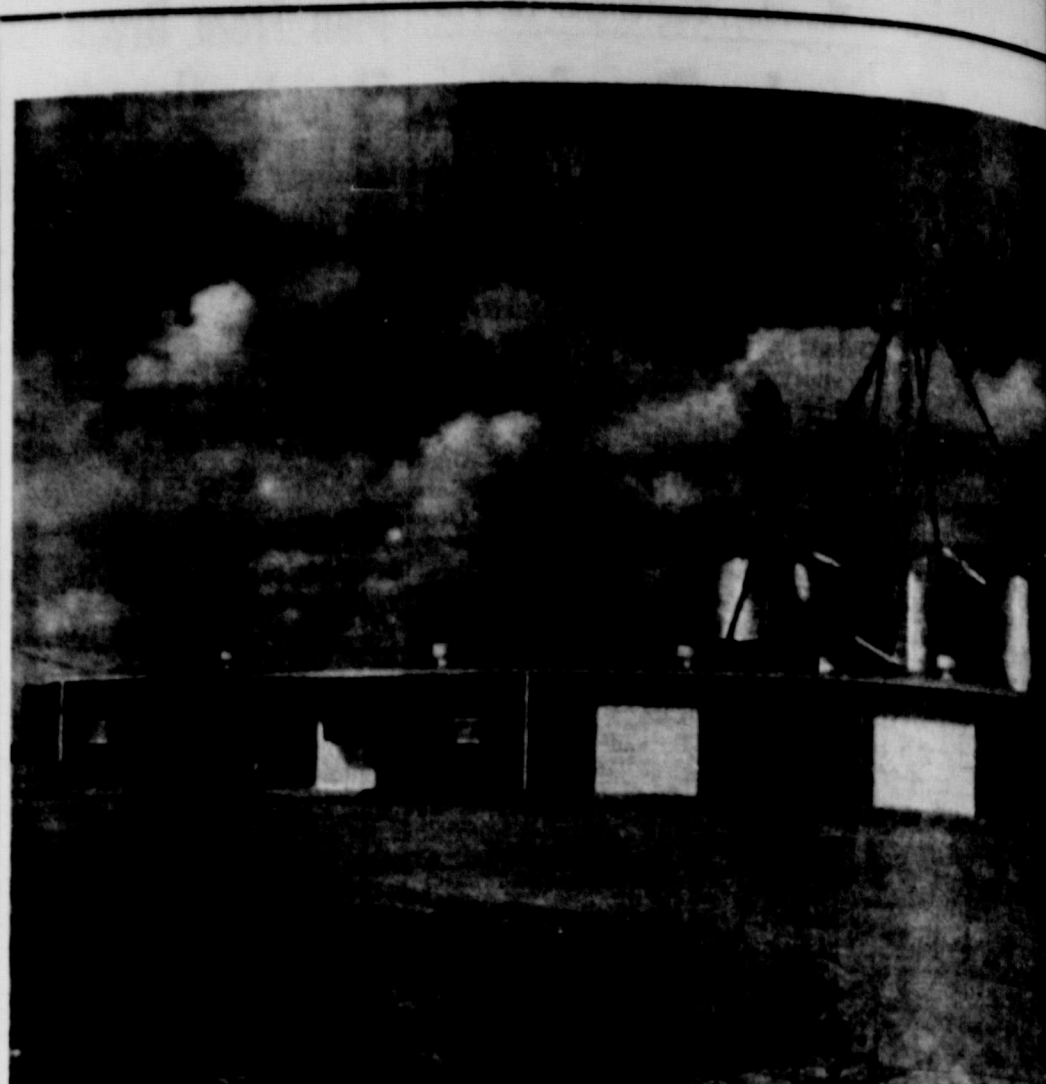

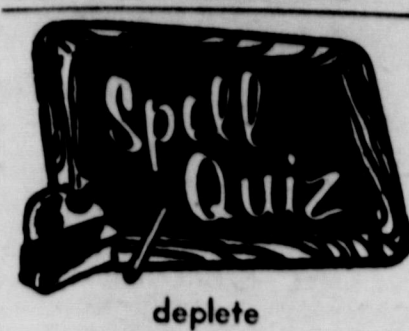
