Baird-Cross Plains Game Promises Spirited Action

Cross Plains Buffaloes and Baird Bears will renew for the 39th time, Saturday at 8 p.m., a gridiron rivalry which began in 1924.

Through the years little added incentive has been needed to provide usually near capacity crowds with thrills and excitement, and this year should be no different as both units are looking forward to a first triumph of the season. The extra feature is there this year, however. It is Baird's annual homecoming, therefore the contest is scheduled on Saturday night.

County's Winless

Both the Callahan County Class A units are winless in four outings each this year, and both lost to the one mutual foe, Eastland, by almost identical scores. Cross Plains bowed 50-0

in the season opener, and Baird fell 56-0 two weeks ago.

Defensively the two teams appear about equal statistically, both having surrendered 100-plus points, but offensively Baird holds the upper hand. The Bears have been held scoreless only once, by Eastland, while the Buffs have tallied only one time in the four outings.

Buffaloes are riding a four-game win string over the Bears, and a Herd victory Saturday would accomplish a feat neither of the schools has managed through the first 38 meetings.

That is win five years consecutively. Both teams have four-year win streaks. Baird did it first in 1934-35 and 1940-41 and again in 1961-64. Cross Plains took four straight in

1948-51, in 1954-57 and again beginning in 1965. Buffs own the biggest point spread, 37, in the series with last year's 43-6 triumph.

Baird Speedy

Speed is a big asset to the Bears, who have a dozen lettermen back from the 1968 campaign. Probably the fastest Bear is Halfback Donny Rowe, 160-pound senior, who was honorable mention all-district in 10-A last year. Power is provided by 180-pound senior Fullback James Collins. Signal calling is handled primarily by sophomore Gary Goble. Others who share in ball carrying chores include halfbacks Cecil Faircloth, 150-pound sophomore, and Johnny Vandiver, 140-pound junior.

Experience is not as abund-

ant in the line, but quality is there. Johnny Robinson, 190 senior, who was all-district last year, is back at tackle, and other starter back is End Roger Weeks, 145-pound senior. Ricky Vestal, 145 senior, who has seen action at end and in the backfield, has two letters, and Freddy Greenway, 195-pound junior, has a monogram at tackle. Guard slots are filled by 150-pound letterman Johnny Garcia and Ricky Jaggars. Randy Walker, junior, has a letter at center.

Beggs Lost

Kim Beggs, junior defensive specialist, was lost to the Herd for possibly the season last week when he suffered a recurrence of a shoulder injury against Jim Ned. Junior tackle J. S. Archer is also expected to be sidelined with a knee injury sustained in the Wylie contest. Wayne Bishop, sophomore guard, is expected to be ready for action.

Head Coach Les Cowan has indicated that about the same line-up which showed much improvement last week would probably start against Baird.

38-Game Record

Cross Plains has been victorious 19 times in the 38 games between Bisons and Bears, and Baird has won 16. Three games have ended in ties.

Rain Gives Foretaste Of Winter Over Area

The Cross Plains area experienced a foretaste of Winter this week after widespread showers Saturday netted more than an inch of rainfall over much of this section.

In Cross Plains the precipitation measured 1.30. To the north, though, it was heavier. In the Burnt Branch and Victoria communities the moisture

was lighter, measuring about a half inch at the Frank Spencer and C. R. Cook places. Rising Star measured exactly an inch. Putnam had 60.

Official Weather Bureau records reveal that Cross Plains has received 27.19 inches of rain thus far this year. With 83 days still remaining in the year, chances for 30 inches during 1969 are deemed good. Only four times has as much as 30 inches of rain been recorded here in the past 21 years.

Although peanut harvesting was slowed by the week end rain, farmers welcomed it, saying that it might possibly benefit late-maturing vines. Cotton farmers, though, are needing dry weather.

Most stock ponds are full and nearly all streams have been running this week. Prospects for Winter grazing for livestock have not been better in this area of the state within the past 20 years.

Bufs Fall To Jim Ned 8-0 On Tricky Aerial

A dippy-doodle pass play leaving three seconds in first half gave host Jim Ned Indians an 8-0 non-conference football victory over Cross Plains Buffaloes Friday night.

Only late in each half did Jim Ned mount any serious threats against a much improved herd of Buffaloes. Cross Plains spent the entire first quarter in Indian territory, and only a pass interception allowed the hosts outside of their end of the field for an unsuccessful field goal try in the second period before the tricky pass netted the only tally of the night.

Only twice more did Jim Ned penetrate Buff ground, to the 25 early in the fourth and to the six as time ran out.

Fumbles Hurt

Lost fumbles stopped three Buffalo drives and a miscue hindered another. A couple of Jim Ned bobbles also gave the Herd opportunities. Each team intercepted one of the other's passes, and gave each another scoring opportunity. Neither cashed in.

Brief Thrusts

Billy Melton gave Cross Plains the ball on a recovered fumble in the first quarter. After drawing a five-yard penalty, the Herd moved for a first at the Indian 25, but next play Jim Ned's Terry Vaughn pounced on a loose ball. A short kick put Bisons in possession at the Indian 36, and the drive carried to the 17 before bogging down.

A long punt early in the second period shoved Bufs into a hole, and then came Vaughn's interception. Three plays netted five yards, and Right End Danny Thornton attempted a 34-yard field goal which fell short. Exchange of punts left Jim Ned in possession at the Indian 42 with about a minute to play.

Quarterback Stanley Egger passed and then ran for two quick first downs to the Buff 37. Then came the fatal deceptive pass play which ended with Vaughn taking a pitch back and passing to End Dennis Elliott for the touchdown. Egger then hit Left End Mark Marshall for the two-point conversion.

Buffaloes Drive

Cross Plains took the second half kickoff, which went out of bounds at the Buff 41, and marched 53 yards in 10 plays before the drive was halted at the Indian one. Jim Ned punted and Cross Plains went to the attack again. The brief drive, covering 24 yards, was stopped when Indian Thornton recovered a fumble at the Jim Ned 21.

Three plays later Bobby

Cowan intercepted an Egger aerial and returned 34 yards to the Indian eight. An incomplete pass and rushing play netted nothing before Marshall jumped on a loose ball.

Indians Counter

Jim Ned then cranked up the offense and marched 66 yards before Buff defenses held at the 25. After two first downs Bisons punted, but Cross Plains gained the ball on the Indian 36 when Guard Mike Knott corralled a fumble. Eight plays later Marshall got the oval back for Jim Ned via the same route. Left Halfback then unreeled the longest run of the night, a 71-yard scamper to the Herd's 11. Two plays netted the Indians five yards as time ran out.

New Oil Strike In Area West Of May

Second well, a southwest offset, has been completed in the area five miles west of May in Brown County.

The Marble Falls producer is Charles L. Simons of Tyler No. 1 Jones-Burroughs, spotting 575 feet from the north and 26 feet from the west lines of F. Wardliski Survey 477.

Daily potential was 15 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Flow was through an 8-46-inch choke with packer set on the casing and 125 pounds tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 2,435-47 feet, treated with 500 gallons of mud-cut acid. The 4 1/2-inch casing is set at 2,499 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 2,504 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,000-1.

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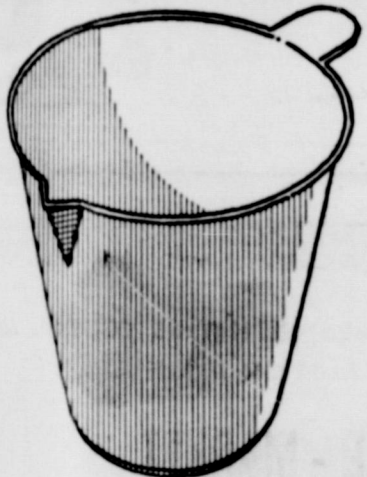
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Ben's Grid Picks
