A tough Bangs defense bottled up the usually potent Cross Plains ground attack, and the Mites resorted to air lanes for a touchdown in each half.

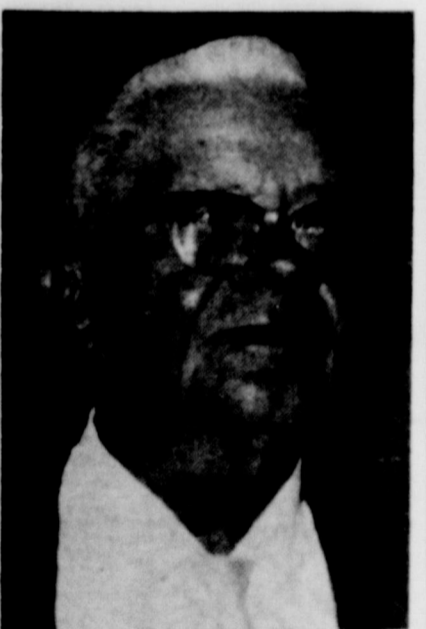

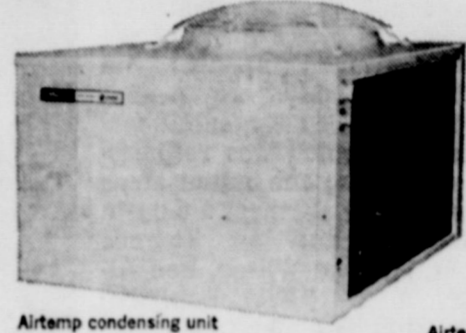

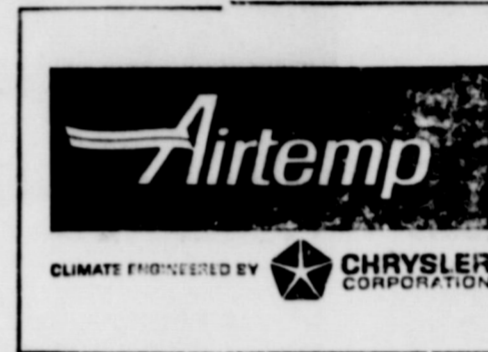

Airtemp gas fired furnace and cooling coil.

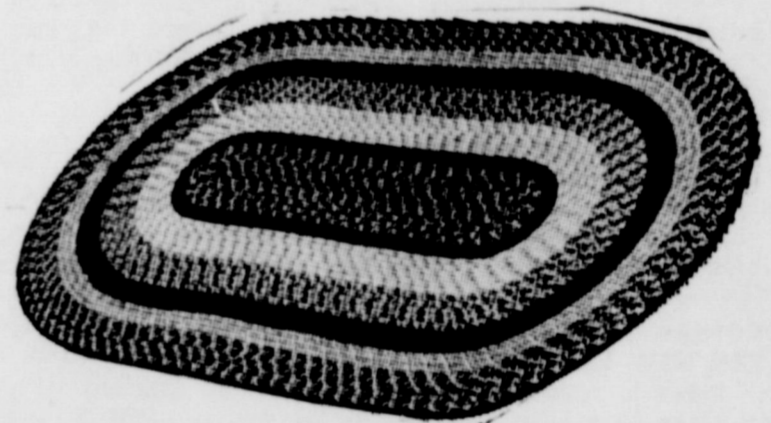

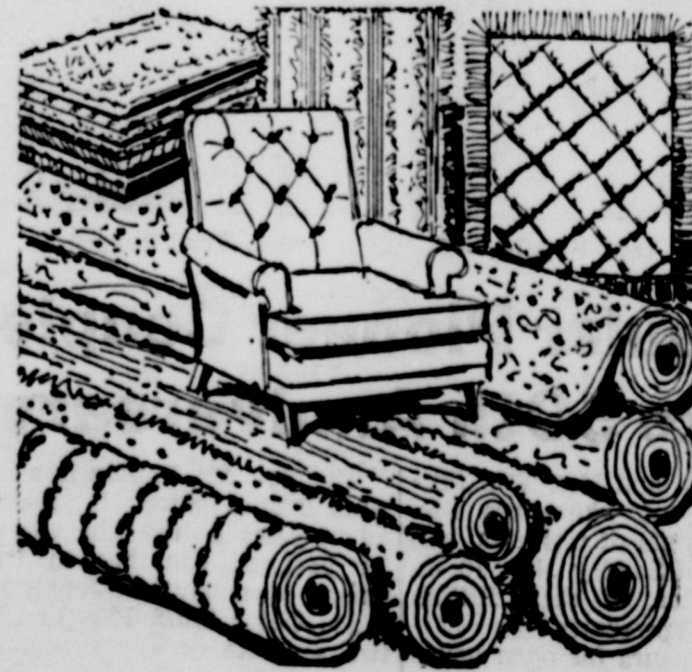

Dick Brown Suggests Early Yuletide Mailing

"Don't take a chance on disappointing someone you love. Send your gift parcels and cards early enough to insure delivery before Christmas, not after," Postmaster Dick Brown advised yesterday.

"On the day after Christmas a post office can be the most depressing place in the world," Brown added, "if it contains a mountain of messages of love and cheer that didn't make it because they were mailed too late."

Such disappointments can be avoided if Christmas mailers will observe the following mailing schedule.

Gift parcels going to distant states should be mailed by Dec. 7. Parcels going to local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than Dec. 13.

The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift parcel to permit identity in case

of damage or loss of the outside address label. The outside label should be placed on only one side of each parcel.

Greeting cards going to distant states should be mailed not later than Dec. 10. Cards going to local and nearby areas should be in the mail by Dec. 15.

Postmaster Brown emphasized the importance of using ZIP Codes and adding a return address to all mail.

ZIP Codes enable postal employees to sort and handle the mail faster. A return address insures that mail that can't be delivered because of an illegible or incomplete mailing address will be returned to the sender.

"A return address might not seem very important," Brown noted, "but last year 32 billion pieces of mail went to postal dead letter branches because the address couldn't be read and there was no return on the envelope."

Regular Season Grid Finale Carded Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes have at least one more football game this season. It is a non-conference affair Friday at 7:30 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium against the Central Catholic Chargers of Abilene. Interest of most District 9-A fans may be focused on Bangs where the Dragons and Santa Anna Mountaineers collide.

The Thundering Herd has a share of the district championship, but a share with whom won't be known until the conclusion of the Bangs-Santa Anna game Friday. A Mountie win will give Santa Anna a championship tie, and will put Cross Plains into the state playoffs. A Bangs win will move that unit into bi-district play against the District 10-A victor, who will come from the De Leon-Glen Rose battle.

Chargers Unpredictable

Abilene's Catholic Chargers have played hot and cold through the season, although injuries have hampered efforts.

A healthy team romped unmercifully over Class B opponents early in the season, but later dropped decisions to Class A foes.

Both teams lost to Wylie and Bangs with Buffs faring better against the latter and the Chargers rating better against

In commenting about things seen on the inspection trip with the geologist, Henslee wrote: "The man of science stated that the earthquake antedated any geological history which the

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

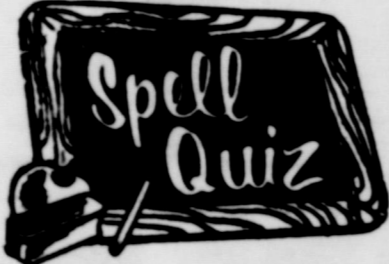

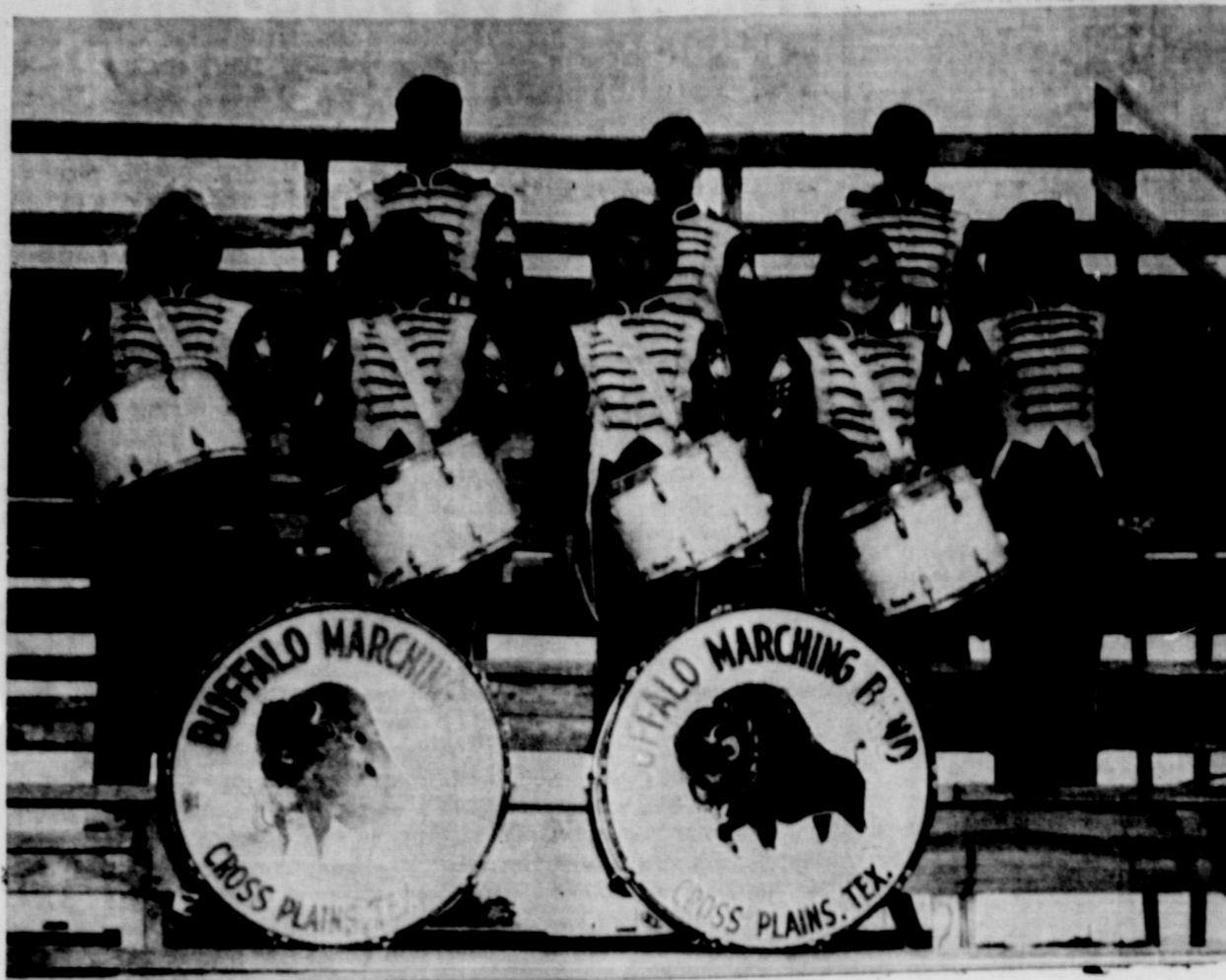
