"True, weaning and wintering calves have never been particularly easy. Most sickness and death losses occur during weaning. Odom weans calves on forages - chopped sudangrass, alfalfa and crested wheatgrass, which they are used to eating. Calves usually are vaccinated with an antibiotic at weaning.

"Last year, he wintered 900 calves, mostly crossbreds. Calves get about 31/2 pounds of grain per head daily plus ground hay until Christmas. After that, they get about 41/2 pounds of grain.






