## Lie-Detector Utilized In McClure Murder Probe

A Mexican national was taken to Austin Tuesday to undergo polygraph tests in connection with the fatal shooting of Victor E. McClure, 51, at his trailer-home six miles northeast of Cross Plains. He was in custody of Sheriff Grayson Miller and Texas Ranger Sid Merchant.

Arrangements have been made for other persons to be tested in the capitol city within the next week or 10 days. Two other Rangers, Jim Riddle of Midland and H. R. Block of Brownwood, are said to be assisting local officers and F. B. Rocha in the investigation.

## Robbers Slug Bobby McMillan And Make Off With \$523.79

Bobby McMillan of Abilene, who was reared in Cross Plains, was hit over the head by robbers at the Colonel Sanders Kentucky Fried Chicken place in Abilene Sunday night and robbed of \$523.79.

McMillan, manager of the business, was sitting in an office in the building counting the day's receipts when he heard a knock on the locked door.

He said he asked who it was and he said he thought he recognized the voice after it was repeated the second time. McMillan said he opened the door, went back into the office, and a man entered carrying a butcher knife. He said the man waved the knife around and said, "I'm gonna' cut you, man."

McMillan said he thought the man was "kidding," but about that time the second man entered with a small caliber pistol

in his hand and told him, "Get against the wall."

One of the men then slugged McMillan with what he said "felt like a bag filled with iron". McMillan said he was knocked to his knees and one of the men said, "I don't think you got him."

He was then struck again and, according to McMillan, "I played possum and I heard one say, 'You got him that time'."

McMillan said they grabbed the money from the desk where he had been counting it and fled out the back door.

McMillan's wife had left about 9:20 p.m. to take home an employee and returned shortly after the robbery happened. McMillan was alone in the building when the robbery occurred. McMillan is a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. T. Y. Woody of Cross Plains. He is a 1965 graduate of Cross Plains High School.

## Bisons, Buffettes Earn Top 9 - A Cage Ratings

Buffalo and Buffette basketball teams of Cross Plains High School climbed atop District 9-A standings last week as the half-way point in conference warfare nears.

Buffettes upset Santa Anna girls, pre-season favorite, 37-36 here last Friday for a fourth consecutive victory and third in league play, to maintain the only unblemished loop mark. Local feminine eagerness decisioned Bangs girls 56-45 Tuesday of last week.

Buffaloes romped to two triumphs last week, routing Santa Anna 63-33 on Friday and besting Bangs 74-48 on Tuesday. The Herd owns the loop's best record, 3-0, but Goldthwaite was also unbeaten, 2-0, at last week's close.

The two easy victories complemented the Herd's number one ranking among area Class A schools.

**Surprising Upset**  
Buffettes pulled the biggest upset in 9-A to date Friday by beating Santa Anna 37-36. Trailing 26-22 at intermission, Buffettes forced a stalling Santa Anna sextet into turnovers and eventual downfall in the second half. Each team drew 15 personal fouls, Santa Anna counting on 14 shots to 11 for locals, but Buffettes netted 13 field goals to 11 for the visitors.

Santa Anna's Vickie Neff tallied 18 points, but three Cross Plains forwards hit in double figures, Paula Petty 16, Lydia Albrecht 11 and Terry Edington 10.

Tuesday at Bangs Buffettes used a 23-point second quarter for a 56-43 win. Miss Edington sizzled the nets for 29 points, Miss Petty bucketed 20 and Miss

Albrecht counted seven. Pam Millican led Bangs with 19.

**Bufs Win Two**  
Bisons rolled on undefeated in 9-A play against Bangs on Tuesday. The Herd defense was superlative in the first quarter, limiting host Dragons to just three points, while Bisons dropped in 18. Eleven Herdsmen saw action in the tilt.

Leslie Cowan poured in 26 points to pace scoring, and two other Bisons tallied in double figures, Larry Bishop 15 and Robert Lewis 14. Others scoring were James McMillan 9, Bobby Cowan 6 and Mike Knott 4. Billy Nelson led Bangs with 20 markers.

Although hitting only 36.6 per cent of floor shots, Buffettes recorded a 63-33 win over Santa Anna here Friday. Again a blistering first quarter attack and almost faultless defense valuted Cross Plains out front early. Buffaloes owned a 22-4 advantage after eight minutes. Starters saw action in only the first and third periods.

Several from this community attended the Callahan County Fat Stock Show at the exposition barn on State Highway 206 Friday and Saturday. It was one of the best.

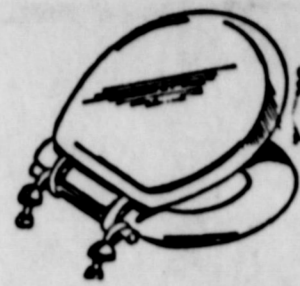

## Car Tags To Go On Sale Feb. 1

Auto license tags will go on sale in Cross Plains and at all county courthouses Feb. 2.

Passenger car tags assigned to the Cross Plains area were delivered to the office of Mrs. Maurine McCuin this week. They all bear the prefix DCN. Callahan County numbers will be preceded by one of these other four prefixes: DCK, DCL, DCM and DCP.

Albert Lovell, Callahan County tax assessor-collector, reports that this county receives about \$112,000 in revenue from the auto licensing. This is greater than the combined tax on real estate and personal property, which together totals approximately \$108,000 on a 100 per cent collection.

Lovell explained that counties receive the first \$50,000 from auto registrations, then get one-half of the amount from that point to \$175,000.

New tags may be displayed on vehicles anytime after Feb. 2 (the first falls on Sunday and offices will not be open for selling) and must be used by April 1.

## Major Known He Killed In Viet Sk

Mr. and Mrs. Claude Warren of Merkel, former longtime residents of Cross Plains, were notified last Thursday of the death of their son, Air Force Major Tommy Ray Warren, in Vietnam.

Maj. Warren was killed Jan. 15, when his F-4 Phantom jet was hit by ground fire while attacking a target.

The major was knocked unconscious. The pilot then declared an emergency and proceeded to near Ubun, Thailand, the nearest base.

About 17 miles from Ubun the pilot ejected both himself and Maj. Warren but, according to the Air Force letter, Warren was dead at the time of ejection.

Arrangements are pending word from the major's wife, the former Sharon Hutchinson, who lives in Tucson with her three children, Tommy Jr., 11, Becky, 10, and Wally, 8. Mrs. Warren's mother, Mrs. Lola Hutchinson, lives in Abilene.

One of Maj. Warren's brothers, Joe of Brady, said there is a possibility of a general with burial in a military cemetery. Surviving are his wife and three children, two brothers, Joe and R. C. Jr. of Arlington.

Warren was a second lieutenant in a military exercises held at Force Base June 1967. He attended Merkel High School, a freshman. He attended Hardin-Simmons University prior to joining the Air Force.
