We can . . . if we will.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was prepared by Murray Edwards of Clyde, President of the Future Farmers of America in recognition of FFA Week Feb. 21-28.

In the 1970's, bright as those years may appear, we will be entering a crisis — a world crisis far greater than either of the world wars or the Korean or Vietnam conflicts. As in other world crises, the United States will be drawn into this war because only we have the technology and the resources to fight it. It will be a war on hunger.

This disaster is beginning to show itself now. In India the population is outgrowing its food supply. China is preparing for war in the near future because it does not possess the technology nor the fertile land with which to feed its people. Even today two-thirds of the world's population go to bed hungry. We, as Future Farmers, cannot escape the bleak realities that look us in the eye.

We will have basically the same tools as in the past with which to fight this battle against starvation. Only four per cent of the earth's surface, or about 3½ billion acres, is suitable for crop production. Today in 1970, there are 3½ billion people in the world, or a ratio of one person to one acre of land. In the year 2000, our world population will have doubled. Obviously our land area will not increase; we will dilute this ratio to one person fed on one-half acre of land. Will the Future Farmer of today and the successful young farmer of tomorrow be able to win the war against hunger?

Strangely enough, we already possess the knowledge to defeat our foe. We have the knowledge it would take to increase the production of food around the world greatly — knowledge to increase yields 20 and 30 times compared to present output. For example, if the six countries surrounding Japan (Thailand, Korea, Indonesia, India, Malaya and Taiwan) could lift their rice yields to the average of the Japanese, the increase in the production of rice would be sufficient to feed 2½ billion people for one year. If these six countries and Japan could lift their rice yields to the level now considered to be the top 20 per cent, the increase in the production of rice could feed four billion people for one year.

Future Farmers, we possess the knowledge and the skill to make the word "hunger" obsolete in our world. Perhaps in the 1970's as we assume our role in this fast-changing occupation called agriculture, we can change the attitude of an indifferent America. We can . . . if we will.

Filing Deadline Nears For City, School Board Posts

Wednesday of next week, March 4, marks the last day in which candidates may file for listings on ballots for two upcoming elections. They are that of school trustee and places on the City Council. Both ballotings will be April 4, and statutes require that aspirants file 30

days before the election. Three vacancies are occurring on the City Council. They are that of mayor and two aldermen posts. Mayor Doyle Burchfield has filed for re-election, as also have Aldermen Raymond DeBusk and T. T. Nichols. V. L. Hobby has also filed as a

candidate for one of the council places. Two vacancies are developing on the school board. These are trustee places presently held by Dr. Carl J. Sohns and Tommie Harris, both of whom will seek re-election. No other candidates have filed.

Direct Distance Dialing Coming To Local Telephones March 1

Direct Distance Dialing comes to Cross Plains, Rising Star and May on Sunday, March 1, according to Jim Fryar, district manager for Texas Telephone and Telegraph Company.

On that date, the three communities will be connected to the DDD network. Telephone users here will be able to dial their own station-to-station long distance calls direct to some 60,000 cities in the continental United States, Canada and parts of Mexico.

There are three easy steps to using DDD:

First — Dial your DDD Access Code.

Second — Dial the Distant Area Code (except when it's 817).

Third — Dial the Distant Phone Number.

Customers will be able to dial long distance calls almost as easily as a local call. The Access Code is the key which opens the door to the DDD equipment. The distant Area Code tells DDD the area being called. The distant telephone number serves as the telephone "city and state" address.

To take full advantage of Direct Distance Dialing, it's im-

portant to know the Area Code and number you're calling," Fryar said. "Area Codes for many cities that can be dialed direct are in the front pages of the telephone directory.

"If you don't know the telephone number, look for the city in the list of Area Codes. You can reach the Directory Assistance Operator there by dialing the Access Code, the Area Code for the city, and 555-1212. Give her the name and address of the person you're calling. She'll get you the distant phone number.

"If the city is not listed, dial Operator and ask for the Area Code of the city you're calling. Naturally, there's no charge for a call to Directory Assistance. . . . should reach a wrong number," Fryar explained, "try to find out the name of the city and the telephone number. Then hang up and dial the local operator. Tell her the city and wrong number so you won't be billed for the call."

Some types of Long Distance calls cannot be dialed direct. They are: person-to-person, collect, conference calls, credit card calls, calls charged to another phone and calls from coin phones. These calls should be placed with the operator.

Direct Distance Dialing is timed by modern electronic equipment. It records the number of the called telephone, its location, and the time conversation begins and ends.

Economic station-to-station long distance rates are charged on DDD calls. The equipment records only completed calls and the time one telephone is actually connected to another. If a distant number is busy or doesn't answer, no charge will be made.

"We're pleased that we could add this new feature to telephone service here," Fryar said. "We believe residents will like the convenience of dialing their own long distance calls."

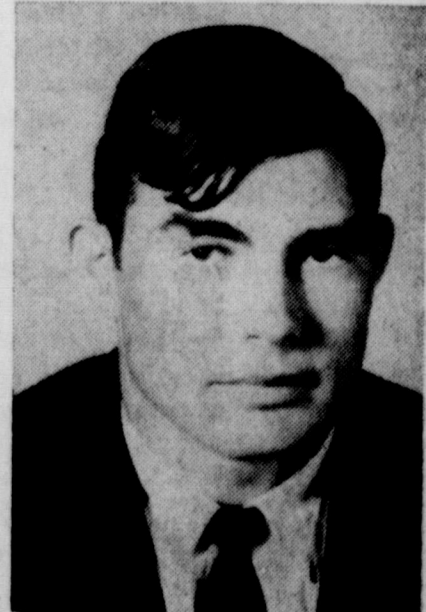
Leslie Cowan Signs Letter To Play Football For T.C.U. Horned Frogs

Leslie Cowan, outstanding Buffalo football player and son of Mr. and Mrs. Les Cowan, has signed a pre-enrollment letter of intent to play football under scholarship at Texas Christian University next fall.

Signing was done quietly at the family home here last week with Allie White, TCU defensive line coach, accepting the agreement. Cowan, a six-foot five-inch 235-pounder, will receive a four-year football scholarship at the Fort Worth university.

In two years of eligibility, he earned letters in both football and basketball. As a Buffalo griddier, Cowan was a versatile performer. He played no less than three different positions on offense during the 1969 campaign: end, wingback and fullback. Defensively, however, the 17-year-old was a permanent fixture at defensive end. He also did placement kicking for the Herd.

As a senior he was named to the all-district defensive unit at end, and won honorable mention rating in 1968. Cowan also earned all-district and all-area

recognition in basketball during the 1968-69 season.

Cowan is thought to be only the second Cross Plains athlete ever to sign with a Southwest Conference school. Joe Gary inked with Texas University in 1957, and played a year there before transferring to Trinity where he became a Little All-American.

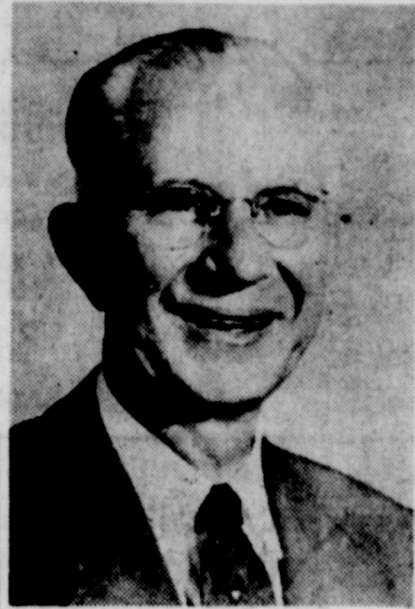

Townspeople Will Get Home Mail Delivery

Discussing local effects of a new postal order making mail delivery available to millions of residents of small towns throughout the United States, Cross Plains Postmaster Dick Brown reminded that patrons living less than a quarter mile from the post office must continue to use the office facilities.

"But," the postmaster noted, "that's no more than a few blocks. This order, however, will make the home deliveries available wherever desired by the majority of those living beyond a quarter mile."

"This distance factor can be significant for much of the year in areas where severe weather conditions prevail; in areas where large numbers of older persons are living, or in more remote sections where even a little distance may mean a lot

in terms of travel difficulties." The expansion of services should be virtually complete in all of the affected delivery service areas — under actions taken by postal regional offices, acting on recommendations of local postmasters — by Feb. 1, 1971.

It will be accomplished principally by adding delivery stops to already existing rural de-

livery routes, or by expanding the area served by some shorter rural route for the purpose, and a limited number of new rural routes may also be needed in other instances.

The fact that fewer persons will be calling at post offices for their mail will not alter the independent status of any of the post offices where the service change is provided.

Herd Grabs Bi-District Title In 80-77 Thriller

Cross Plains Buffaloes won bi-district basketball championship in an 80-77 nerve-wracking overtime victory over Albany Lions in Abilene's Eagle Gym Monday night.

The Thundering Herd came from far behind, being down as much as 17 points in first quarter, to end regulation play in a 71-71 deadlock. Bisons grabbed the lead after about a third of the three-minute extra period had elapsed, and won a trip to Region II-A tournament at Denton Saturday.

Regional Tourney It was not known here Tuesday noon who Cross Plains will meet in the tourney, which will be held in the men's gym at North Texas State University. Elimination clashes are slated at 8:30 and 10:15 Saturday morning, and winners will collide that night.

Big Rally Frigid Buffaloes fell behind

25-9 in first eight minutes to hot shooting Lions, District 10-A kings. Albany's initial hard press hindered Buff efforts, but in second period Cross Plains employed a man-to-man defense. It resulted in limiting Lions to 11 points while the Herd counted 24, narrowing the halftime deficit to 36-33. Buffalo position improved only one point in the third canto, 56-54, but Bisons knotted the score in last few seconds of regulation play. Discounting early seconds, the Herd owned a lead only once before the overtime, and that was only one point late in the game.

James McMillan paced Buff scoring in the fateful extra period with four points, a bucket and two free shots, upping his night's output to 14. Leslie Cowan added three points to his 16 in the overtime, and Robert Lewis hit two foul tosses for a 13-point total. Bobby Cowan was leading Herd scorer with 23 points, and Larry Bishop had 11.

Albany's Larry Shoemaker led all scorers with a sizzling 42 points. Buffs won at the foul line, hitting 26 of 38 shots, while Albany netted 15 of 26 attempts. Lions had 31 field goals to 27 for Cross Plains.

Foul trouble hit both units, and two Buffs, Ronnie Pancake and Joe Dodds, came off the bench at critical times to do outstanding jobs.

The triumph avenged a loss to Albany in bi-district last year. Cross Plains will carry a 22-4 record to Denton.

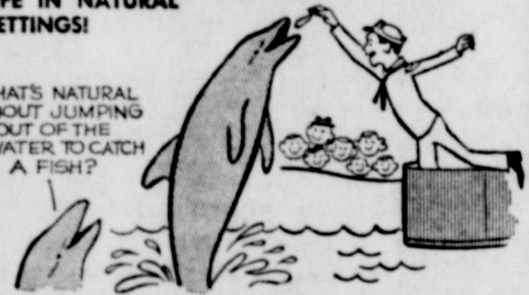

Cookie Sales Hit 1,680 Boxes Here

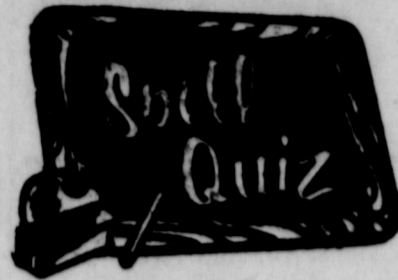
Cross Plains area people bought 1,680 boxes of Girl Scout cookies during a recent nine-day sales campaign.
