City And School Voting Saturday

Saturday will be election day in Cross Plains. Two separate balloting are scheduled at the City Hall.

Mrs. Bill Kilgore will serve as judge for the annual city election, to be held in the front office at the City Hall. Three vacancies are to be filled on the City Council. They are that

of mayor, for which Doyle Burchfield is unopposed for re-election, and T. T. Nichols and Raymond DeBusk, incumbents, and V. L. Hobdy, who seeks a first term on the board.

The other election, that of school trustee, for which two are to be elected, will be held in the back room at the City Hall. Candidates are Dr. Carl J. Sohns and Tommie Harris, up for re-election, and R. C. Merryman, who is running for the first time. This election will be presided over by Alton Hornsby.

Polls for both referendums will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Results are expected to be announced within 30 minutes after closing.

City councilmen are elected for two-year terms and school trustees for three-year tenures. Hold-overs on the council are: Gerald Bowden, Oscar Koenig and Jimmie Lee Payne. Hold-overs on the school board are: Vernon Phillips, Noah Johnson, Roy Neil Tatom, Lewis Fortune and R. D. (Dick) Koenig.

Mrs. Kilgore reported that her election clerks will be Mrs. L. D. Koenig and Mrs. John Pruet. She asked that voters bring registration receipts. "We should adopt the habit of carrying the receipt with us to elections, even though it is possible to vote without doing so," she said.

Home Mail Delivery Goes To 35 Families

Thirty-five Cross Plains families will begin receiving home mail delivery Saturday morning.

Postmaster Dick Brown advises that 18 families will be served by Route 1 and 17 by Route 2. Extensions of about a mile and one-half are being made to each of the routes.

Others wishing delivery of mail may avail themselves of this service by erecting boxes along the route of travel, the postmaster said. He advised that boxes should be three and one-half feet above ground level and have name printed on left side.

"Any questions regarding this service will be answered by post office personnel," Postmaster Brown said.

A memorial service will be held at Atwell Cemetery the last Sunday in next month, May 31, at which time an effort will be made to establish an endowment fund of \$3,000.

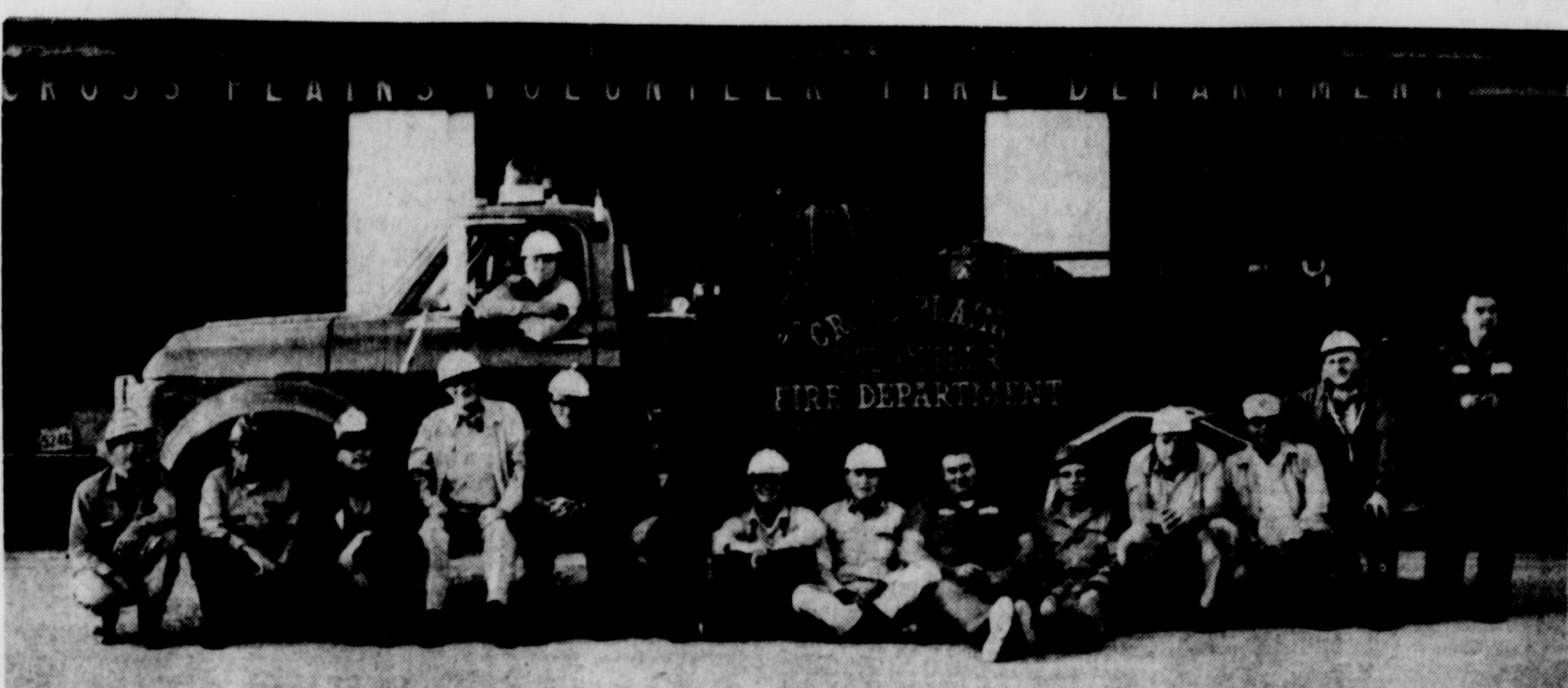

Burleson Pledges To Continue Fight For Interests Of District

Congressman Omar Burleson has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to Congress, subject to the Democratic Primary May 2 and the General Election in November. The 17th Congressional District, which he represents, is composed of 31 counties, covering approximately 30,000 square miles. Within this area live about 440,000 people.

Burleson says, "During my tenure of office I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions in the halls of Congress; Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our district, our state and our nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense," gained through the years of public service. "I have tried to see that tax money is spent as wisely and as judiciously as you would have spent it had you been in my place," he said.

"The record will show that a greater part of the time I have found myself in the minority in opposing the vast spending programs of doubtful value which have been put into effect in recent years. In every session of the Congress the record will show my votes for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department and far less than actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said. He continued, "Without meaning to appear boastful, if the Congress had followed those of us who have voted con-

sistently over the years for fiscal responsibility, our financial affairs would not be in the shape they are today."

"In areas providing for the defense of our country, I have always supported those things to make and keep our nation stronger than any other in the world," he said.

"I have been discerning in separating those activities which the federal government was not designed to do, from those which are truly its responsibility," he said.

Burleson said that activities of state and local governments, in accordance with the Constitution, should not be infringed and encroached upon by the federal government.

"The federal government does have specific missions," he said. He gave as examples the conservation of our natural resources, the defense of the country and its general welfare.

"At the same time," he said,

"the federal government can not and should not try to take care of everything from Washington, either foreign or domestic. The federal government has grown to colossal proportions and centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed and my record is clear in this respect."

Burleson is among the senior members of the U.S. House of Representatives in point of service. He was elected to the 80th Congress from the 17th District and has been re-elected to each succeeding Congress. He is a member of the Ways and Means Committee, considered to be the most powerful and prestigious in the House.

Burleson is a former county attorney and county judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U.S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, and saw duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

Burleson ended his formal announcement by saying, "Although not having opposition in this year's election, it is my hope to visit my constituency as opportunity affords. The Congress being in session at this time and expected to be long after the Primary Election, there will be little time to leave duties in Washington. I expect, however, to get back home at short intervals to do the best I can in seeing my friends and to make new ones. I believe it is incumbent upon a Congressman to know people and that they know him, to have the best representation. This is fundamental to our system."
