## Light Vote Polled In Saturday's Election

Less than 43 per cent of Callahan County's voting strength was polled in the first Democratic primary Saturday. With a total of 3,989 registrations, only 1,706 ballots were counted at seven polling places and in the absentee box. Totals by precincts were as follows:

Heaviest percentages of voting strength were tallied in commissioner's precincts two and four, where contested races were offered for commissioner.

In the commissioner 4 precinct — Cross Plains — Duke Mitchell, the incumbent, was given another four-year term without the necessity of a runoff. He polled 387 to 199 for Nathan Foster and 76 for Bill Lawrence.

In commissioner's precinct 2, which includes Denton Valley and Oplin, the incumbent Glen Swor goes into a runoff with Lowell Johnson. They emerged high — only one vote apart, in a five-man race. The count

was: Winfred Scott 40, Billy R. Windham 18, Ray Floyd 30, Swor 66 and Johnson 65.

Candidates who carried Cross Plains, in every instance carried Callahan County. Those who won this county went on to gain election in every instance but one. That was in the race for land commissioner, where both Cross Plains and

Callahan County gave slight majorities to the incumbent Jerry Sadler, who was unseated in a three-man contest by Bob Armstrong, who beat both opponents.

Joe C. Hanna of Breckenridge, a new-comer to politics, won the post of state representative from the 53rd District upsetting Burke Musgrove, who sought a third term. Hanna carried four of the five counties in the district gaining victory by 850 votes. The five-county totals were Hanna 7,604 and Musgrove 6,754.

### Tornado Left Rare Evidence Of Force

A quarter-inch highline cable, a strand which normally transmits thousands of volts of electricity on a three-phase line, was unwound, bent and tangled like a twine string by the recent tornado southeast of Cross Plains. Approximately a quarter mile of the big wire fell victim to the colossal blow. A section of the wire was shown in Cross Plains Saturday by Bud Reed.

Many fences must be rebuilt, the wind having ripped wire from posts and scattered it over a wide area of country. On the Graham Ranch, southeast of Cross Plains, grass was literally pulled from the ground and a former lush hillside now is reported as bare as a billiard table.

### DOUG DALLAS EXPECTS OVERSEAS ASSIGNMENT

Mrs. J. D. Dallas flew to Waukegan, Ill., Saturday to accompany her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Douglas Dallas on an automobile trip to Cross Plains where she will remain while her husband serves in Vietnam. He is expected to depart for overseas within the near future, but will receive a short furlough at home before going. The two ladies arrived here late Monday.

Lloyd Bentsen, who beat Ralph Yarborough for the United States Senate nomination, carried Callahan County 943 to 710.

Favorites in Cross Plains and Callahan County, who went on to ultimate election included: Crawford Martin for attorney general; Ben Ramsey for railroad commissioner; James Denton for the Supreme Court, Truman Roberts for the Court of Criminal Appeals, and Austin McCloud for Chief Justice of Court of Civil Appeals, 11th Judicial District.

## Traffic Mishaps Mark Week End

Three traffic mishaps, two of major proportions, occurred last week end along a strip of State Highway 36 extending east and west about 12 miles from Cross Plains. The accidents happened in a period of 11 hours, according to estimated times by Highway Patrolman H. D. Welch of Cross Plains, investigating officer.

Possibly the most serious crash occurred at 1:15 a.m. Sunday one and one-half miles west of Cross Plains.

Gregg Williams, 18-year-old 1969 graduate of Cross Plains High School and son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Williams of Rising Star, slammed into the rear of a parked, loaded grain truck. He was rushed to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Higginbotham ambulance, and was in intensive care Monday.

The impact ripped Williams' 1965 Chevrolet in half, throwing him onto the pavement. The front portion of the auto traveled about 48 feet, stopping in middle of the roadway. The rear portion came to rest in the north borrow ditch 167 feet from impact point.

The truck, owned by Abate & Abate of Bremond, was parked on the road's shoulder, and sustained only a ruined rear trailer axle. Estimated damage was \$700. Driver of the truck, Robert Lee Brown, 41, of Waco, had just returned from Rising Star with another Abate & Abate driver and truck and was reportedly waiting to turn around to position the tractor vehicle to refuel the tractor Williams struck. Both Williams and Brown's truck were headed toward Cross Plains.

Two persons were injured in a two-vehicle wreck at Rowden Saturday at 4:05 p.m. Hurt were Jerry McDonald, 86-year-old longtime Rowden resident, and Larry D. Clifton, 20, of Brownwood.

Patrolman Welch reported that McDonald's 1967 pickup entered Highway 36 from south at crossroads just east of the Rowden store, and was struck in middle by Clifton's 1966 Pontiac, traveling west. Impact knocked loose the pickup bed and hurled it 223 feet, and the light truck stopped 160 feet


