Seedling Diseases Hit Peanut Fields

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has issued a progress report on the status of the lesser cornstalk borer in peanut fields in Central Texas. Commissioner White reported that after a survey of over a thousand acres of peanuts, only a few fields have been reported as having an infestation of the lesser cornstalk borer. He also stated that only a few moths were found in the fields.

The De Leon Research Laboratory reports that moth catch in its light traps has dropped sharply.

About 75 per cent of peanut fields checked have shown a high degree of infestation of seedling disease. Rhizoctonia and diploia are the two most common fungi present. Commissioner White noted that seed box treatment with a fungicide should help control seedling diseases and recommends that farmers check with their county agricultural agents for the guide that suggests fungicides.

White strongly stressed that insecticides not be used until the infestation warranted such use. There are many reasons why this action should be taken.

He ended the progress report by saying, "Lesser cornstalk borer population seems to be low in peanut fields at present. However, past experience has shown that this insect can and does multiply rapidly. Farmers should continue to check their fields often for the presence of this serious peanut insect pest."

Bond Sales Lagging In 4 - County Sector

Treasury Department reports show the sale of U. S. Savings Bonds — series E and H securities and Savings Notes — are lagging in Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Eastland and Comanche Counties.

H. L. Evans, Jr., chairman of Brown County savings bond committee, reports May sales totaled \$44,753, bringing the aggregate for 1970 to \$111,193, which is 34 per cent of the \$330,000 quota set for this year.

Howard E. Farmer, Callahan bond chairman, announced May sales amounted to \$3,810, bringing the total for 1970 to \$30,728, which represents 24 per cent of the annual goal.

Robert I. Bowen, Jr., Coleman County bond sales chairman, reports May purchases ran \$6,787, bringing the 1970 total to \$37,242 and representing 31 per cent of the annual goal of \$120,000.

Eastland County sales during May were \$14,042, bringing to \$89,557 total purchases for 1970, representing 30 per cent of the annual quota of \$300,000.

Jack W. Moore, Comanche County bond sales chairman, said May purchases ran \$4,631, making the total thus far this year \$34,894, being 22 per cent of the yearly quota.

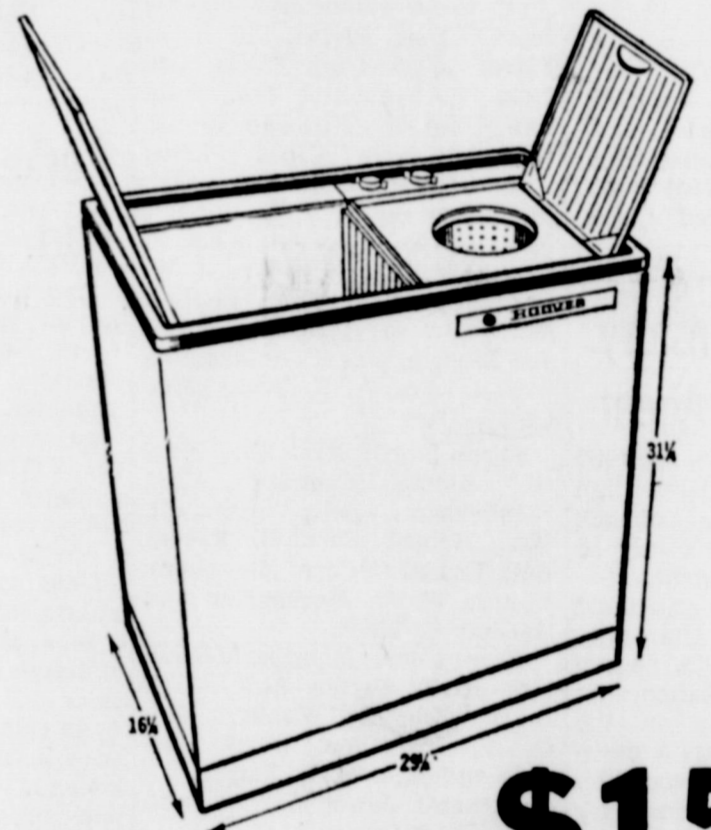

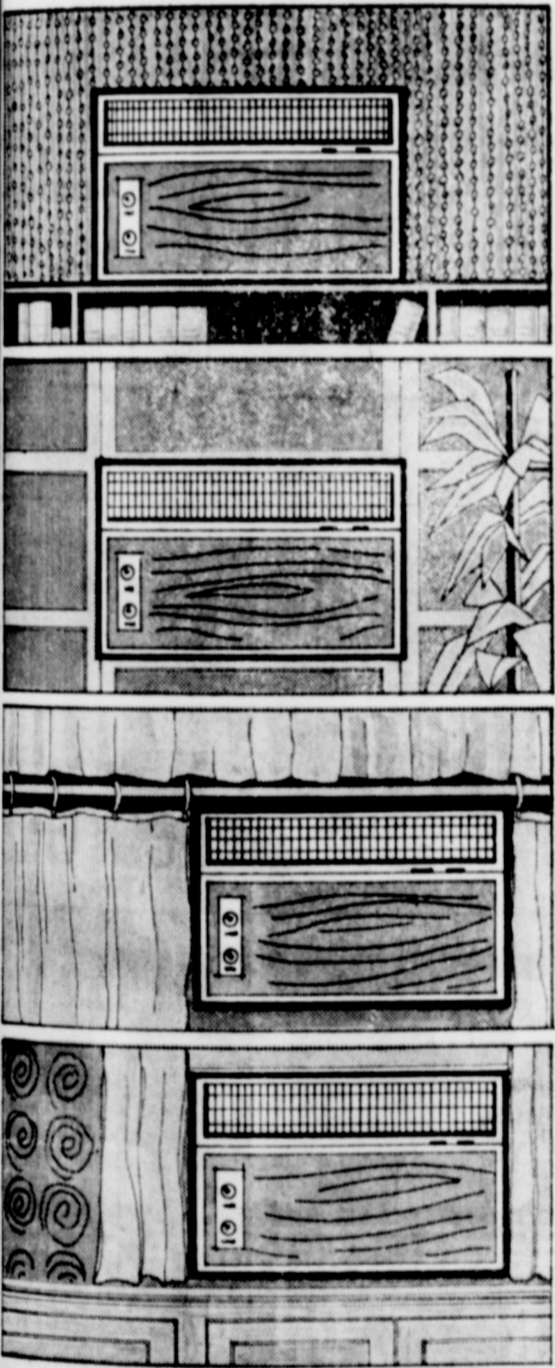
