Week End Rains Boost Farm, Ranch Prospects

Week end showers over the Cross Plains area were generally welcomed by farmers and ranchers. Measurements varied widely. Rowden reported only .30, whereas in the sector west of Cross Cut gauges showed two inches. In Cross Plains the rain totaled 1.13 inches.

Dryland peanut farmers and producers of small grain were particularly delighted by the moisture. It will help to mature late peanuts and should sprout fields seeded to wheat and oats.

Dryland Peanuts Late
Peanut farmers with irrigated crops are mainly already in the midst of harvest and the rain is not expected to be especially beneficial to them.

Livestockmen were delighted by the rainfall. It will revive pastures and allow most to go into winter with a heavy grass cover. In addition, many farmers and ranchers are hoping to graze grain fields by December. Last week end's moisture enhances that possibility.

Other scattered reports on the week end rain measurements included: J. T. Beggs .70, George Wright 1.20, C. R. Cook .30, Cottonwood .60 and Les Byrd .70.

Pension Checks Grow Fatter During Past Few Years

The amount of money flowing into Callahan County each month in the form of Federal retirement pensions has increased considerably in the last few years.

Because of the vast changes made in the social security law, the number of local beneficiaries and the size of their checks are greater than ever.

1,948 On Roll
According to the official figures covering the past year, retirement and disability payments are now going to 1,948 persons in the local area, as compared with 1,622 four years ago.

Most of them are retired workers or their widows, children and parents. The others are disabled workers and their dependents.

The findings are contained in the annual report of the Social Security Administration. It lists, for every county in the United States, the number of people on the retirement rolls and the payments to them, as of the beginning of this year.

Nationally, there are more than 25 million men, women and children receiving benefits, as against less than 21 million in 1965. They are collecting nearly \$27 billion a year.

In Callahan County, pension payments at the close of the year were at the annual rate per beneficiary of \$881, in contrast to the 1965 rate of \$722.

A further increase is in effect at the present time, by virtue of legislation boosting benefits by 15 per cent across the board.

Just how much a person or his dependents receive in retirement benefits depends upon the amount contributed to the social security trust fund, through payroll deductions, during the worker's active years.

Pensions Larger
Now, with pension checks larger than in the past and with more people covered, the influx of cash into the local area from this source has grown in importance. It represents a sizeable part of the money in circulation.

Callahan County residents, as a result, are now collecting a total of \$1,716,000 a year, a marked increase over the \$1,172,000 they were receiving four years ago.

Social security taxes have generally been going up proportionately, although no change is expected this year, despite the 15 per cent increase.

Wylie Dumps Herd 12-0 In Grid Opener Friday

A sustained drive and a long run lifted the visiting Wylie Bulldogs to a 12-0 season opening football victory over Cross Plains Buffaloes Friday night.

The two squads battled scorelessly in the first half, although the District 7-A Bulldogs seriously threatened twice in the first half and had one touchdown nullified by a penalty. Cross Plains also got its lone mild threat in the first half.

Buff's In Trouble

Buffaloes stayed in hot water most of the first half. After taking the opening kick and going nowhere, Buffs attempted to punt. Bulldog Monster Kerry McCowan fell on the blocked pigskin at the Herd's 28. The drive fizzled, however, on the nine. After Bisons picked up a quick first, Wylie's Gary Clark intercepted a Buffalo pass and returned it about 25 yards into paydirt only to have a clipping penalty move the ball back to the Cross Plains 24. Again Buffs held on downs.

A brief flurry got Buffs 28 yards, but again on fourth down Wylie blocked a Bison punt and took over on the Herd's 37. Buffs regrouped and shoved the ball back to the 47.

Buff's Drive

Beginning at the Herd's 28, Cross Plains began its best march of the night. It covered 44 yards and three first downs before Wylie stiffened and regained possession on downs. Fumbles plagued Bison offensive thrusts, although the scrambling Herd did not lose a fumble of four. A touched punt was lost to the Bulldogs.

Wylie took the second half kick, and sustained a drive 70 yards in 11 plays for the first touchdown of the game. The scoring play was a five-yard fumble from Quarterback Joe Bob Stricklin to Strong End Bobby McMinn. A pass from Stricklin to Right End Billy Freman was incomplete on the conversion attempt. The drive took five minutes and 21 seconds of the third canto.

Ineffective efforts by both teams took the balance of the third and first half of the final canto. Tailback Gary Clark brought Wylie fans to their feet with a 55-yard touchdown run after taking a pitchout around left end. He crossed the double stripe untouched with 3:39 left on the clock. Stricklin was stopped on a two-point conversion attempt.

Cross Plains mounted a passing attack, but had to punt. Wylie then was also forced to kick. Cross Plains' largest single gainer came next, a 29-yard pass from Quarterback Ronnie Pancake to Right End Robert Lewis, for a first at the Herd's 44. Bulldog McMinn then intercepted the next aerial, and Wylie ran out the clock.
