## Absentee Voting Opens For Election Due Nov. 3

Absentee voting for the Nov. 3 General Election is now underway throughout Texas.

Any qualified voter who expects to be absent from his polling place on election day may cast an absentee ballot. To do so, he should take his voter's registration certificate and visit the county clerk's office in his county any time during business hours between Oct. 14 and Oct. 30.

In addition to state, district and local races, the Nov. 3 ballot will include seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

By subject, the proposed amendments relate to: (1) censure and removal of judges; (2) authority for mixed beverage law; (3) assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands; (4) reconstitute State Building Commission; (5) county road bonds and assessed valuation; (6) increase value of homestead exemption from forced sale; and (7) authority to consolidate functions of government.

## Gross Receipts Greater On Farms In This Locality

In terms of gross income, farms in Callahan County have been more profitable in the past few years than farms in many areas of the country.

Their receipts from the sale of livestock, field crops and other farm products increased by a better-than-average margin during the last five years.

According to a nationwide report on farm and ranch operations, released by the Standard Rate and Data Service, gross farm income in the local area

was \$2,738,000 greater in 1969 than it was in 1964, when the last census of agriculture was taken.

Several factors contributed to the increased sales volume. A major one was the rise in food prices at the consumer end. In the past year alone, nearly every item in the standard market basket rose in price.

Leading the parade were the meats — beef, pork, bacon, ham and chicken, which account for about 30 per cent of the average family's spending for

food. Some other items, such as eggs, milk, cheese and bread, rose to a lesser degree.

The farmer's complaint is that he got too small a share of this increase, that a large part of it went to the processors, shippers and other middlemen.

The figures for Callahan County show that gross farm receipts in the past year came to \$8,550,000, as compared with the total five years ago of \$5,812,000.

These were the gross amounts, before any deductions for taxes, wages or other operating expenses.

Included were the cash receipts from all marketings, as well as government payments and the value of home-grown products that are consumed on the farm.

The increase in the five-year period, 47 per cent, was more than was achieved in many farm areas. In other parts of the United States, it averaged 31 per cent.

Of the cash receipts locally from the sale of farm goods, Department of Agriculture figures indicate that approximately 18 per cent of it came from crops and 82 per cent from marketings of livestock, poultry and dairy products.

It finds that American farmers as a whole had their third best year in history last year, despite the higher costs of operations. Their net income was close to \$16 billion, which is more than \$1 billion better than in 1968.

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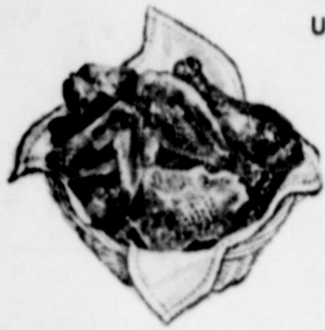

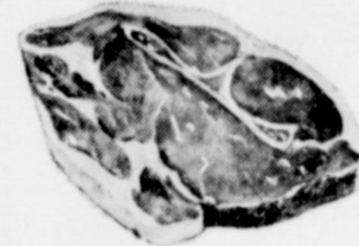

## Bears Swat Herd 55-16 On Second Half Surge

History was made and repeated last Friday night as Baird Bears romped over Cross Plains Buffaloes 55-16 in the 39th renewal of gridiron rivalry between the two schools.

Baird's 55 points is a new high for either team, eclipsing Cross Plains' record in a 43-6 win in 1968, and the 71-point total is a new standard, outstripping the 54 aggregate set in 1950 when Buffaloes defeated Bears 41-13. History repeated with the Bear victory, stopping a four-year Buffalo win string. Neither team has been able to win more than four in a row over the other.

Baird roared back after intermission to swamp the Herd. Bears tallied 34 points in the second half after overcoming two Cross Plains leads to carry a 21-16 edge into intermission.

Baird used long runs in second half to subdue the Herd. Bears ran for 339 of their 384 yards rushing in last 24 minutes. In contrast, Buffaloes rambled for 124 of their 150 net ground yards in first half.

### Bufs Lead

Buffaloes posted a short-lived 8-0 lead with 2:32 left in the first quarter. Bisons broke Halfback Rodney Renfro loose on a 67-yard scamper around right end. Renfro made it the longest run from scrimmage for the Herd this season by slipping through at least three tackles. A pass from Quarterback Roger Crawford to Back Donny Dillard in the left flat got two more points.

Seventeen seconds later, by the scoreboard clock, Baird had knotted the score. On first play following kickoff Quarterback Gary Goble hit Tight End Ricky Vestal, who was behind all Buff defenders, with a pass for a 48-yard tally. Goble went up the middle for the tying two points.

A low snap from center on fourth down of the ensuing Buff series gave Baird possession at the Herd's four. Fullback Cecil Faircloth scooted the distance over right tackle. Specialist Jay Reeves split the uprights from placement for a 15-8 Baird lead with 54 seconds left in the first quarter.

Buffaloes received the kick and sustained a march 77 yards in 10 plays. It was greatly aided by two 15-yard grabbing face mask fines assessed Baird. Climaxing play was 24-yard pass and run from Crawford to

End Robert Lewis, who caught the missile with a defender draped over him. He shook the Bear off and ambled into paydirt with 8:55 left in the first half. Renfro followed charge of right side of his line for the two point conversion and a 16-15 advantage.

Danny Vestal picked off the first of three Bear interceptions of Bison aeriels to send the hosts ahead to stay late in the second period. Five plays were needed to cover the 50 yards, key of which was a 42-yard pass from Goble to Ricky Vestal for a first at the Herd's five. Three plays later Goble passed to Tight End Vestal for the touchdown with 32 seconds showing on the clock in the first half. A two-point conversion attempt failed leaving halftime score 21-16 favoring the Bears.

In the second half it was all Baird. Except for one threat, cut short by a lost down, Cross Plains was ineffective.

Baird took the second half kick and blitzed 60 yards in three plays. Faircloth danced the last six yards after setting the score up with a 51-yard gallop. Halfback David Strickland knifed over for the two points and a 29-16 bulge.

Cross Plains countered with a drive carrying 69 yards to the Bear nine. At that point the march bogged down with the Herd getting just three plays before officials ruled the ball over to Baird after a mix-up on down count in the press-box and down marker.

Baird drove to the Buffalo 10 before losing possession, but following the Buff punt, Faircloth raced 59 yards with 35 seconds left in third. Reeves added the point for 36-16 edge. Danny Vestal got his second pass steal and on fifth play Strickland sprinted 23 yards into paydirt.

Two and one half minutes later Faircloth broke lose on a 48-yard run. With 1:29 left Goble climaxed a 58-yard blitz with a 16-yard sweep of end. Reeves made the 55-16 final.

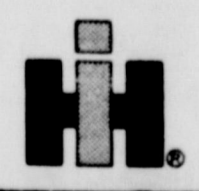

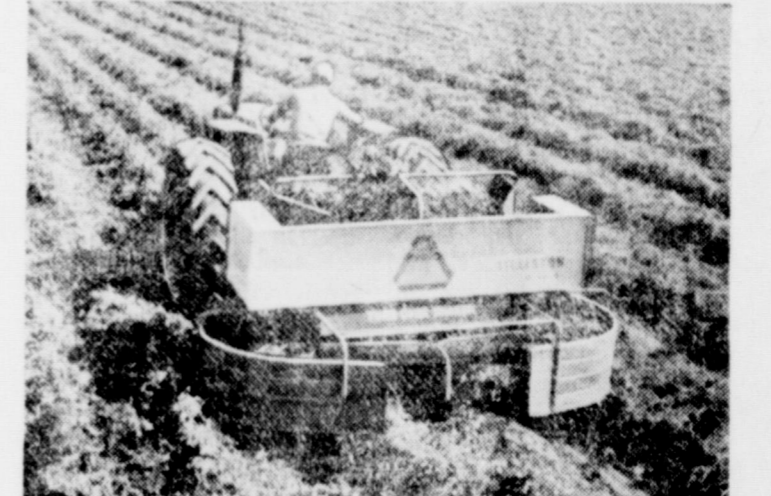

### OUTLOOK GOOD FOR LOCAL PECAN CROP

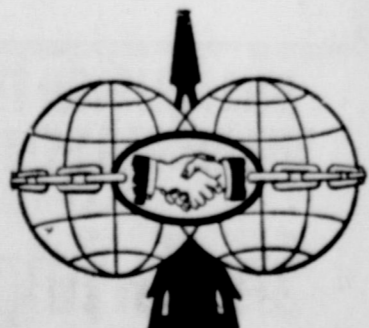
A better-than-average pecan crop is being forecast for orchards in the Cross Plains area. Producers say the price outlook is some better than a year ago.
