Fire Plant Hit Saturday

Fire quickly summoned and fire fighting equipment, housed only a block away, was soon in service.

Only meat lost as a result of the blaze was about 500 pounds being processed. The compartment housing individual boxes was sealed off and temperatures remained low until repairs were completed.

Hutchins contacted a meat packing firm in Abilene and secured a large refrigerated truck which was brought here for emergency use. All facilities were back in operation Sunday morning.

Principal losses were said to have been in electrical equipment in the motor room of the plant.

Hutchins expressed thanks to friends who helped extinguish the blaze and also to those who helped take the meat from the plant to the refrigerated truck and then again back into the plant.

"Everyone has been helpful and our customers most understanding," he said, "my family and I appreciate it more than words can express."


