STOCK SHOW OPENS FRIDAY

279 Entries Promises Best Livestock Show Ever Held

The 18th Annual Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will open Friday, Jan. 14, at 8:30 a.m. in the county show barn, located on Highway 206, one mile north of town. The two-day event will include judging of the 279 entries from county 2-H Club members and FFA county chapters.

Prize money to be distributed to winners will total over \$1,500. This money will be paid to ribbon winners in all classes and was made possible by gifts of businessmen and individuals interested in this annual event.

C. Lee Smith of Clyde, area farmer-rancher, is general chairman and superintendent of show. He reports that there will be 81 entries in beef cattle, 10 in dairy cattle, 25 goats, 60 swine, 24 poultry, 20 rabbits and 59 sheep.

Rabbit, poultry and goat divisions will be judged first beginning at 9:30 a.m. Friday, with Byron Wilson of Abilene judging rabbits and poultry. Chuck Threet, Brown County agricultural agent, will judge goats, breeding sheep, fat lambs and swine. Goat judging will begin at 9:30 a.m., breeding sheep at 10:30 and fat lambs at 11 a.m. The swine judging will begin at 1:30 p.m.

Judging on Saturday will be started at 10 a.m. with placing of the dairy cattle. Beef heifers

will be judged at 11 a.m. and the steer show will get underway at 1:30. Lawrence Winkler, Shackelford County agricultural agent, will be the judge in these divisions.

Other officers of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Association, sponsoring organization, include: Don Harris of Cross Plains, vice-chairman, and Gregory Grengross of Baird, secretary.

Vocational agricultural teachers supervising chapter activities are O. B. Edmondson of Cross Plains, James Trammell and Tim Stone of Clyde, Dick Vestal of Baird and Claude Rock of Eula. Greg Grengross, Callahan agricultural agent, supervises 4-H activities.

Superintendents for various divisions of the show are: beef cattle, Don Harris; swine, Jimmy West; fat lambs, breeding sheep and goats, Edwin Schaefer; poultry and rabbits, Bruce Lawrence, and dairy cattle, Hilton Tarrant.

Showmanship awards will be presented in all major divisions. Donors of these trophies are: beef, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Windham; swine, Peoples State Bank of Clyde; dairy, Central West Texas Milk Producers Assn.; goats, Ranchers Wool and Mohair, Brownwood; poultry, Dick Antley; rabbits, Word Estes; breeding sheep, Edwin Schaefer.

Ribbons will be presented in all classes, and rosettes will be awarded to all grand champion, reserve grand champion, breed champion and reserve breed champion.

Prize money will be paid to ribbon winners in all classes. The prize money was made possible by gifts of local businessmen and individuals.

Farmers-Ranchers Cash To Reach \$6,500,000 By '76

Cash income to farmers and ranchers in Callahan County should be more than \$6,500,000 by the end of 1976, according to Greg Grengross, county agricultural agent.

This will be an increase of more than \$1,000,000 from 1968-69 figures, with beef cattle contributing a large part of the gain. The projections are based on studies of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and are part of the "3-76 in '76" program, a state-wide project to increase Texas agricultural cash receipts by more than \$1 billion.

Total cash receipts from all agricultural entries in Callahan County are presently about \$5,000,000, says Grengross. The

most important ones are beef cattle, small grain and peanuts. They are expected to account for about 70% of the projected 1976 totals.

The county will be aided in its production efforts by the Rolling Plains Economic Program.

These projections are based on estimates from the County Program Building Committee after separate predictions were made by extension economists. The figures were published for each county, Extension district and economic area in Texas.

"Callahan County producers will have access to production information and techniques," says Grengross.

New Traffic Laws

WINDSHIELDS MUST BE UNOBSTRUCTED

No person shall drive a motor vehicle with any sign, poster or other nontransparent material upon the front windshield, side wings or side or rear windows of such vehicle which materially obstructs, obscures, or impairs the driver's clear view of the highway or any intersecting highway.

PRESUMPTIVE LIMITS OF BLOOD ALCOHOL

Evidence of the amount of alcohol in a person's blood at the time of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, as shown by chemical analysis of his blood, breath, urine or any other bodily substance shall be admissible in court and if there was at that time 0.10 percent or more by weight of alcohol in the person's blood, it shall be presumed that the person was under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

Lynn Nabors Asks Second Term As Rep.

State Representative Lynn Nabors of Brownwood announces he will be a candidate for re-election to the State Legislature from the 55th District, which includes Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, McCulloch, and Runnels Counties.

Nabors, a lifelong resident of Brown County, is currently serving as vice-chairman of the Youth Committee and a member of the State Affairs, Criminal Jurisprudence, Conservation and Reclamation, and Insurance Committees.

"These were five of the most active committees during the last session of the Texas Legislature, and over half of the legislation considered by the 62nd session was first screened by one of these five committees," he said.

2 Die In Auto Crash Late Saturday Night

A two-car accident some six miles north of town about 10:50 p.m. Saturday on FM 880 took the lives of Jasper L. Cearley, III, 30, of Wichita Falls and his sister, Darlene McCowen of Cottonwood.

Injured in the Cearley car were the dead man's brother, Robert L. (Bobby) Cearley of Bergstrom Air Force Base, at Austin, and Todd McCowen, 4-year-old son of the dead woman and Charles Vincent McCowen, 23, of Cottonwood, driver of the other vehicle involved in the crash.

Hospital authorities at Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene said Monday evening that Todd McCowen remained in critical condition and that his father, Charles McCowen was treated and released later that night.

Robert Cearley was in satisfactory condition at the Dyess AFB hospital Sunday night, according to a Dyess information officer.

According to a DPS report, a car driven by McCowen, left the road colliding with a car driven by Jasper Lewis Cearley which had stopped on a country road at the intersection of FM 880.

Apparently, according to the DPS, Charles V. McCowen was the only one in his car at the time of the accident, and the dead and other injured were in the Cearley car.

DPS officers Sgt. Jerry Matthews and Patrolman David Mohn, both of Eastland, worked the accident, and investigation continued as the Review went to press.

Joint funeral for Mrs. McCowen and her half-brother, Jasper L. Cearley III, was held at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains at 2 p.m. Tuesday. The Rev. Merle Parker of Mineola will officiate, assisted by the Rev. E. V. Brooks, pastor of the First Baptist Church here.

Burial for Mrs. McCowen was in Cottonwood Cemetery, under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home. She was born in Cisco on Oct. 24, 1948, and married Charles McCowen on June 24, 1966 in Cross Plains. She was a member of Cottonwood Baptist Church.

Survivors include her husband; one son, Vincent Todd of the home; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Hargrove of Cross Plains; two brothers, Robert and Terry, both of Austin; one sister, Vickie Lynn Hargrove; and her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Beulah Hargrove of Cross Plains.

Burial for Mr. Cearley was in Cisco Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home. He was born in Austin on Dec. 12, 1941. He was married to Mildred Jane Willford on Aug. 15, 1964, in Breckenridge.

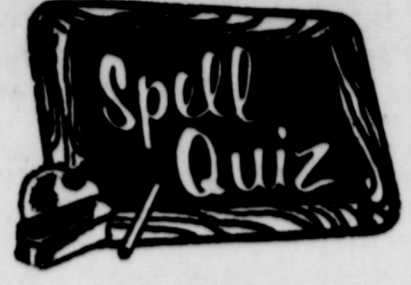

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS
 FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

By Barbara Williams

"What made my cake do this?" is a question I'm often asked. Clip this article and hang it by your MAGIC CHEF oven for a ready reference to cake problems!

The cake surface should be smooth, fine grained, and golden brown, be slightly rounded, and have a high volume. A ring on the top is characteristic of a butter-type cake. If it is PEAKED OR CRACKED, there is too much flour, or your oven was too hot. A PALE COLOR means too little sugar, the wrong type of pan, or underbaking. A cake that is TOO DARK has too much sugar, is overbaked, or the oven was too hot. A LOW VOLUME indicates too much shortening, too much liquid, too hot an oven, or the wrong size pan. And a SUKEN CAKE is the result of too little liquid, too much sugar or shortening or leavening, or underbaking.

The perfect cake has a fine grained texture, is light but not crumbly. If the CELL WALLS ARE THICK and the CELLS LARGE AND UNEVEN, you probably used too little liquid, insufficiently mixed the cake, or

the oven was too cool. A cake that CRUMBLES when cut may have too much shortening, too much sugar, or was insufficiently mixed. TUNNELS through the cake indicate too many eggs, too little sugar, or poor mixing.

Nothing is better than a soft and velvety, slightly moist, light and tender cake. Sometimes, though, all your efforts may lend you a cake that is DRY (too little sugar, too much leavening, too long baking), SOGGY (underbaking, too much shortening, undermixing), SOLID (too much liquid, too much shortening, too much flour), TOUGH (overmixing, overbaking, too little shortening), or has a DULL COLOR (poor ingredients, improper mixing or ingredients).

Of course, the most important factor to a successful cake is that delicate, sweet, well-blended flavor that satisfies the taste buds and the appetite. If the taste is FLAT, add a little more salt next time, and if it is UNPLEASANT OR BITTER, check the quality of your shortening, eggs and flavorings.

Now, of course, if your family likes your "flop" cakes the best, apply the remedies only when you're baking a cake to carry! Then everyone is happy!
