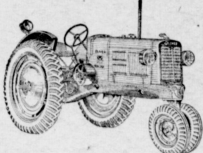
A DRY NORTHER HITS HERE

Bailey County Will Be In Meat Show Held At Lubbock

Bailey county as usual, will have a major part in the show. The Quality Meat show at Lubbock March 30 to April 1. J. B. Waide, jr., county agent, and Miss Alma Stewart, home demonstration agent, are busy making plans for the show.

A large number of entries in the five divisions: baby beef, fat pig, fat lamb, canned meat and cured meat will be made by exhibitors from this county. Show judges are well known here and much interest will be manifested in the judging this year. W. L. Stangel head of the Animal Husbandry Department at Texas Tech, and now on leave of absence from the college to handle the Livestock Department of the Texas Centennial Celebration at Dallas, will judge the baby beef division, March 31 at 1:00 p. m. Casey Fine, Tech professor and a member of the Tech livestock judging team that won first at the International show at Chicago in 1934, will judge the fat pig division. Roy W. Snyder, meats specialist, Texas Extension Service, will judge the fat lamb and cured meat divisions. Miss Grace Neely, food preservation specialist, Texas Extension service, will judge the Canned Meat division.

The livestock sale, April 1, will be of major interest as the results of the sale will tell a story of success or failure of the feeding projects. Col. Earl Gartin, Greensburg, Indiana, has again been engaged to cry the sale.

The club contest will be judged on whether all members have foundation patterns, dresses and slips made by foundation pattern and exhibited.

Texas Farmers Set Up At Washington A Bureau For AAA

Directors of the Texas Agricultural association, in session at Brownwood, last Saturday, voted to consolidate their activities and resources, at which time Cliff H. Day, Palinview, who last year was one of the leaders of farmers in their march on Washington, was named field representative of the organization with instructions to complete county organizations, such organization meeting having been held in Bailey county about two weeks ago. V. C. Marshall of Heldenheimer, was selected to go to Washington immediately to join J. R. McCrary of Calvert to set up an office there and use their influence with Congress toward passing a substitute AAA measure benefiting farmers. Howard Wright, Weelaco, a citrus grower, was also added as a member of the Protective committee. The directors voted to send telegrams to Texas congressmen and senators asking them to vote to leave the sale of cotton from the national pool in the hands of the administration, rather than for the proposal before Congress, which would require sale of 20,000 bales weekly. H. G. Lucas of Brownwood, association president, called the meeting and presided.

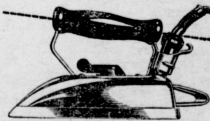

General News Over Texas And Adjoining States For The Week

Kal (Cowboy) Sledge, of Hico, has announced his candidacy for Commissioner of Agriculture in Texas.

Gov. Marland of Oklahoma, has come out favoring a state monopoly of the liquor control law.

A Welding school will be held at Tech college Lubbock, Thursday and Friday of this week.

County Judge Clyde L. Harrett of Bachman has announced he will oppose Tom Blanton, Abilene, for congressman for that district.

Validity of the cigarette tax law in charging three cents per package, is to come up to the State Supreme court for a hearing soon.

Cochran county will have over 200 more voters this year than it had in 1934, according to poll tax receipts this year.

Five irrigation wells are now being drilled in Hockley county, some of the owners taking advantage of the Federal government finance plan.

Announcement was made last week that all WPA work in New Mexico would stop on or about June 1 this year.

Every voting booth in Hale county showed a preponderance of dry votes last Saturday when a local option election was held.

It was disclosed last Monday that the Federal government was planning expenditure of \$18,000,000 construction program on army posts in Texas.

Construction of a \$30,000 Kimball Milling & Elevator Co. plant, capable of holding 150,000 bushels of corn and eight carloads of threshed grain, is now being constructed at Lamesa.

New Mexico has had copious rain and snow during the past month, putting range and pastures in good condition. Livestock there is reported to be in good condition.

THE CONSTITUTION

It is interesting, in view of the general discussion of the recent decisions of the Supreme Court declaring certain acts of Congress unconstitutional, to look at the record. In all of the constitutional test in Mr. McKinley's administration there were six, in those of Lincoln and of Theodore Roosevelt, five each, in the Johnson, Harding and Coolidge administrations four each, and the same number in the two Cleveland administrations, while acts of the Taft regime were reversed in three instances, and one of those enacted when Benjamin Harrison was President met a like fate. The record of the present administration of reversals of its acts on constitutional grounds is ten.

SUCKER OR HEIR?

Throughout this country during its entire history there have been about a dozen fake inheritance schemes that have taken millions of dollars out of the pockets of the public. These schemes are still being worked and if the truth were known more than one man around Muleshoe has at some time been "kipped" by the promoters of these old but effective rackets. Only a few weeks ago a gang was arrested in Chicago for defrauding thousands through the sale of "shares" in the mythical estate of Sir Francis Drake.

The promise that "no additional taxation will be necessary this year" came as good news with the arrival of the new year. Now that promise is junked through the decision of the Supreme court.

THE WAR ON "GAS"

They're trying to outlaw gas as a weapon of warfare. And, I've been fighting "gas" in my patients all my professional life. Yes, gas is always an enemy unless it comes through a meter for the range, and you run certain risks of being blown up there, if you don't watch your step.

I have learned a few things about the "gas-patient." The first, he has been overeating. That's the first question I ask myself, when I begin to show symptoms of inflation. I find the cause of discomfort right there, nine times out of ten—just over-indulgence in eating. You, dear reader, may find the same thing in your own case. Attend to volume in diet.

Next I learn that gases will accumulate if the sewer is clogged. To combat this, I use a simple, but effective laxative to relieve immediate distress. This MUST be done. Always with a MILD but CERTAIN laxative. Then shut off the excess of eating for a few days. This will cure the average patient with "just gas."

Third, there may be fermentation in the digestive tract. I find this in the fitful who is extremely nervous, or the worried anxious patient. The bowels are not really constipated, and there is belching, eructations, sour always. The mild alkaline laxative again with alkaline powders for a few days to neutralize excesses of acid. Mild diet, and rest the nerves.

Rarely do I prescribe an artificial digestive, unless my patient is confined to bed with disease of other organs than the stomach. I don't like to hurry a stomach that needs rest, nor do I encourage a lazy one by doing its work for it.

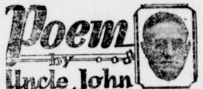

AUTO AND TRUCK DRIVERS MUST SECURE LICENSES BY APRIL FIRST

Issuance of drivers' licenses, required by April 1, will not be possible until the middle of this month, according to announcement made by Jim Cook, county tax collector, who further says terms of the act do not go into effect until Feb. 14 and it is not expected forms for such applications will be received before that date.

Those to whom licenses shall not be issued include: Persons under the age of 14 years, to whom an operator's permit is denied and persons under 18 years, to whom a chauffeur's license shall not be issued; persons whose licenses have been suspended or revoked; persons who are habitual drunkards or addicted to the use of narcotic drugs; persons mentally afflicted, or physically disabled such that the physical defect incapacitates them from safely operating a motor vehicle.

Procedures Indicated

When conditions make it necessary for persons under the age limits to operate a vehicle on the highways, the bill provides that the county judge may investigate and make recommen-

dition to the highway department for issuance of a special permit. Exact procedure necessary to obtain a license has been sent from the state highway department, although the bill states: "Every applicant shall state the name, age, sex, residence address and other physical description as may be required of the applicant, and whether or not the applicant has heretofore been licensed as an operator or chauffeur, and if so under what state, and whether or not such license has ever been suspended or revoked," and if so, for what cause and the date.

Considering persons under 18 years as minors, the bill requires that application of minors must be signed by the father or the applicant or the guardian; and that in event neither is living, the applicant must be signed by an employer or the county judge.

Drivers' licenses except those issued to chauffeurs, shall expire three years from date of issuance, and must be renewed by that date. Chauffeur's licenses, costing \$3 must be renewed annually.

Revocation of Licenses

Provisions for mandatory suspension or suspension of licenses include: "First, the license of any person convicted of any of the following offenses—negligent homicide, resulting from operation of a motor vehicle; driving a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotic drugs; or any offense punishable as a felony under the motor vehicle laws of the state; upon three convictions of violating any of the provisions of Article 801 of the penal code of Texas, or section 10 or chapter 42 of the general laws of the second called session of the legislature, committed within a period of 12 consecutive months; a conviction of a driver of a motor vehicle involved in an accident or collision, upon a charge of failure to stop, render aid, and disclose identity at the scene of said collision; and conviction upon two separate charges of aggravated assault upon a person by means of a motor vehicle, is provided by law.

Second, the revocation or suspension above provided shall be in the first instance for a period of 6 months. In event any license shall be revoked or suspended for a second time, said second revocation or suspension shall be for a period of one additional year.

Third, the revocation or suspension of any license shall be automatically extended upon license being convicted of operating motor vehicle while the license of such person is suspended or revoked; such extended period being for a like period as the original.

On violation of the license, provision declared to be unlawful are:

First: To display or cause or permit to be displayed or to have in possession any operator's or chauffeur's license knowing the same to be fictitious or having been cancelled, revoked or suspended or altered.

Cannot Lend License

"Second: To lend or knowingly permit the use of, by one not entitled thereto, any operator's or chauffeur's license not issued to the person so displaying or permitting the use thereof.

Third: To display or to represent as one's own any operator's or chauffeur's license not issued to the person so displaying same.

Fourth: To fail or refuse to surrender on demand any operator's or chauffeur's license which has been suspended, cancelled or revoked as provided by law.

Fifth: To use a false or fictitious name or give a false or fictitious address in any application for an operator's or chauffeur's license, or any renewal or duplicate thereof, or knowingly to conceal a material fact or otherwise commit a fraud in any such application."

The act declares violations of any provisions to be a misdemeanor; and in addition to other penalties, every person convicted of a misdemeanor offense herein shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$200.

It further provides that any person convicted for driving a motor vehicle while his license is suspended or revoked shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than two days or more than 6 months and there may be imposed in addition a fine of not more than \$500.
