Little League Opens Here But A Day Late

Rain postponed opening of Cross Plains Little League last Friday. But the activities were carried out Saturday, and the postponed downtown parade, which was cancelled on Friday, was also held Saturday.

Planned activities were called off about 4 p.m. Friday as skies over Cross Plains became more threatening. Play was held Saturday, although grounds were still damp.

Complete schedule of this year's Little League action may be found elsewhere in this issue of the Review.

Games will be played on Friday and Saturday nights through Saturday, May 20, but on May 23, competition will be held on Tuesday and Thursday nights, as is the usual custom.

Pee Wee League players will perform prior to regular Little League games. Two tilts are on tap each night with the curtain raiser starting at 6 p.m., and the nightcap beginning about 7:30.

Voter Turn-Out Heavy Saturday

Cross Plains and Callahan County voters turned out in larger-than-expected numbers last Saturday in the Democratic Primary election.

According to figures the Review received, 2,700 Callahanians voted at seven boxes in the county. Clyde turned out in greatest numbers polling 950. Baird was second with 635, and Cross Plains was third with 609. Others were Eula 164, Putnam 129, Denton Valley 108 and Oplin 105. Total vote reportedly included absentee votes, but one report listed a total vote of 2,767 in the county.

In the only county-wide race, incumbent Sheriff Grayson Miller won re-election over Billy C. McMillan of Cross Plains. Miller was given 1,912 votes to 758 for McMillan. Tally in Cross Plains was 360 for Miller and 234 for McMillan.

For the most part Cross Plains and county pollsters varied only slightly from the state and district trends.

In the governor's race Callahan County gave Dolph Briscoe 1,683 votes. Frances Farenthold, who will face Briscoe in

the runoff election on June 3, got just 290 votes with Ben Barnes garnering 424 and Preston Smith 390.

Cross Plains voted as follows in the governor's race: Briscoe 388, Looney 0, Farenthold 53, Barnes 99, Posey 1, Smith 58 and Willis 4.

For Lieutenant Governor Cross Plains favored the two who will be in the runoff, giving Bill Hobby 258 and Wayne W. Connally 146. County voters did the same with Hobby getting 1,257 and Connally 645.

Both Callahan and Cross Plains voters favored John Hill over Crawford Martin for Attorney General, 1,495 to 1,006 and 310 to 249, respectively. The same was true in the race for

Comptroller of Public Accounts, both county and city favored incumbent Robert S. Calvert by wide margins.

Jesse James was also tops in the county and city for re-election as state treasurer over five opponents. Byron Tunnell far out-distanced two opponents in Cross Plains and Callahan for re-election as Railroad Commissioner.

Rep. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood won re-election to the Texas House in the district by better than a two to one margin. He was favored in Cross Plains 463 to 97 for Charles E. Spellman of Brownwood, and in the county Nabers posted a 1,651 to 634 vote margin.

Don Lane of Abilene defeat-

ed Charles E. Erwin of that city for 42nd District Court Judge in Taylor and Callahan counties by a count of 11,476 to 7,867. Callahan County, however, favored Erwin by a slim 1,343 to 1,209. In Cross Plains Erwin got 330 to Lane's 261.

Albert Lovell ran unopposed for re-election as County Tax Assessor-Collector and polled 2,217 votes. James Paul Shanks got 2,055 in his uncontested bid for County Attorney.

L. P. (Pender) Mitchell received 484 votes for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 6, an unexpired term, in Cross Plains. He was not opposed.

Precinct 1 voters will decide a runoff for County Commissioner on June 3. Incumbent

Irvin Corn led the four-man contest with 665 votes. His opponent in the runoff will be Tommy Tucker who got 528 votes. Others in the race were Cecil Mings 463 and Ralph E. McAdams 120.

Hugh Ross was again named County Democratic Chairman. He was also unopposed.

Alton E. Hornsby was a write-in victor for Democratic Chairman of Precinct 3. He got 88 votes and 14 others got one or two votes each.

Cross Plains voted "for" the non-binding referendum on required school busing 367 to 143 against. The county also rejected the requirement of busing to balance schools by race, creed or color 1,284 to 309.

The four, two boys and two girls, spoke on "American Heritage" at the contest and were judged the best.

They are Tommy Bailey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Bailey of Clyde, Robert Newton, son of Supt. and Mrs. Ferrell Newton of Clyde, Miss Bari McMordie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. C. McMordie of Albany, and Miss Delores Arnold, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Arnold of Putnam.

The seminar will be held on the University campus at Waco, and is sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau. It is scheduled for July 18 through July 22.

151 Conservation Jobs On 84,826 County Acre

Approximately 55 Great Plains Conservation Program producers in Callahan County are seeding native and introduced grasses on their farms and ranches this spring reports A. H. Ringhoffer of the Soil Conservation Service at Baird. These grasses are being seeded on old cropland being converted to grassland, native rangeland, and on waterways which serve as outlets for terrace systems.

Coastal Bermudagrass is scheduled to be sprigged on about 2,000 acres and other grass such as Kleingrass, Side-oats Grama, K. R. Bluestem and Weeping Lovegrass will be seeded on approximately 4,000 acres.

At this time 151 Great Plains Contracts have been developed on 84,826 acres in Callahan County. Applications have been

received on 44 additional farms with 14,515 acres.

These contracts have resulted in the establishment of thousands of acres of productive grassland on converted cropland and the re-establishment of grasses on native rangeland.

The application of pasture and range management practices such as crossfencing, watering facilities, fertilizing, weed control and a planned grazing system following the establishment of grasses has brought about a greater stability on farms and ranches in Callahan County.

In addition to stabilizing their operating unit, landowners may include practices and measures for enhancing fish and wildlife and recreation resources, and reducing or controlling agriculturally related pollution.

McCowen Given 5 Year Sentence, Probation

An all-male jury convicted Charles Vincent McCowen of Cross Plains of charge "murder with a motor vehicle" in 42nd District Court at Baird Tuesday afternoon of last week.

The jury assessed a five year prison sentence after deliberating about 55 minutes after being charged by the judge. The jury also recommended probation for McCowen after another 24 minutes of discussion.

The Cross Plains man was tried only on one count of two identical charges growing out of a two-car collision near Cottonwood on Jan. 8 in which McCowen's wife, Darlene Har-

grove McCowen, and her half brother, Jasper Lewis Cearley III, were killed, apparently instantly, and McCowen's young son and another of Mrs. McCowen's half-brothers were injured. It was not immediately learned if the other charge would be tried, but opinion was that it would not since both counts were identical and happened at the same time.

Right now the Farm Labor Subcommittee of the House Committee on Education and Labor is conducting hearings on farm labor relations bills. As a result of the United Farm Workers Organizing Committee activities agriculture could end up under the National Labor Relations Act which was designed to deal with industrial labor problems.

Norman E. Bourlaug, 1970 Nobel Peace Prize winner, claims that to legally ban the use of chemicals in agriculture would spell disaster.

The U.S.D.A. says recent dock strikes have cost American farmers and ranchers \$1 billion in lost markets. Therefore, many are supporting Senate Bill 3232 which would prevent such a long strike again.

A subcommittee for the Senate Committee on Labor and Public Welfare is working on a minimum wage bill that may revise the Fair Labor Standards Act. The subcommittee is expected to recommend, among other things, that the minimum hourly wage in agriculture be moved to \$1.70 now, to \$2.00 next year and \$2.20 the following year.

The Sisk Bill would give organized farmers the power to bargain for the price of their produce rather than having to accept the "going price".

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
